Formula E Update

Round 2 of the 2017/2018 FIA Formula E Championship will be held in Marrakesh on January 13. In the meantime, Jaguar is continuing with plans for a fully-electric support series to run alongside select races in the Formula E Series next season. The series will be titled the Jaguar I-PACE eTROPHY.

The Jaguar I-PACE eTROPHY would be the first production battery electric vehicle racing series, featuring cars based on Jaguar's first battery electric vehicle - the Jaguar I-PACE performance SUV, which hits the road later in 2018.

Modified Jaguar I-PACE cars will have the opportunity to compete on the same weekend at select Formula E events, using the same circuit layout as the stars of the electric street racing series - with the planned schedule consisting of a practice and qualifying session, followed by a 30-minute race.

Gerd Mäuser, Chairman of Jaguar Racing, said: "Jaguar returned to racing in 2016 with the mission 'Race to Innovate'. With the launch of the Jaguar I-PACE eTROPHY, we've strengthened our commitment to battery electric vehicles, international motorsport, and Formula E. As a British team, we're proud to announce today the launch of the world's first production battery electric vehicle championship. We've always said we want to prove our electrification technologies on the track - this is the proof. I'm looking forward to seeing a full grid of Jaguar I-PACE race cars in late 2018, soon after the first Jaguar I-PACE hits the road in Europe. Ultimately, this innovative series will enhance the technology in our future electric vehicles and benefit our customers. Formula E has grown exponentially since we joined as the first premium manufacturer in 2016, with recent commitments from Audi, Mercedes-Benz and Porsche."

The Jaguar I-PACE eTROPHY will offer a complete 'Arrive and Drive' package for 20 drivers at each event, including professional technical support, spare parts and equipment. Technical specifications, schedule and participation costs will be released in 2018, with venues and calendar subject to FIA approval.

The announcement follows Jaguar Land Rover's commitment to electrification, with all new models incorporating electric or hybrid technology from 2020.

Formula 1 Racing at the Glen – The Early Years

The early years of Formula 1 at the Glen were dominated by British drivers -- Innes Ireland taking the checkered flag at the inaugural race followed by three triumphs apiece for Jim Clark and Graham Hill before Jackie Stewart topped the podium for the first time in 1968. It was a track where some of F1's most famous names triumphed -- James Hunt, Niki Lauda and Gilles Villeneuve all took the checkered flag during the 1970s.

For Formula 1 drivers, Watkins Glen International was always a little off the beaten track. "It was in the Finger Lakes, it was upstate New York, it was the fall -- so the glorious colors were all out ... it was a nice circuit, but it was rural America in the fullest sense of the word and unlike all the places we would be traveling to, be it Monza, Monaco, or Brazil," stated three-time F1 world champion Jackie Stewart. But what it lacked in glamor, it more than made up for in charm. "It was probably the most nostalgic US Grand Prix that Formula 1 ever had," added Stewart.

During F1 Grand Prix weekends, drivers would stay at the famous Glen Motor Inn -- signed photographs of F1 stars of that era still cover the walls of its lobby to this day. "To get a room in the Glen Motor Inn on a GP weekend was more difficult than getting the Hotel de Paris

in Monte Carlo!" Stewart says. "It was very modest to say the least, but you were looking over one of the Finger Lakes and it was lovely ... it was an amazing little jewel, and yet so primitive in so many different ways in comparison to the jet set life that F1 was back then. It has a lot of happy memories. I would suggest if we could get Jim Clark back and Graham Hill back they would say exactly the same things as me." Stewart says race weekends had a "music festival type atmosphere" in keeping with the spirit of the times.

In 1973, Watkins Glen actually did host an outdoor music festival called "The Summer Jam" rock festival where an estimated 600,000 fans flocked to watch The Grateful Dead and The Band among others. A nearby mud bowl --dubbed 'The Bog' -- was also a popular hangout for spectators who would stone and sometimes torch cars, motorbikes and, once famously a Greyhound bus, that got stuck in the sludge.

