Michael is extremely bullish on Jaguar and Land Rover. So bullish that he is buying both dealerships from the present owner, Gerry Lenfest. He has great plans for the brands, which he will tell us about, together with the future of Jaguar, at our holiday party on December 9 as he has agreed to be our keynote speaker. Michael tells me that the sale is moving to a conclusion. A letter of intent has been signed and he expects the sale to be completed by year end. We wish him and all people involved in the dealership good fortune. Please be sure to support them.

SEXY KITTY. CATALYST. BREATHTAKING

I have seen it!! I have Seen it!! I have been in between it!! Yes - yes the new Jaguar XF was at a private preview at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts on the evening of Saturday October 20.

In gleaming white it was billed as the "future of motoring design". Gone is the leaper, the wood dashboard, the traditional gear stick. As Ian Callum, Chief Designer, said "It's about time for Jaguar to show its claws." Looking back we can now see that Ford took a wrong direction when management voted for retro. They came out with the retro Thunderbird, the GT 40, as well as the Jaguar S Type which was heavily influenced by the historic and long lauded MK 2 Sedan of the 1960's. Also, the Jaguar luxury sedan, the XJ8, kept its basic design for countless years starting with the Series 3. It looks as if plummeting sales and dramatic losses have prompted Ford to give Jaguar designers more freedom to reinvent the brand. And about time too!!

This new model is billed "As one of the most visually striking, technically sophisticated, and driver orientated sedans that Jaguar has ever produced." I will let you make your own mind up about that!. When I sat in the XF I must admit that my background of owning 21 Jags over the years must have influenced my instant reactions. Where was the 4 on the floor, where was the dashboard of walnut wood & where was that leaper on the end of the bonnet which I used as a sighting guide on my 3.8 MK 2 in the 1960's as I

drove to London from Liverpool down the expressways with no speed restrictions and often exceeding 120 mph. It was then that I realized that I had become one of the pipe and slipper brigade that Jaguar has been accused of designing their cars for. "NEVER" I screamed ...no... thought. There were the usual leather seats. Most comfortable & sporty. Lots of room in the back and in front of me - new concepts. The "Jaguar Drive Selecter" is on the console where the gear stick used to be. It is round and finished in chrome. When you press the start button, which pulses in red when you enter. the Selecter rises to meet your hand. You rotate it to select the gears. I thought of the phrase "A turn of the knob changes the job!" Also, gear changes can be worked through paddles behind the steering wheel & "the system is fully fly-by-wire."

The aluminum finish of the console is very smart & modern. OK... so the 1961 E-type had it, but in this case it is beautifully merged with...yes... wood. The facia is also aluminum. So you don't get complete shock there is wood! We are saved. I read in fact that there is more wood than any other Jaguar since the Mk 2. Burr Walnut, Satin American Walnut and a Rich Oak are the choices. The use of wood is accomplished in a very contemporary manner.

Another new term to learn is "Jaguar Sense". To switch on the interior light . . . don't look for the switch...just touch the light. (Who's going to control my grandchildren?) This also applies to the glovebox compartment. The interior lighting provides its own mood as it is phosphor blue. There are three levels of audio, a standard touch screen navigation system, and rear parking cameras. Excellent trunk space at 500 liters or 540 with a tire repair system in place of a spare wheel plus the rear seats fold down giving another 420 liters of space.

There are various engines available, one being the all aluminum 4.2 liter, 32 valve AJ 8 engine. Naturally aspirated, it develops 300 bhp and 310 lb-ft of torque. Supercharged versions give 420 bhp and 413 lb-ft of torque. To look at the exterior of the car was not easy in the area it was shown. The fusion of a sports car and a luxury sedan is an outstanding concept and hopefully the total package will make certain of Jaguars future success.... but but but no leaper!! However there is a compromise, on the trunk lid of the car, is the familiar leaper we see over the word Jaguar on all their literature. So great exterior, great interior, and a leaper. What more could you want?

The question now is does Jaguar want to sell the XF in North America?. The invitation I received from Jaguar for the above preview was very smart and professional. The event was Saturday, October 20. It said "This ticket entitles one person a glimpse into the future of motoring design. Urban chic attire. No cameras please." Now think about it "Urban chic". What's that? Its Saturday night but only "one person"? Dump the spouse? and "No cameras"? This all implies they don't really want to go public. Later it was suggested to me that perhaps Jaguar doesn't want to sell cars in the USA. Why? Because they want to make a profit and to be price competitive here with the present exchange rate, \$2 to 1 pound, is very likely impossible and it would be good management to ship the initial production of the XF to countries where the rate is less damaging.

I did take my wife with me to the preview and we both enjoyed the show and the excellent drink and food provided. Thank you Jaguar.

During a visit to talk to Mike Smyth, President of Great Britain's and Main Line Jaguar, I was introduced to the 2008 XJ8 luxury Sedan. This is a really aggressive looking car. Utilizing the same body shell it looks transformed. It has the Jaguar styling side vents seen on the new XK and the XF. The front is transformed. The leaper has gone and is replaced by the circular Growler on the mesh radiator as per the XF. A mesh grill has also been placed in the scoop and vent ducts. The overall effect is a new aggressive design.
