

The Prez Sez October 2011

When speaking with a few our members at the Buckingham Car Show about our Pumpkin Run, they appeared to show interest. I promised

I'd get them more information. Then after the E-mail message sent to our members by Brian Craig our Editor, for advance notice, I decided I should include a description from the standpoint of any member wishing to participate but wanting to know what's involved, before making a commitment.

Dear Rookies:

The Northeast Rally Club that sponsors this event has its headquarters in Millsboro, Delaware and sponsors a three day road rally that meets the sanction requirements of the JCNA for those who participate for that reason. I've always tried in past articles to make people aware that this is a **Rally for everyone** wishing to do a Time, Speed, Distance Rally that involves something more challenging than an afternoon drive and have more fun!

When trying to explain, to our folks at the Car Show, it sounded a bit involved, requiring a weekend of their time and a **compatible** associate to navigate. I try and sell the idea that it's like a mini vacation, where you have a great opportunity to spend time with other DVJC members, driving in a professionally organized rally, meeting people who own and operate a wide variety of cars and the camaraderie that is present when sharing your rally experiences at the end of the day, which are sometimes hilarious!

It's a combination of driving, competing, having fun, and in addition being well fed before, during and after each component of the rally.

Our Pumpkin Run Rally is Sponsored by the **Northeast Rally Club**, for the benefit of the Volunteer Fire Company of Millsboro. The money from the entrant's fees, and various sponsors, is a source of revenue from the Rallies they sponsor. They have a website <u>www.northeast</u>rallyclub.com

The TS Rally means Time and Speed. It's the time it takes driving at various speeds to travel the distance of the course. It requires two people, a Driver and Navigator. It's not restricted to any one Marque and any vehicle chosen to enter that meets the safety inspection and requirements of the Sponsor, is accepted. There are cars that date from 1911 thru the present date. They all follow the same instructions with a time handicap for the early vehicles. There are three different classes, but you'll be classified as a **"Rookie**"

So- I thought I'd outline what constitutes your involvement with a little more detail than, "Try It You'll Like it!" with the hopes that you won't "Forget about it!" Well, the first thing is to **select a compatible partner**, someone willing to accept the challenge and exchange of instructions (orders) for a weekend of rallying. Your selection it might be helpful for one with the experience of those afternoon fun rallies with a meal at the end to appease ruffled feathers! Or a more risky selection, based on the sheer enthusiasm of your partner.

O.K. Now that you've formed a team, both start generating interest by reading my description **first**, rather than those on the NERC website oriented with rules and techniques which you can read later. Now you're ready to review the entrance form found in this issue of the Purr for the cost and requirements.

Along with the Entrance Fee, join the NERC (go to <u>www.northeastrallyclub.com</u> scroll down left column of choices and click on Club Membership.) take advantage of a \$30 discount and receive future notices of events. However, joining is not required. Then make reservations for a Friday and Saturday night, at the "Host Hotel". You'll checkout on Sunday before starting to Rally that morning.

Plan to arrive Friday in time to have your car inspected, receive a magnetic number I.D.sticker for each door and take your paperwork and driver's license to the check-in desk at the Fire Hall. Pick up your Instruction Book and a bag full of goodies! Socialize over lunch followed by the Rally Master's description of every direction listed in the Instruction Book and answer any questions to clear up anything that isn't clear. There will be plenty, so don't be afraid to ask. If you're still not clear you'll have a chance to ask the Rally Master later, who will be glad to help. If not the Rally Master, ask one of your peers they'll be only too glad to help. It's important to make sure you understand what you're to do before leaving! It will give you a feeling of confidence before your ready to start.

O.K. You'll synchronize your time piece (a wall clock with a sweep second hand) with the Master Clock. Remember, your Navigator is in charge! Check your assigned starting time and ask your Navigator if you're "ready to roll"! Just leave on your scheduled time and you'll arrive at the start of the timed portion of the Rally in plenty of time. Don't worry about seeing others leaving that are scheduled after you, It's "off the clock time" and they want to get to the starting point early. Each vehicle is scheduled to leave at one minute intervals at their scheduled departure time.

Your instructions will have you driving a distance

to allow your tires to warm up, then continue on a **Speed-ometer Calibration course** with a "mark" at every mile to compare your time and distance with the measured distance. If it's different, you can adjust your speed during the Rally accordingly. All during this time, you'll be heading toward the starting point of the **timed portion of the Rally.** It will be confirmed that you've arrived, not only by the instruction, but the cars that you saw leave early, that are waiting there for their turn to start.

