
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
Here's a handy tip concerning disc brake maintenance. When the disc brakes are disassembled for any reason, the piston and cylinder should be thoroughly cleaned. One area that is often overlooked is the inside of the piston because of the extremely narrow access hole in which the retractor pin fits into (See # 1 in diagram). The hollow cavity within the piston can harbor dirt or rust which could loosen and circulate with the hydraulic fluid or score the metal cylinder or even damage the rubber seal. This could result in damaging a newly rebuilt piston and cylinder set. To prevent this from happening, it is necessary to clean out the piston. I have used a piece of stainless steel wire whose ends I have frayed by unwrapping the separate strands slightly. This will act as a bottle brush in order to dislodge any debris in the orifice. I also squirt some carb cleaner inside the piston. The wire is inserted and twirled inside the orifice. The orifice must be flushed out thoroughly and dried with compressed air. Wear eye protection to avoid solutions or particles from getting into your eyes.

- 8. Disc.




