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Jaguar Western States 2008 via Mount Rushmore

Route 80, Route 90, Chicago and Rockport IL, day one. Madison WI, Mississippi River, Sioux

Falls and Rapid City, South Dakota, day two. Rapid City is in the center of the Black Hills which includes Custer State Park. We went to the visitor's center the first thing on Saturday morning and they suggested going to Deadwood for the good inexpensive food at the casinos and to Sturgis. She also suggested taking the Trolley in Rapid City to get the layout of the town and history of

the city. We drove twenty miles to Sturgis. Motor Cycle enthusiasts will know where this is but I did not buy a T shirt. We went to Deadwood where gambling is permitted and had lunch at Cadillac Jack's Casino. Deadwood was the town where Wild Bill Hickock had drifted to and while playing poker on August 2, 1876 was shot in the back. He was holding a pair of black aces and a pair of black eights which is now known as a dead mans hand.

Rapid City and the Black Hills are attracting retirees and the economy is centered on tourism. While driving around town I saw a TR3. That evening an auto cross was being run across from our hotel which I had to see. The trolley ride includes parks, fish hatchery, Berlin Wall memorial and Chapel in the Hills. The Chapel, built in 1969, is a true replica of the church of Norway, an outstanding wood carving with remarkable craftsmanship.

On Saturday we made reservations to take a bus tour which included Mount Rushmore, Custer State Park, and the Crazy Horse monument. The scenery was terrific and the weather was perfect. Mount Rushmore is named after a Mr. Rushmore, a New York banker who invested in the region. The carvings in granite of Washington, Lincoln, Jefferson and Theodore Roosevelt, on the mountain by Gutzon Borglum are spectacular as is the entrance to the monument with granite pillars and flags representing each state leading to the amphitheatre. The tour also included lunch at the State Game Lodge or Western Whitehouse of Calvin Coolidge. The story has it that

> now named Grace after his wife, the day before with 24,000 fish). President Eisenhower also stayed at the lodge while in office to test his fishing skills.

> Monday we left South Dakota for Grand Junction, Colorado. We traveled through Casper, Wyoming south to Craig, Colorado, and took route 70 in Colorado to Grand Junc-

tion. Arriving that evening after driving 12 hours. We attended the cocktail reception and ate hors d'ouvres before checking in. A ranger from the Park Service was making a power point presentation during the reception on the Colorado National Monument which I later found out was officially recognized as a national park in 1911.

On Tuesday morning the Slalom was run. I did not drive our XK8 in the Slalom but did drive a Jaguar XF along with Nelson Rath as my co pilot. We had a very lack luster time. I would have liked to have gotten a second run. That afternoon we took the float trip down the Colorado River followed by a western barbecue and rodeo. On Wednesday we participated in the rally/tour which began east of town with the first stop at the Powderhorn ski area. The second leg of the tour was the Colorado National Monument. The scenery was breathtaking. EJ thought that the best part of the tour was the luncheon at the Two Rivers Winery. She does not care for traveling at the five to twelve thousand foot elevations with switchback roads, tunnels and no guard rails

That evening we took the bus to the Gateway Colorado Auto Museum. The museum and corporate retreat was built by the founder of the Discovery Channel, John Hendricks. There were several dozen forties and fifties automobiles all in pristine condition. The center piece of the museum is the 1954 Oldsmobile F-88 dream car designed by Harley Earl that sold several years ago at Barrett Jackson for

three million dollars plus commission.

On Thursday I attended the Sunrise Breakfast at the Monument. Seeing the sun rise was spectacular and the breakfast which was held

adjacent to the visitor's center was excellent. We toured down town Main Street which was quaint and scale up with art



forms and statues throughout the four or so block area of down town Grand Junction.

That afternoon we played croquet. Participants were encouraged to dress in white. Champaign was supplied. This was the hottest day of the week. I had a lucky shot and won in the preliminary round but came in a dismal last place in the championship round. WHERE DO ALL THE OLD CARS GO IN THE WINTER?

During the month of August I must have seen at least 600 vintage cars all of them lovingly prepared for the show field. To start off in late July we set off for Michigan to visit our son Russell and his family. We completed the 1,200 mile round trip in our new XK Coupe. Bliss! I was amazed that this aluminum bodied Coupe with a V8 engine averaged 28.5 miles to the gallon. I put her in cruise control, set at 70mph, and let her go. At last I am "green". The most interesting part was how many vehicles went, at much higher speeds, past me, including of course 18 wheelers. Just think of the fuel they must be consuming! With the XK I am constantly amazed how many people comment that it looks like the Aston Martin V8 Vantage or the Aston Martin DB9. What they should be saying is that both these cars look like the XK. There....that's a fair comparison.

It so happened that during the visit, on August 2, the Meadow Brook Concourse took place. Held annually on the stately grounds of the home once owned by the Dodge family, it attracts a multitude of exotic cars rivaling the magnificence of Pebble Beach. The cream was all there & I estimate 230 vehicles turned out. Packard, Mercedes, Bugatti, Cord, Chrysler, Alvis, Bentley, Rolls, Aston Martin etc, etc and, yes, Jaguar came up with the rare and exotic in the form of a 31/2 liter SS100, an aluminum bodied XK120, and a two tone MK IX. With all the attention placed on detail on these exhibits, I don't know how anyone could pick how one was better than the other.

