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

The Prez Sez

June 2009

"Wow!" said Bob Delucia, Chairman of the Cars of England Division. "Wow!" I repeated, what a fantastic Concours and Car Show! From what I've heard from various sources, "Great Show!" was said by everyone!

This was my 5th Concours as Chairman and this one was the best and most challenging! I thought it might be interesting to our members to know how this all came about, especially after our 2008 Cars of England Show at Hope Lodge was successful.

During the first weekend in October 2007 **Kurt Rappold's** wife **Pat** and daughter **Sue** had attended a luncheon as part of a week long event called the "Chester County Day" at the Oakbourne Mansion. At the luncheon they were talking to **Tom and Eva Foster** of the Oakbourne Mansion Commission. When Pat mentioned what a great site for a Jaguar Car Show, Tom encouraged her to speak to Kurt and arrange a meeting. At the time we were committed to join the DVTC to form what was called the "Cars of England" at Hope Lodge. This was an established location, providing spectator support and all the ancillary things we needed. All we had to do was bring our Jaguars! It was a very successful show and we looked forward to continuing in 2009. However, things quickly changed when during a post Concours discussion at Scoobie's restaurant in Fort Washington, we were shocked to learn that the Pennsylvania Historical Commission determined that Hope Lodge would no longer sponsor Car Shows!

We had to locate a new venue quickly and remembering Kurt's description of the Oakbourne Mansion grounds, I made contact with Tom Foster. He expressed keen interest in having an event of this nature. After discussing our requirements to support 200 cars for an auto show and touring the grounds, Bob Delucia and I cosigned a rental agreement. The "Cars of England Show" would now be held on the grounds at Oakbourne Mansion for 2009! To quote from the classic movie, Casablanca, "this looks like the beginning of a long friendship!"

It was the largest turnout of Jaguars for any DVJC Concours! I think the wide spread and local advertising that was done to promote the event certainly was a factor. Much to my amazement, during the show an aircraft pulling an advertising banner flew overheard to promote his business — for he didn't need to promote ours. The local spectator support was really evident in the number of cars that were parked in the spectator's parking area.

For three days prior to the show we had rain with most of it on Friday, but the forecast for clearing skies and a sunny day on Saturday bolstered our confidence that the Show would not be postponed. Don Mullin, Mike Nitroy and I, while marking the Jaguar entrants parking locations in the pouring rain, noted that the grassy surface was still solid. Slogging down in the rain that afternoon eased our concern that cars might get bogged down or, worse yet, we would be forced to cancel Saturday to let the field dry out. Saturday morning, hay placed around the entrance to the show field took care of any mud. Clouds giving way to sun provided us with the kind of day we had prayed for!

Saturday morning was very hectic due to the rain on Friday; lots of planning scheduled for Friday evening was postponed until Saturday morning. Our earlier arrivals may have perceived us as being disorganized as time was spent briefing staff members on their responsibilities and setting up signs to direct the entrants, spectators, vendors, and staff. Things started to fall into place as the tents were erected, the registration started, and the judges briefed.

I want to give special recognition to our **Youth enthusiast's** in alphabetical order:

Danny Bratton, Grant Olson, Kurty Rappold, Gunner Sorjeen, and Christian Tate.

I thank you all for the various tasks from parking spectators to collecting the judges scoring sheets and setting up tents. **Good Job guys!**

The West Chester Jaguar/Land Rover and Cloverleaf Auto Service, were Sponsors that helped offset the cost of our Concours. West Chester took advantage of the close proximity to the show grounds to display several new cars and setup a hospitality tent. Dave Hutchinson and I had contacted several vendors weeks prior to the show and they responded by attending. If the vendors feel it was worth their time to attend this year, they will return in 2010. I can see a whole new aspect of the show developing for next year.

Another aspect was what I call the "Mansion Vendors" who had set up shop inside the Mansion to attract the ladies who attended. I understand the Hat Lady was the most popular! In addition, tours of the Grounds identifying the various trees and flowering bushes were conducted.

Now, people get hungry at these types of events, so we asked Carlino's Deli in West Chester to be the food vendor for the show. With a bit of reluctance they agreed, not having experience with a venue like this. They provided us with a good menu selection and delicious food from all reports I hear. I had a delicious box lunch that seemed to be the popular choice. It's understandable that they weren't entirely prepared to serve a long line of waiting customers, but worked their "butts" off to accommodate them. I'm sure they'll be back next year and we'll be delighted to have them.

We also invited a Disc Jockey who was popular at other car shows to do the music portion. We were concerned that he would not be able to project the sound over the grounds and for the far reaches that appeared to be a problem. Most of the areas were fine and, from my standpoint, he provided us with music

very appropo for the span of years the cars represented. Besides, I'm a "Big Band" fan and music of the forties, and fifties were a delight to hear!