Good times were also matched by bad. Stewart, in particular, has reason to recall the Watkins Glen F1 era with a mixture of joy and dread. There were two victories -- the last in 1972 -- but also tragedy the following season when his Tyrrell teammate Francois Cevert died instantly in a crash during qualifying. Stewart, who clinched his third title in 1973, chose to sit out the race out of respect to the 29-year-old Frenchman before announcing his retirement from F1 -- a decision made earlier that year – one race short of his 100th Grand Prix.

"I was so distraught and disgusted by the severity and destructiveness of the accident," Stewart recalled.

It was a different era; I recall Mario Andretti's wife stating that she was hesitant to make friends because of the probability of injury and death in the sport and that she was thankful that Mario emerged unscathed despite the variety of series in which he competed.

Next month we will take another look at the early road-racing at Watkins Glen and see that it had some of (if not all) its roots in Philadelphia.



Looking back as well as forward regarding the soon to be launched updated DVJC website, I was asked to put together a brief history of the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club which I share below. Sometimes it's good to take a glance back and reflect on where you've come from as you move forward.

I hope 2018 is a Jaguar Kind of Year for all of us in DVJC.

Delaware Valley Jaguar Club History

The Delaware Valley Jaguar Club was formed in 1965 as the Philadelphia Division of the Jaguar Clubs of America. Founding club president Frank Weikel, who owned an XK150 Drop Head Coupe at the time, was inspired to create a club for Jaguar owners and enthusiasts like the ones he had encountered in UK while on a business assignment Upon return he petitioned Jaguar Clubs of North America (JCNA) to form a club to fill the geographic void between the existing clubs in New York City and Washington, DC. In September 1965 a handful of Jaguar enthusiasts led by Frank met with representatives of JCNA and officials of Jaguar Cars, Inc to officially form the Philadelphia Division of Jaguar Clubs of North America. The club's first publication "The Scratching Post", a one page flyer, generated interest among local Jaguar enthusiasts rapidly swelling the membership to 45. The first club activity, other than organizational meetings, was in March of 1966; a motoring trip to Gross' Highland Winery followed by dinner at Historic Smithville Village.

By the end of 1966 membership had grown to 65 members from well beyond

Philadelphia thus prompting a name change to the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club. In 1968 with a membership in excess of 100 the club was officially incorporated with JCNA as the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club.

The first DVJC Concours d'Elegance was held in 1967 at the Glenhardie Country Club in Valley Forge, PA.



Subsequent locations have included Penn's Landing in Philadelphia, Renaissance Office Park in Upper Merion, Hope Lodge in Fort Washington, Coatesville Hospital, and the Rancocas Native American Reservation in New Jersey. The tradition of an annual Concours d'Elegance event continues today at the current venue at Oakbourne Mansion in West Chester, PA.

In 2015, celebrating 50 years as a vibrant club supporting the interests of Jaguar owners and enthusiasts in the Delaware Valley, the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club hosted the Jaguar Clubs of North America Annual General Meeting in Philadelphia. The JCNA Annual General Meeting brings representatives of Jaguar clubs across North America to discuss, review and revise by-laws, Concours rules and matters pertaining to the national club.

Today the Delaware Valley Jaguar

Club continues to be an active and vibrant organization of over 200 Jaguar owners and enthusiasts who participate in a wide variety of club events including Rallies, a Slalom, a Concours d'Elegance, Jaguar Gatherings of Friends hosted at members homes, monthly breakfast socials and other events.

Jag Bits

E is Coming and V-8 is Leaving the F-Type

The glass for many Jaguar enthusiasts, me included, is both half full and half empty with little chance of it being refilled. Apparently, according to Ian Callum, the days of the Jaguar V-8 are numbered. During a recent interview he shared this perspective: "Internal combustion, V8 in the nose, sheer horsepower, mechanical drive. I think Project 8 is the last of its kind." He was referring to the fire breathing, 600 horsepower, 200 mph XE SV Project 8 that Jaguar is preparing to sell to 300 lucky customers. Reinforcing the death knell of the V-8, Jaguar Magazine is reporting that a top secret project is currently underway at Jaguar's design and engineering center in Gaydon to develop the next generation or replacement for the F-Type with fully electric power. This falls in line with JLR's recent announcement ensuring that all models will have some form of electrification by 2020.

