

### The Prez Sez June 2011

Our Concours d'Elegance at the Oakbourne Mansion was held under near perfect weather on Satur-

day, June 4<sup>th</sup> which resulted in a record number of 65 pre-registered Jaguars combined with an additional 5 post entrants for a total of 70 vehicles. The 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the production of the XKE type Jaguars was recognized by presenting each of the those owners that entered, a personalized plaque, with his name, type of Jaguar, the build date, VIN and color of his vehicle, to commemorate the occasion. The following day, a 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration of the XKE-type Jaguars was held at the Desmond Hotel and Conference Center. The weather over the weekend was ideal for this most special occasion which elated the chairmen of both activities. More on this in another article in this issue.

As Chairman of the Concours I realized that we would have a lot of "Post Entries" and in order to avoid a lot of confusion with judging assignments, told Pauline Craig that they would be entered as "Display Only." We already had 65 pre-registered vehicles which was a record number and included 26 E-types, also a record! The big advantage of the Oakbourne is the spacious grounds which allows the addition of Post Entries -and they came! Normally it's the "driver condition" Jaguar taking advantage of good weather and placing them in a display category is no problem, but you can't place a champion car in the Display Class, especially if they've travelled a good long distance. This resulted in a total of 74 beautiful Jaguars and one last minute "Barn Find" that added a lot of interest contrasting it's condition with the other Jags.

What makes this event unique is the combining of all the British Marques to form a show called "Cars Of England." The Jaguars are separated in an area near the Mansion to form a JCNA sanctioned Concours d' Elegance Division with the remaining grounds covered with the other British vehicles and motor bikes! An awesome sight to the spectators and entrants alike.

The entrant's vehicles started lining up well before 8:30 AM when the field was scheduled to open. The registration tent was occupied and ready to distribute the Entrant's Envelopes while waiting for the O.V. (Operation Verification) personnel to arrive,

and then parking their vehicles on the field to define the starting points of a particular class.

**Kurt Rappold,** as Chief Judge conferred with me a couple of days before, to review the layout of the location of the pre-registered vehicles. It was agreed to keep all the E-types in one single line regardless of their Division,- Champion or Driven. It not only worked out well, and with XKE type vehicles grouped together, provided a pleasing display! It was also designed as a tribute to the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary commemoration.

Speaking of "Parkers," I try and assign the "Youth Enthusiasts" to this task! Because we have parking available for the general public, the DVJC group has an obligation to provide people for that purpose. Grant Olson and Gunnar Sjoreen worked the parking at the direction of the DVTC to handle that responsibility. Next year I'm hoping to have them act as Novice Judges, if they can attend the judging schools that will be scheduled. Jeffery Dement, a Y.E.,did attend a judging school this year and served as a Novice judge. It's important to develop the interest of younger members as any organization knows only too well!

I'm working a plan to form a Youth Enthusiast group to become integral with most of our future activities.

I also want to thank our Judges and registration personnel that did a great job serving on the Concours staff. Brian Craig our club's Webmaster for registering the entrants, Pauline Craig in Charge of the Registration Booth, assisted by Kathy Tubbs, Clara Saxton and Pat Rappold. Also, Clara **Saxton** who tabulated the winners, Kurt Rappold my Chief Judge assisted by Steve Kress. Don Mullin, my perennial assistant in helping me layout the field, Rich Rosen ,Alex Giacobetti and Jim Sjoreen who guided the entrants to their parking places. The Operation Verification judges, Ann Perry, and Steve Kress, after doing that task, continued to judge the remainder cars assigned to them. A total of 20 judges that did an exemplary job in judging an unusual number of Entries. I know I didn't mention some of you, but as the saying goes, "you know who you are." and so do I, and appreciate your efforts.

Ralph Miller from the Susquehanna Valley Club that had volunteered to judge at our Concours. We in turn support them with our judges.

I'm never surprised at the number of cars that enter our Concours, and score 100 points. I suspect in the past too much attention was focused on finding "something", no matter how insignificant, to deduct points. I think the category of defining the area where dirt is found with a brief description on the score sheet, eliminated quite a bit of arbitrary deductions. When you're very close to the 100 point category, you should only lose points for non- authentic items, poor presentation, (obvious lack of removing foreign objects or oil leakage) not incidental dirt. "Like it came from the factory" did include perhaps, dirt that the dealer missed. An experienced judge can make that determination!

