
NOTE TO ALL MEMBERS, SPECTATORS, ADVERTISERS AND CAR ENTRANTS FOR JAGUAR JUDGING

From the Walt Whitman Bridge: Take I-295 North. From the Ben Franklin Bridge: Take 676 East to I-295 North. From the Tacony / Palmyra Bridge: Take 73 South to I-295 North.

From I-295: Going either North or South, take Exit 45A. Bear right off the exit. The Reservation is ³/₄ of a mile from that exit on the right hand side.

From the New Jersey Turnpike: Take Exit 5. Bear right off that exit, and you'll be on Route 541. You'll then come to an intersection with a Taco Bell and a Burger King - make a right. At the next traffic light, make another right onto Rancocas Road. The Reservation entrance is 2 miles down on the left hand side.

Coming from Toms River/Seaside Heights Area: Take Route 37 West to Route 70 West. At the Red Lion Circle take 206 North to Route 38 West. Turn right onto Spur 541. Turn left onto Rancocas Road. Reservation is two miles down on the left hand side.

June 5 Concours



Overall length is 1 ft. 8 in and all models contain 500 - 1,200 hand crafted parts made from pewter, brass, glass fiber, chrome wire, and resin. Remote controlled models are also available. His favorite models are those he personalizes from customers' photos. The models are made strictly upon request and are confirmed as a genuine collector's item with a certificate. NEW INFORMATION

I am constantly amazed how new information regarding Jaguar's history emerges. I was recently reading "The Spotted Cat" the magazine of the Jaguar Club of South New England where there was an article "Jaguar Cousins" written by Brian O'Grady who is the contributing editor for the magazine. Bob says "One of the entries in the JCSNE's Special Interest Vehicles section of their Concours was a 1954 Swallow Doretti. The key word is Swallow. We know that William Lyons formed The Swallow Coachbuilders Company Ltd. Swallow built Motorcycle sidecars and later special bodies". So here is the news for "Following me. WWII, Lyons Swallow Coachbuilders (Side Cars only) was sold to Tube Investments, a large British Company based in Birmingham. Enter the Swallow Doretti. Along came Frank Rainbow, a Tube Investment engineer with a flair for automotive design. The company owners gave him a blank sheet of paper and told him to design a sports car. Within ten months of this assignment a neat sports car known as the Swallow Doretti was produced.



This car was a success from the "get go", most especially with select enthusiasts in the United States. This success did not go unnoticed by William Lyons, even though the Swallow was essentially sourced from TR-2 parts. The conflict was the use of the name Swallow. Although Jaguar had sold Swallow Coachbuilders years before, there was another conflict of interest. Tube Investments enjoyed a strong relationship with Lyons as a major sub contractor for component parts for Jaguar.

William Lyons gave Tube Investments a simple choice: cease and desist with the Swallow Doretti or lose the lucrative supply business to Jaguar. Tube Investment wisely chose the latter. The car seen at the JCSNE Concours is set up for vintage racing in the colors of the 1950 Pan American road races, white with a green stripe". Looking at the photo, the Doretti has a similarity to the Austin Healey. As I said earlier this is all news to me, which is surprising as when I was a youth I lived in a place called Solihull which was mid way between Birmingham and Coventry. More importantly my dear Father spent his entire life working for Tube Investments. Never a word about the Doretti!!

KEEP ON THE LOOK OUT---WANTED

He sent me an email asking if I could advise him how best to approach finding a mechanically sound, weekend driver, Series 3 E-type Convertible. This I did. QUALITY RANKINGS

On April 28th The New York Times published the J.D.Power "Quality Rankings" for initial quality. This is judged on the average number of problems per 100 vehicles. J.D.Power, in February and March, asked 51,000 buyers of new cars and trucks in the United States whether they had experienced any of 135 problems during the first three months after purchase. The manufacturer, out of 37 judged, with the least number of problems (average 87) was Lexus. Second was Cadillac with 93. Third was Jaquar with 98. Mercedes was 10th with 106, Audi 11th with 109, 12th was BMW also with 109. Lincoln was 19th with 121 with Porsche 35th with 159 and last at 37th was Hummer with 173. Porsche plunged from among the best to among the worst. This performance was due almost entirely to the new Porsche SUV the Cayenne. So this is great news for Jaguar and when those pundits who love to say "Jaguar, what about their unreliability?" You can say "Surely you mean Mercedes, BMW and Audi." Stick it to them!!