Then there were the Bag Pipers, a tradition at any British Car show of importance so we felt we had to have them. It adds a touch of ambiance to any

British event and ceremonial gathering.

Now finally to the Show Cars. We actually had 54 cars

registered and several other Jaguars that came by way of a West Chester sponsored Caravan arranged by the Dealership. They were not part of the Concours but, parked on the back edge of the Judging field, gave the impression we had over 75 cars, as someone reported.



The number of entries in the Champion and Driven Division were just about even and at least two cars were entered in every class. I was impressed with the cars I hadn't seen before in the Champion Class as well as the long distances some entrants traveled to the show. I thought I'd list the winners separately as a supplement to my report. Also they are now posted as **Provisional Results** and can be "down loaded" from the DVJC website by clicking on "ne33Home page, then "Event Results" June 2009.

John Murphy's 1937 SS100 is a perennial winner not only in his class but the "People's Choice



Award", sponsored by West Chester Jaguar/Land **Rover.** There are two other cars that receive almost as many votes, but John's car always prevails. So it was especially appropriate, that John receive this one, because sadly, the Murphy's are relocating to Arizona and taking the car with them!

The Longest Distance Driven Award sponsored by Clover Leaf Auto Service was won by Jon Nocera from Canada driving his modified '68 XKE OTS, barely beating Jim Phillips from the Buffalo Affiliate by less than a fifty mile difference.

I would like to remind the Entrants that the scores and winners listed are **Provisional Entries** and not official until December 2009. You will be receiving copies of your Judges Scoring Sheets by Postal Service around the 19th. You will be able to question and challenge what you feel is an error by contacting the Chief Judge, Kurt Rappold at 610-358-4055.

In summary, I'm pleased, actually delighted, with the overall aspects of the Concours and feel that Tom & Eva Foster of the Oakbourne Mansion Commission deserve our thanks for their support and cooperation to help make the challenges of this new Venue a success!!



Directions to Garnet Valley High School Glen Mills, PA



DIRECTIONS:

<u>From the North:</u> Northeast Extension 476, continue on 476 Blue Route to Route 1 South to Route 202 South or go to Valley Forge Exit 26 to Route 202 South. Follow Route 202 South towards West Chester. Turn left on Smithbridge Road for 2.1 miles. GVHS is on the right.

<u>From the East (NJ):</u> Take the Commodore Barry Bridge, go South on I-95 to exit 2 and go north on 452 to Village Green and West on Concord Road. Follow Concord Road through Aston to the traffic light at Smithbridge Road. Turn left on Smithbridge. GVHS is down the road on the left.

If you 'wind up' on Route 322 continue to right turn on Route 1, then turn right onto Concord Road. From here, you would turn right onto Smithbridge Road. GVHS is down the road on the left. (There is no exit from 322 onto Smithbridge Road.)

<u>From the South:</u> From I-95 take exit 8 to Route 202 North. Continue on Route 202 North into Pennsylvania. Turn right on Smithbridge Road. Bruster's Ice Cream is on the right. Continue on Smithbridge Road for about 3 miles. GVHS is on the right.

<u>From the West:</u> On the PA Turnpike, take exit 23 South on Route 100 to Route 202 South to left on Smithbridge Road. GVHS is on the right.

There are signs for GVHS as you approach the school. The school is not visible from the road; look for the sign at the driveway as the school sits back from the road down a long driveway.



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

Is there such a thing? Well, if there is, we held one on June 6 when the DVJC participated in the "Cars of England" event held on the beautiful grounds of the Oakbourne Mansion in Westtown Township, PA. The venue is superb and the right setting to display the cars to advantage while allowing spectators and owners to freely inter-mingle, communicate, and view the best of British motoring.

If you were not there then you missed a treat. I counted 75 Jaguars including those fielded by one of our sponsors, West Chester Jaguar. In addition to quantity, the quality was exceptional. All of the Jaguars gathered in one location while all the other British cars gathered in a second location. I was told there was 170 plus other

manufacturers including MG, Triumph, Wolseley, Cobra, Aston Martin, Morris, Mini, Rolls Royce, Bentley, Allard, Sunbeam, Lotus, Morgan etc. So in total some 250 memories were there for our pleasure. Also, to complete the festivities and provide a buzz, over 400 visitors attended contributing over \$2,000. How's that for success??

Contributing to the show of Jaguars were owners from Middlesex NJ, Baltimore, London Ontario, Sparks MD, North Carolina, Ottawa, Pittsburgh, Buffalo NY, Long Island, York PA. All of the cars in the three divisions, Championship, Driven and Display, were to be applauded earning very high points in the judging. Perhaps this was best illustrated by the two XK 150's in Championship class C-04 both being awarded first place with 100 points.