On August 10, despite warnings of thunderstorms, it turned out to be a clear and bright morning, so at the crack of dawn I got into my 420 and drove to Gwynedd Valley to meet with John Murphy and his



1937 SS100. Together we journeyed to New Hope to take part in their annual show. At least a couple of hundred other enthusiasts had ignored the weather warnings. There was every conceivable vintage American brand plus the usual show of MG's, Triumphs, Sunbeams, Austin-Healies, Morgan's, and Aston Martins. We had a good showing of a broad variety of Jaguars with 18 cars fielded. There was one each of the following, 1937 SS 100, 1948 Two tone 31/2 liter Drop Head Coupe, 1967 420, Series 1 XJ6, XJ 12, 1964 Daimler Majestic Major, XJS, and 3 XK120 and 8 E Types.

Judging was completed early as the clouds were gathering. My daughter called me saying that a storm was hitting Malvern with hail as big as golf balls. Not good for vintage cars! As the results were being announced at midday the rain began to fall. There was a general rush by those who had trailers to get to cover. Because of the disruption I did not get the order of awards for our display but I did know that the first three places (in what order I do not know) went to John Murphy's SS100, Bill Beiswinger 69 E Type, Bryan Edwards 1974 E-Type with Wayne Tubbs Series 1 XJ6 getting an honorable mention.

The rain became a downpour, quickly clearing the ground. We should have believed the forecast. I had to drive from New Hope to Malvern and was concerned how my 41 year old car would behave especially the wipers. I need not have worried. She sloshed through rain soaked roads with ease and the wipers worked impeccably. There was no problem and I arrived home without incident. Next morning I looked at the 420 expecting to see dirt and road residue on the body and wheels. Amazingly the car was pristine with no evidence of the long, wet journey. There is nothing like a Jaguar for reliability and excellent preservation.

Two very top models of the latest Bentley reminded everyone that this brand is very strong. There is no judging and the cars are there purely to be looked at and admired. Fun!

It was a delight having Suzanne , our daughter, with me but as it became very hot she suggested we get in the 420 and drive home. So we did.

So you will see that these three shows brought out at least 600 cars. So where do they all go in the winter. Presumably, in many cases, one of the every day cars has to sit outside and provide a freezing start to the day. Also I often wonder why I don't see any of the many MG's & Triumphs out for a leisurely drive on a Sunny weekend?

The next shows that will bring out over 200 top cars each are the Buckingham and Radnor Hunt Concours. THIS, THAT AND THE OTHER CIRCLE THE WAGONS

I have discussed before the merits of the Jaguar X-Type Wagon. As you know this neat car has been withdrawn from the North American market and when it was available it was not promoted. We have had our copy for a year now and recently, for the first time, I got the opportunity of driving it on a lengthy visit to Gettysburg. With four aboard the 3.0 liter engine really motored & I found myself exceeding 80 mph without realizing it. Very stable, great road holding and fairly mean on petrol consumption. Jaguar seems to think there is not a market here for wagons so imagine my surprise when I read in August 25th Auto-Week the following headline:- "Caddy Adds A Wagon" followed by "Cadillac will add a wagon to the 2009 CTS lineup early next year. The CTS Sports Wagon, revealed at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, gets a conventional CTS grille and fenders, but tall rear taillights evoke fins reminiscent of Cadillacs of yesteryear. Rear-wheel and all wheel-drive versions will be available". The photo shows it to be very similar to the Jag Wagon from a side rear view.

My instincts tell me that Jaguar is wrong and Cadillac is right. Our Wagon replaced our Jeep. It has many of the features of an SUV with a rear lifting tailgate, folding back seats & therefore lots of room to store stuff. Two small children can sit in their seats in the rear. And important, now its fuel consumption is what is needed in this time of high cost. Most importantly my wife enjoys driving it especially its compact size and road holding. Also, as I have said before, it amazes me how many people admire its good looks despite repeated press assaults saying that it belongs to the pipe and slippers brigade

FIRST-EVER JAGUAR HYBRID ON ITS WAY?

Larry Schear sent me the following news item from Autoblog Green. "Rumor has it that the classic XJ saloon may be the first model to benefit from the UK government–sponsored testing which should endow Jaguar with the technical know-how to make its first hybrid model. According to the spy shooters from Next Autos, the next edition of the iconic leaping cat has been spotted testing and will reportedly sport distinctive new sheet metal that should serve to differentiate the newer models from the old. Despite the fact the latest Jags have been built on new lightweight aluminum-intensive structures, they have met with less than stellar sales, a fact that many attribute to stale styling that looks just like Jags from ...oh, thirty years ago. For this reason, expect a pretty radical departure for the next generation, which could share styling features with Aston Martin. Along with the rumored hybrid should be gas powered V6 and V8 engines as well as the Euro-requisite diesels".

MK V INTRODUCTION

One Jag I neglected to mention last month when talking about the XK 60 celebrations and that was the MKV introduced in 1948 based on older styling and developed to house either a 21/2 or 31/2 liter engine not the famed XK engine. However three MKV's were fitted with the XK engine. Two for development purposes and one for Sir William Lyons to play with. This car alone survives today and is located somewhere in North America.

LE MANS HERE WE COME?

Ratan Tata is reported to want Jaguar back at LeMans. They last won there in 1990. This appears to be a natural progression for Jaguar as it was at Le Mans that they had their most famous victories putting the brand firmly in the motoring public's eye. Returning to Le Mans appears to be a far more sensible objective than trying to compete in Formula 1 which for Jaguar was an expensive failure. It would have been much wiser to invest that cash in new product. I was at the Le Mans 1992 event when Jaguar fielded three XK 220's one of which won its class. The Le Mans cars rocket at amazing speed and the 220 looked to be lumbering as it came down the straight at 180mph.

Enjoy September before it is time to put our cars away for the winter....I always keep mine at the ready for those days when the sun shines, the air is crisp and the roads are dry.