Check your list for the car # scheduled **before you** and note that you have exactly **one minute** to depart after them. If you're not sure when it's your turn to leave, don't be afraid to ask the other drivers, they'll be only too glad to help you to your correct starting position.

You'll note that most drivers start approaching the start point a ways back, so that they're at the required speed as they cross it. You should do the same.

You're now **"on the clock"** and instructions must be followed explicitly, trying your best **not** to take a wrong turn. The instructions are **not** intended to trick you, and by being observant, you'll most likely **stay on course**. This is the most important factor during the whole Rally because if you miss a turn, you'll have to back-track! Forget about the time you lost during that leg between two check points. Don't worry! You have a chance to have that one eliminated at the end, so as not to affect your entire Rally score! The Rally has four or five secretly located check points that mark your time as you cross. A tip for the Navigator is to "check off"each instruction immediately after it's completed. I can't tell you enough how devastating this is, not to do so and realize you've done that instruction once before!

Your recorded time is compared to the specified time allowed for that leg, the difference is your error. At the end of the Rally they add up all those differences to determine your overall score. There are other factors entered before that determination. As I mentioned, you have the opportunity to cancel out your worst leg, so as not to let that "blow" your whole effort.

As you return back to the Firehouse you gather around with the Jag members waiting for others to finish, and swapping stories while waiting for the results to be posted. This is a real fun time, especially over a meal prepared by the Ladies Auxiliary who are great cooks. The results are distributed during the meal and eating the **dessert** helps with any disappointment, you might experience.

When things settle down, the Rally Master will have your new Booklet of Instructions and departure assignment times for Saturday. Then a repeat of clarifying the new Book of Instructions for Saturday. With the experience of Friday, you'll have a much better idea of what's happening and will vow not to repeat mistakes. Or perhaps not to repeat your vows. Considerate it a "New Day", relax and prepare for new challenges!

The Rally is designed for a "pit stop" it seems, at the "appropo" time and you'll know when that is. The morning Rally ends with a nice luncheon, prepared by the people at your mid day stop. It gives you time to stretch and get ready for the afternoon Rally. The Instruction Book tells you to calculate your departure time, but as a **"Rookie**", you may be in doubt. I would check to confirm with the car scheduled before you, or any experienced driver. **It's important to start on time**, for this is considered an independent second Rally and your start time is critical.

Now that your "fed and bled" the afternoon Rally will seem quicker if you remember that upon your return, you'll be treated to a marvelous Buffett of home cookin' By the "Ladies Auxiliary". In fact, they provide a great breakfast before each Rally and a brunch after returning from the Sunday run, which will allow time for announcing the overall Rally winners in each class.

The Jaguar entrants have an additional group of winners for those that wish to be recorded by the JCNA for National Competion. Kurt Rappold serves as our **Jaguar Rally Master** and keeps track of the scores of our entrants. Kurt is a good resource person for you during the Rally weekend in addition to any of our experienced members. Perhaps pick one as your mentor.

After your return from Sunday's Rally, one of the biggest thrills you will experience is to be **announced as a winner!** Especially as a'Rookie"!. Including the Professional Class, everyone has an equal chance of "screwin" up" -or **not**, and can be a winner, for a good deal of **luck** is involved, which some rally members will attribute as skill.

This type of event is all about the challenges of driving in a well organized Time, Speed Distance Rally, the camaraderie of the participants, the good food and having more fun than you imagined driving your Jaguar! And most of all, contributing to an essential activity such as The Volunteer Fire Company of Millsboro.

"So- Try it, you'll like it!"

"SO I SAID TO LADY SUSIE AND SIR STIRLING"

YES it's true!.... I had the pleasure of eating dinner with Sir Stirling Moss and his wife Lady Susie on Friday night September 23rd together with Mo and club members Marte & John Murphy at the reception for the Santa Fe Concorso. Marte and John have a beautiful home in Santa Fe and they had invited us to visit with them for two weeks. We had all tested the viability of a two week stay together a few years back by taking a two week cruise from Southampton, England to St Petersburg, Russia which worked out exceptionally well spending the days together, eating and drinking together and repairing to our separate cabins when solitude demanded. The Santa Fe house contained a "Casita" or guest quarters consisting of a bedroom with TV and sitting room which included TV, fridge, sink, land phone, kettle and lots of goodies to eat & drink, a lot more luxury than our cabin on the Queen Victoria. The major difference of course was that Marte had to be the chef at which she excelled.