FRED MACK WINS AGAIN

While I was composing these ramblings, the above 93 year old member Fred Mack phoned me to say he had been to the 55th Historical Car Club of Pennsylvania show at Linville with the XK 120 OTS that he purchased new in 1953. It was entered in the Sports Car Division. He told me he had no expectations of winning an award and was on his way back to his car from where the awards were being presented when he heard his name being shouted over the loud speakers. His car had taken first place. Well done Fred. You continue to be amazing. Just think that this show has been running for 55 years and Fred could have shown his XK 120 at 51 of those vears. It must be fairly safe to say no other car enthusiast could have done that. Fred told me he and the XK 120 will be at the Concours.

JAGUAR HERITAGE

In January, Jaguar Daimler Heritage Trust launched their new magazine "Jaguar Heritage". The first issue illustrated a bright red XK 150 on the cover and some unusual copy and photos inside. They claim to offer readers a very different editorial content and style to anything seen on the newsstand before. This is a bold claim but they have all the materials to pull it off. AUCTION RESULTS

There has been a lot of action in auctions around the world. At Artcurial Briest Poulain Le Fur Paris, France two XK 150 Convertibles were sold for good returns. The first a 1958 model, Red/red leather with 73,300 kilometers on its 3.4 engine. Some orange peel in the paint, incorrect wood veneer added to the dashboard, door and trunk fit off, excellent interior. Condition 2. Sold for a generous \$60,041. The second , a 3.8 liter car, white/red leather with 42,227 miles. Good and straight but door seams off, slight wear of interior. Another strong bid and sold at \$70,548.

Also in Paris at the Christies February auction a 1933 SS 1 DHC cream/black fenders/red leather was offered. The car seemed to have been chopped from a coupe. Door and hood fit were badly off, not bad leather but wrong door panel design (These cars had the "Art Nouveau" with the sun burst design), incorrect instruments. Bad top liner. Condition 4. Not sold at \$38,184. Amazingly the estimate was \$82k-\$94k ! This was followed by a 1971 E-type V 12 Series 3 Coupe. White/black leather. 44,680 miles. Factory air. Fair chrome. Excellent paint. Well maintained and road ready. Condition 2 Sold for \$29,845.

The March Barrett-Jackson, West Palm Beach, Florida auction sold a 1950 Mark V DHC Black/red leather. 54,077 miles. A wonderful example of a car that rarely gets restored to acceptable levels. Excellent paint and chrome. Excellent fit and finish to interior. Condition 1 Sold for \$49,140.

An 87,956 mile XK140 FHC Red/grey vinyl. Automatic Sold for \$21,330.

A 1963 E-type Convertible Old English White/red leather followed. 48,609 miles. One owner since new. Fairly worn all round. Condition 4 Sold for \$48,600.


At the March RM Auction at Amelia Island a car appeared that does not cross the auction block very often. A 1961 Mark IX sedan in Sherwood green/light green leather 61,245 miles. A 1990's \$100K restoration. All round great condition. Condition 2 Sold for top money at \$68,200.

Two 1962 E-type Roadsters followed. The first in Carmen red/black leather was the 2003 JCNA National Champion. 1,632 miles since full restoration. Nice but not perfect. Condition 1. Sold for \$90,200. I guess that if it had been perfect it would have topped the 100K. The second car in opalescent burgundy/tan leather with 54,308 on the clock had completed a total restoration by a "famous specialist". Chips on nose area. Left rocker panel dented. Both door fits off. Condition 2. Sold for \$52,800. This car was in very good condition but not a number 1. These two cars illustrate what a difference condition makes. Identical cars but almost 50% less for this car than the first car above!!!

So overall auction results remain very strong for well presented cars.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS' MEETING MAY 8, 2004

The meeting was held at Two Wheeled Heaven in Chester, a very interesting facility indeed. The meeting was called to order and the minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as submitted.

In the absence of the Treasurer, there was no formal report on either the treasury or membership standings. President Kurt reported that he understands our position is good for both areas. He also reported that the efforts of Membership Retention Officer Ann Perry and those of Kit Racette have been very effective.

President Kurt reported that 7 Jaguars participated in the last rally, including winners Murray, Kress and Jones and that everyone had a great time – as usual.