That's why I'm always proud to announce the 100 point winners. They are perennial in nature and score 100 points at various Concours This year I selected those entrants to park in front and close to the unique water tower structure as a place of honor to signify their accomplishments.

The Best of Show Award was won by Nigel Payne, a first time entrant and new member, for his rare and Preservation vehicle, an 1977 XJ6 C coupe with a right hand drive! I suppose the Jaguar aficio-

nados appreciated it's uniqueness when voting for a rarely seen vehicle. Nigel also took 1<sup>st</sup> in his class.

The Longest Distance Award had two winners, a First place to Lan & Debbie Sims from the Jag Club of Central Ohio, followed closely in distance by Terry Smith from the Jag Club of Pittsburgh won second place. I must mention the perennial winner for this award is Jim Phillips from the Greater Buffalo Club who did not enter this year and we hope it was not because of health reasons.

As for the remaining Awards of the Champion, Driven Division and Special Awards, a separate listing of all the winners and their scores is inserted on page 10. All the judged entrants will be receiving their score sheet by mail in the next ten days.



From the Susquehanna Club were perpetual 100 pointers John & Linda Spillman with their Green XK 150S. Then did you see Mac & Linda Holt's Regency Red 1962 MK 2. Beautiful...earning 100 points. They are from the Nation's Capital Jaguar Owner's Club. All the above were in the Champion Class. In the Driven Class perfect 10's were scored by Gerald and & Naoma Ellison with their XK 140 from the Carolina Jaguar Club and Robert & Debbie Kimball with their 2003 XKR OTS from the Nation's Capital Club. Ted Shope with his 2007 XK convertible was also a perfect 10. I am sure you will have noticed that all but one of these perfect scores were won by cars from other clubs. How delighted we are to welcome you and how pleased we are that you joined us to make our event a success. Thank you also to all the other contestants who entered from other clubs and were not mentioned above.

I am slightly embarrassed to tell you this....but only slightly. For 11 days before the Concours Mo & I were visiting with relatives in Connecticut. 26 of them celebrat-

ing a very significant birthday. Our 2007 XK Coupe was with us. Small grand children were taken for rides. Sticky fingers gripped internal parts. Pop corn was spilled. Chocolate, despite dire warnings, was dispensed. Noses dripped. It was fun. Eldest son hit a pot hole at high speed. These low profile tires don't like that. 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### **River Horse Brewery Scenic Tour**

We arrived at the Yardley Inn's parking lot with just a few minutes to spare before my 4:00 deadline. (I would like to thank Susan for allowing me to have a "spirited" drive up route 295 in New Jersey so not to be to late.) Most every one was quite ready to depart when we arrived. One such Individual was clever enough to utilize the Yardley Inn's Bar for a pint while waiting the rest of our group to arrive.

The skies looked a bit threatening and a few drops of ran fell just as we were departing. I believe we were about a dozen or so cars winding our way up the country-side with a spectacular view of the Delaware River to our right traveling trough farmland with newly sprouted green leaves blanketing the countryside Driving through intermittent showers on a beautiful spring day with my fellow Jaguar club members.

After our thirst was quenched Rob took us into the manufacturing area where he showed us the brewery process. We tasted and smelled the ingredients that are used to make the different types of beer, from a smooth lager to a rich hoppy type beer. Did you know it takes only four ingredients to make beer?

The tour took us to the bottling operation were Rob explained that it was the hardest part of the whole brewery process, primarily due to physical handling of the empty bottles that are loaded into the bottling machinery. That cleans the bottles, fills, caps and labels at a rate of about one per second. Each of these bottles are then picked up by hand and put in a box and stacked for shipment. I found it impressive that each of the eight employees at the River horse Brewery helps with every step of making beer from cleaning and sanitizing the large vats, bottling the beer and giving tours.

At the end of the tour we all went our separate ways mostly staying in the Lambertville / New Hope area to enjoy one of the great restaurants in the local community.

I discussed having similar events with a few of the participants that will comprise of a short drive to a destination that would involve drinks and food. I thank everyone that participated. I personally enjoyed myself because we had a great number of cars, a wonderful group of fun people and a short event that didn't take up the entire day.

On behalf of the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club I would like to thank Rob from the River Horse Brewery for accommodating our group with the informative and entertaining private tour of the brewery and of course, the outstanding beer!

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