Another historic car being awarded 100 points was John Murphy's 1937 SS100. This magnificent and

stunning car also won the "People's Choice Award "
At the same time it brought a tear to the eye as it is the last time we will see it as it's guardians, Marte and John Murphy, are moving to Santa Fe. In fact the SS100 and John's project car the "Z – Type electric XJ 13" are due to be picked up for shipment during the week of June 19. John has promised to keep us informed on the progress of the XJ 13



project. As the Concours moved to a close the last sight of the SS 100 was with its hood down and stowed. Then you saw the real beauty of this 62 year old sports car and could imagine why the dashing young fighter pilots favored it as transport in WW2.

The array of highly polished cars were made up of every model and style. They ranged in age from 1937 to the very latest XKR with its louvered bonnet vents and aluminum body. We had XK 120's, E-Types, XJ's, (2 beautiful Series 1's), MK 1X, 420's, XJS's, X-Types, XK 8's and the new XK. A highlight was the magnificent

On May 23rd a number of DVJC members took their cars to the 2nd Susquehanna Valley Club Concours held at Sunset Lane Park, York. Organized by David Hershey this new club is flourishing and some 45 Jaguars were in attendance. It was a good experience to drive my 1967 420 on the 140 mile round trip without a hitch as it was the first time I had taken it any distance. With 4 on the floor and overdrive it was a far better experience than my trusty 1962 MK 2. Of course the 420 was the test bed for all the new technology incorporated in the release of the Series 1 XJ6.

From Downingtown I followed John Murphy and his trailer containing his SS100 at a steady 50 mph and we arrived at 9 AM to find the majority of participants already there. The event had attracted a good variety of models including Xk's, E's, XJ 6's, MK 2, Mk 1, Mk X. One particular model which caught my attention was the 2002 XJR-100. Only 500 of these cars were made for world-wide distribution. All had the identical specification and were painted metallic black with black leather interior with red stitching. The car was released to celebrate the 100th birth date of the founder of Jaguar... Sir William Lyons. This car had been brought to the show by Ira Cox from North Carolina and was in excellent condition.

This was a very enjoyable show and we should support it more fully in the future. The prize giving ceremony was unusual in that instead of the pewter plates I am accustomed to, they gave out large handsome replicas of the leaper. NICE!

THE 53 – YEAR EXCEPTION



Club member Jim Shield gave me a copy of the March 13 "The Palm Beach Post". (Yes they're still publishing — must not have invested in Bernie Madoff Enterprises.) In the Sports section they published, under the above headline, the news that Kyle Busch won Sunday in the top NASCAR race at Atlanta in a foreign car... a Toyota. So what's so special about that??? Well let me tell you. The last time a foreign car won a NASCAR race was when Al Keller won in 1956 with his British made sports coupe at the Linden, NJ airport. The car that performed this feat was a Jaguar XK 120. There were 13 Jaguars in the field and the competition was Hudsons, Dodges, Oldsmobiles, Fords and Plymouths. Stock cars finished second and third and Jaguars were 4th, 5th & 6th. Those were the days when men were men, women were women, and Jaguars led the world. Keller died on November 19, 1961 after a Champ Car crash in Phoenix. He was 41.

JAGUAR IS TO RETURN TO Le MANS 24 HOURS

According to Jaguar World Magazine a new program announced by Rocketsports Racing will see it prepare all aluminum 5.0-liter XKR's for a partial season in this year's GT2 American Le Mans Series ahead of a full program in 2010 and a return to the Le Mans 24-hour race.

Competing under the banner RSR, the team will enter the GT2 ALMS series with Jaguar as a technical partner. RSR plan to build three XKR's this year with customer cars available for purchase in 2010. While the XKR's rigid riveted and bonded aluminum monocoque will be re-

tained, many of the body panels will be made from carbon-fiber. Additionally, though branded XKR, it is the naturally aspirated version of Jaguars 5.0-liter AJV8 Gen 111 direct injection petrol V8 that is being developed by RSR as, amongst other factors, ALMS rules don't favor the use of forced induction engines. It was in 1993 that the GT category was first formed for the 24 hour race and Jaguar unveiled the XJ 220C to compete. Three cars were entered and No 50 completed 306 laps (2585 miles for an average speed of 107 mph) to win the category. I was there in 1993 and was thrilled with this result. We wish RSR good fortune.

Ken Jardine, the President of the Solway Jaguar Club, England came to visit friends in Doylestown during the month of May. 


Motoring through the vineyards