Concours d' Elegance site location has been set as the Rankokas Indian Reservation in New Jersey. Coordinator Tom Jones reported that he would like to have as much information as possible about the number of people participating so that the refreshments, comfort stations and awards will be adequate. The scheduled date is June 5, with a rain date of June 6. We are expecting to add one trophy to our usual offering - the Chief's Choice - to be determined by the Tribal Chieftan at Rankokas. The facility should provide for about 50 cars to be under shelters. A few units will be reserved for our valued friends, the vendors, at a nominal fee. President Kurt will contact the vendors to cover any final details with them. President Kurt also mentioned that we should get a new public address system. It was agreed that we might rent one for this event, but that some consideration should be made to researching an adequate replacement system. Signs for the classes are already done and available. Tom Murray has volunteered to host an apres concourse party at his home after the event.

Photographer Joe Federico would like to make photos available to the entrants after the event. He will set up a "staging" area to take the photos. While it would be nice to consider a digital publishing station at the event, it was felt that the coordination for that effort would require more time than is presently available. Joe also reported that he had photos from the hill climb and that he would be bringing his traditional coffee and donuts to the concourse. President Kurt will bring sodas. It was suggested that we provide signs at highway exits to direct participants to the site.

Under New Business, President Kurt explained that since Vice President Jeff Dement will be leaving his position with the Club in order to fulfill a military commitment, that Charlie Olson has agreed to fill the remainder of Jeff's term in that position and that Tom Murray will assume Charlie's Directorship. So far there are no plans for this year's swim party. There may be a tour in June, planned by Larry Schear.

All participants in the tour and lunch spearheaded by Mike Wolf agreed that it had been a lovely event.

President Kurt reported that the assembly at the Annual General Meeting (AGM) had agreed to allow clubs to have more sanctioned rallies per year. Any number of scores can be submitted, however only the two best scores will be published.

Tom Murray suggested that we establish more contact with other clubs to see that we are interacting effectively and getting maximum participation at events, especially the Concourse. While the dates are available through the Jaguar Journal and the website, Kit Racette said that she would send specific messages to them to be sure they were aware of the event.

Mention was made of the May 29 event at Hope Lodge, "The Brits are Back." This promises to be a fine event.

Slalom coordinator, Gerry Kunkle, reported that the Garnet Valley High School site had been selected, in Concord Township, Delaware County. The event is scheduled to begin at 9:00 a.m. on July 24. Of note is a similar event sponsored by the Jaguar Touring club in Mahwah, NJ on June 19. President Kurt will provide a map for the Purr. Gerry and Charlie (Olson) indicated that they would prepare a report for the Purr including the fact that each car would have 5 runs in the event and that Steve Weinstein would be providing some helmets. Whenever possible, pre-registration makes the preparation smoother.

Kurt mentioned that we will be covering the three requirements – Concours, Slalom and Rally – to make our members eligible for the Fred Horner award.

Under Old Business, the issue of concourse judging was covered at length. President Kurt had books available with the recent changes to judging procedures. We are all urged to access the JCNA website and download the text, study it, take the test, and stay abreast of changes as they occur. This year, for instance, there are some new classes added in the "Special Division". Our judges cannot know how to handle these (or any other) areas if they have not reviewed the material.

The meeting was concluded, including the results of the silent auction and adjournment. Our appreciation is expressed to President Kurt once again for his hospitality.



THIRD ANNUAL HERSHEY VINTAGE HILL CLIMB BY GERRY KUNKLE

The two-day event really began on Friday April 30 with technical inspection and the drivers' welcoming party. Over 56 drivers participated. There were fewer participants on Sunday because of the threat of inclement weather on Sunday and because there were several accidents on Saturday. Several cars hit trees but I understand that no one was injured. The accidents occurred near the finish line. The cars included a Porsche 914 which was destroyed. A Formula Ford and an MGB were severely damaged.

The program indicated that there was a red 1954 XK120 driven by Ken Laird of Lemoyne, PA. The Jaguar which I saw go up the hill on Sunday was a black XK 120. The best time for the Jaguar was 62.864 seconds which, considering the number of turns on the course, was an excellent time.

On Sunday AACA sponsored a Concours d' Elegance. There was a nice white Series II Jaguar E-type. It arrived after I had toured the field and when I returned for one last pass by the show field, which was between the rose garden and the magnificent Hotel Hershey at the golf course clubhouse, the owner was not at the car. Dave Hutchison, of Ragtops and Roadsters, displayed his beautiful Triumph Italia. There was a beautiful 1934 Rolls Royce and a pre-war Packard. The sports cars included a nice Porsche 356, 1972 red Triumph TR 6 and a 1953 Sunbeam, which led the parade lap up and around the hill climb route.