The board level decision to abandon internal combustion altogether was made with full assurance that the next generation sports car with electric power will be the fastest car ever to wear the leaper. Leaping beyond the hybrid trend most of its competitors are embracing, Jaguar is fully exploiting the engineering freedom that elimination of a traditional drivetrain provides. It was felt that too many design compromises would be re-

quired to accommodate all that goes along with bulky internal combustion engines as well as electric motors and batteries in a compact sports car.

The next generation sports car, yet to be acknowledged with a Code Name, is being developed alongside the soon to be released i -Pace. Utilizing two electric motors with a 90kWh battery pack that can achieve 80% charge in 90 minutes, the i-Pace is said to achieve 0-60mph in about 4 seconds. Target 0-60 acceleration for the new sports cars is said to be under 3 seconds. Achieving performance befitting a Jaguar in an electric sports car certainly must excite the engineering team. Hopefully Ian Callum and the design team are up to the task of infusing the spirit and personality of Jaguar in a sports car whose lineage has had tri-carb sixes, V-12s and V-8s under their long sleek bonnets.

Two Historic Jaguar Race Cars For Sale

XJR 16 #191



XJR 16 Chassis #191 was the most successful of Jaguar's IMSA GTP race cars. In 1991 it finished first in four races, finished third in the IMSA championship and second in the Constructors Championship. It also had a third place finish in the Daytona 24 Hour race the following year. As an evolution of the successful XJR 9 and XJR 10 Jaguars, Tom Walkinshaw Racing built two XJR 16 Chassis; #191 and #291. Chassis #191

was driven by Davy Jones, David Brabham, Scott Goodyear and Scott Pruett during the 1991-92 season as Jaguar battled Dan Gurney's Toyota GTPs for dominance in the US. While the XJR 16 shares much mechanically with its predecessors there were some fundamental changes, particularly in the rear half of the car. The rear suspension was redesigned entirely and a newly developed two tier rear wing provided significantly greater downforce and stability. Power was supplied by a 3 Liter twin turbo V-6 making 800bhp. Under its current ownership Chassis #191 has been very successful in European vintage racing with wins at Portugal, Spa and Monza. It won the European Vintage Group C Championship in 2015. The car has up to date technical certifications and is eligible for the Goodwood Festival of Speed and Classic Le Mans as well as all other European vintage race events. XJR 16 Chassis #191 is a part of Jaguar's World Sportscar Championship Group C and IMSA Camel GTP racing heritage.

Bernie's Old D-Type

XKD 518, one of 24 D-Types delivered in the UK, was commissioned in December 1955. The factory sent it to Henlys Jaguar Dealership in Manchester. Henlys had some difficulty finding a buyer and eventually sold it at an immensely reduced price to a young

man in his mid-twenties who had a small office, once described as more of a box with a secretary, from which he managed weekend car auctions. That man was Bernie Ecclestone. For those of you who don't recognize the name Bernie Ecclestone, he is best known to car enthusiasts as head of the Formula One Constructors Association from 1978 until 2017. He is one of the richest men in the UK. Seeing the opportunity to, as we say today, flip the car for a quick profit, Bernie sold it soon after to an amateur racer named Peter Blond for 3500 Pounds (about \$150k in today's US dollars). Blond felt he got a bit of a bargain as he was looking at another D-Type for 3750 Pounds.



The car is striking in its original red finish. Thought to be only one of two that came in that color from Brown's Lane. Blond went on to rather successfully race XKD518 more than a dozen times through mid 1957. Its race history includes numerous top ten finishes on notable circuits such as Silverstone, Goodwood, Aintree, Snetterton, Oulton and others. Owned by numerous well know British racing personalities of the fifties and sixties, the XKD518 has been in the US since 1982.

This notable piece of Jaguar racing history with extensive provenance is being offered by Gooding at their Scottsdale, AZ auction January 19-20. Presale estimate is \$10-12 Million. It is Lot 055 if you are interested in bidding. I think Bernie should buy it!


