LATEST NEWS ON SALE OF JAGUAR

The July 17 UK Daily Telegraph reported that India's Tata Motors was in the early stages of evaluating a bid for Jaguar and Land Rover and if they proceed it would be one of India's biggest takeovers. The sale is expected to bring \$1.5 bn. Tata is controlled by Ratan Tata who is India's best known businessman. At this date the discussion is at an exploratory stage.

Mr Tata was responsible for India's biggest takeover when he obtained British Steel Company "Corus" through the Tata Steel Business for \$12 bn early in 2007. Tata Sons, the parent group has been an acquisitive grower of its businesses which range from retail & chemical to IT outsourcing and Tea. The groups auto unit plans to launch the worlds cheapest car, a \$2,500 vehicle early in 2008. If they do acquire Jaguar & Land Rover, think of the potential home market. In my working days I had a working relationship with Tata IT. It is a very smart and progressive outfit. Also when I visited their WHQ in Bombay the streets were full of the British Saloon car, the Morris Oxford. They had purchased all the manufacturing rights when the car was phased out in the UK. Could this happen to Jaguar?

In other reports in the press it is stated that "Ford won't get anything like the \$3bn-plus it hopes from the sale of Jaguar & Land Rover" A source, unnamed of course, said "They will be lucky to get \$1bn, due to the huge investment needed to restructure the two businesses. Unless Ford can get a satisfactory price they could be forced to retain the companies, but scale them down substantially."

AN EXCITING TOUR TO VISIT JAGUARS GOLDEN PAST

Today is July 16. Exactly a month ago, June 16, Paul & Kit Racette, John & Marte Murphy and Mo (my wife) and I set out at 7 am from Lower Gwynedd, PA for the 130 mile journey to make a very privileged visit to view one of the rarest Jaguar collections in the world. This was at the home of leading SS collector Brian Beni. The excitement was intense. For security reasons I cannot tell you the location. Suffice to say that we headed North partly on the I 95 and three hours later arrived in deep wooded countryside at our destination.

We were greeted in the road and directed into the lovely country estate. Our host was busy in an adjacent field and after introductions he announced that "He was feeding the animals & would we care to see?" So we followed him to a large stone structure. What were we going to see:? Perhaps a couple of live Jaguars? A leopard?. Some goats? But no! The rarest of the rare.



26 Aldabran Tortoises. To you & me these are the very large variety found in the Aldabra atoll in

the Indian Ocean which can reach 900 lbs fully grown. These have been bred and carefully nurtured to preserve the nearly extinct species. They were very friendly and allowed us to stroke their heads & necks as they moved about their field outside their shelter. In a separate enclosure there were some babies just a little larger than a normal sized Tortoise.

Then we were off to see the cars. We were introduced to the family and the dedication to Jaguar of Brian was illustrated when he introduced his sonLucas! Yes Lucas. Daughter Annabell kindly presented us with a listing of exhibits. The collection is housed in a number of converted and beautifully finished buildings. In the first building we entered onto the second floor which housed a large selection of Jaguar Collecti-

bles — pre-war brochures, advertising, signs, badges. One radiator badge in particular caught my eye. It was oblong in shape. I estimate 1.5 inches wide & 2.5 in length. On the top it said "Standard" Under this were the letters "SS" intertwined and below these "Swallow" So does



this put an end to the endless discussion on the meaning of "SS"?

Below us was a display of cars all in pristine condition. I cannot report on the cars in each building and will deal with that at the conclusion of this piece. One item, however, in this building worthy of special note is the one and only wooden Body Buck on which ALL SS 100 bodies



were shaped and finished. Standing next to this amazing time warp was a complete SS 100 body shell as though just completed from actual production. OH what joy!! As we moved from building to building we repeatedly saw all the early creative history of William Walmsley and William Lyons in a dazzling display of the SS and Jaguar's art. There were two Swallow sidecars. Model 4A from 1924 and model 11 from 1930 together with a 1929 Standard Swallow 9. A 1932 SS 1 Helmet Wing formerly owned by G. Brough. A 1932 SS2 Hel-

met Wing. Not all cars had been refurbished and some had been left in their original state "as found" One of



these was the earliest competition entry by the company, the 1934 Alpine team car, AYY 987, which is the earliest-known works-prepared car the full history of which can be found in the September 2004 edition of Jaguar World Monthly. Also of interest were the various engines which were displayed on plinths in each setting.

Brian's wife, Julie, provided us with an excellent lunch eaten in the warm sunshine and idyllic garden surrounding the buildings and then it was more cars...some 36 in total. I had always wanted to see an SS 90 and there was a 1935 version (Its original flat head 6 engine was one of



those displayed on a plinth) This was followed by a 1934 SS1 four light ex Dodge.("Four Light"

means 4 doors with windows) This car had been purchased by Horace Dodge for the companys styling department. It was purchased by Brian from the Horace Dodge estate. Also to cap the tour 2 x 1937 3.5 SS 100 and a 2.5 1937 version. Yes THREE SS 100's.

The Cars we saw were I believe only 50% of the total collection and we did see some more modern versions. 2 x XK 120, MK1, MKV11, MK V111 and a MK1X. Also, of course E-types. A Series 3 V12, A Series 1 & Series 2 Coupe, and Series 1 & 2 Roadsters. One car missing at the restoration shop was the Walmsley 1934 prototype alloy 2 seater. Jaguars first sports car!

So our visit came to an end and we set off for the journey home with wonderful stories to tell through thunder & lightening and lashing rain. Were Walmsley and Lyons gnashing their teeth in vexation that they could not have been with us.?

IN DEFENSE OF THE XJS

In the July issue of Sports Car Magazine (SCM) there was an article by Rob Sass decrying the XJS range without reservation. In the August issue they published letters supporting his contention that the marque was totally unreliable. Example "Neither door opens, the headlights don't turn off, the wipers don't turn on, and if I turn the radio off, the defroster fan doesn't work. Why I traded in my BMW for this piece of crap, I'll never know" This I believe to be sensational type journalism & so I was forced to send the following letter to SCM:-

When I read Rob Sass's biased article in the June SCM my reaction was that he condemned the total XJS range without, in fairness, pointing out their many virtues. Then for you to follow this up with "letters" in the August edition which gave personal negative views made me aware, as a long time SCM reader, that I would have to treat any future articles with skepticism. For Mr Sass's education the XJS was produced by Jaguar from 1975 to 1996. In volume it was their biggest seller. There were many different models and engine variations ranging through the Coupe, the Cabriolet and the Convertible with straight 6 or V12 engines. The V12 versions have been praised by many top car magazines as a premier Grand Tourer. Both versions have been extensively driven very successfully and in volume in racing circles, which means finishing the race, both in the US and Europe with the most notable being Bob Tullius Group 44.

I am a member of the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club and we have a number of owners of all the varieties available who have nothing but good experiences with their cars. I have owned a 1992 V12 Convertible for 13 years with only one poor experience when the air conditioning failed. It has never failed to complete a journey. The return drive to my son's home is 1400 miles which it completes effortlessly.