One weekend we did a 1,000 mile round trip to the Grand Canyon. The trip there and back was a delight seeing all those mountains and desert where so many battles of those "Cowboy and Indian" movies were made. Of course the Canyon is thrilling to behold. Another day we went to Los Alamos and visited the museum which described in great detail the times when the Atomic bomb was formulated and built there. One thing I did not know; we only had two bombs so it was a good thing the Japanese surrendered after the second bomb was dropped!

Now if you did not know John Murphy is a car man extraordinary. His large garage not only contains a cold room for wine and fur coats but also a 1934 V8 Ford Phaeton, a 1937 2 ¹/₂ liter SS 100, an electric replica of the one and only Jaguar XJ 13 shared with John's GMC SUV and



Marte's BMW, for which she is forgiven, as there is no Jaguar dealer in Santa Fe. John, as we have covered in the Purr, has been working on the XJ 13 for some time now. The

electric motor and batteries are installed in the rear behind the seats. The dash board and instruments are there including a glove box with hinged wooden door signed by both Norman Dewis and Stirling Moss. There are no windows or lights yet and work has to be completed on the body, for ease of entry & exit, before being painted. "Let's go for a ride, " said John, " you get in by stepping over the door, standing on the seats and sliding down. Now getting out could be difficult!" She started first go and the electric motor was whirring! Smooth and powerful, no rattles or vibration, just a delightful sensation of reserves of power when needed. The XJ 13 handled without deviation in a straight line and complete control round the bends. Exhilarating!!! My first drive in an electric car. It must be the way of the future. Getting out was no problem as I just bent my old body to the task. What an amazing feat John has accomplished. He is truly talented. Such an outstanding looking Jaguar. It is said to be the most beautiful Jaguar ever built.

The Santa Fe Concorso is held over three days at the legendry La Mesita equestrian property. On the Friday there was a reception the highlight of which was a discussion of competition driving by international racing legends Bobby Allison, Bob Bondurant, Sir Stirling Moss and Al Unser. To travel the 22 miles to the event the 1934 Ford Phaeton



was selected. In spotless condition this 77 year old car performed as if just released from the factory onto the road. Amazingly comfortable we did the distance as though transported in elegant style.

John spotted Sir Stirling, and Lady Susie and their two minders sat at a table for eight. He asked if we may join them so we did. The conversation ranged over many subjects: "How were his legs after his fall last year down an Elevator shaft at his home ?" "I am very well, thank you" "What do you think of today's F1 race drivers?" "They are all brilliant...perhaps Vettel and Alonso are the best." He volunteered that "if you are going to have a crash at 180 miles an hour go into it backwards & save your body." I had taken with me a Pewter model of Jaguar C-Type # 20. This car won Le Mans in 1951. Sir Stirling signed it for me. So passed a most wonderful evening with Lady Susie giving me a good night kiss on both cheeks (That's the first time that I have been kissed by a real Lady! The old joke is "That's no lady, that's my wife!).

AS a 2010 winner with his 1937 SS100 John drove it to the show with me as passenger and parked it with the previous year's winners. On the Sunday it received a huge amount of attention. The hood was taken down for the journey

home. I should have known when John put on his goggles...he took this 74 year old racer up to 75 mph on the speedo. Wind whistling through my hair. Holding onto my glasses & tears running from my eyes. It was my greatest drive in a Jaguar. WHEW!!

As you can imagine there were many great cars at the event including a 1996 McClaren F1, a 2012 McClaren MP4-12C Rolling Chassis, a 1978 Lotus 79/1 "John Player Special" F1 Race Car, a Honker 11 Can-Am Race Car, a 1966 Chaparral 2E Can-Am race Car, a 1959 Watson "Simonize Special #16' Indy Roadster, a 1956 Lincoln Continental Mark 11, a 2012 Bugatti Veyron Super Sport top speed 250 mph, a 1927 Kissel "Gold Bug" Speedster Model 8-75, a 1938 SS Jaguar 2.5 litre Drop Head Coupe, a 1932 Lincoln KB Boat Tail Speedster and so on and on. The show also featured classic bicycles and motor cycles including the 1920 Indian used by Burt Monro, the New Zealander, who set a motorcycle-speed record at the Bonneville Salt Flats in 1967. Munro was portraved by Anthony Hopkins in the 2005 film "The World's Fastest Indian." A magical three days and wonderful two weeks.

YES IT ACTUALLY HAPPENED AT LAST

You must have already heard. Jaguar actually did announce and show the Concept C-X16 at the Frankfurt Show in September. "The long hood, the tight haunches. The Curves. From the proportions to the power, no car company creates a coupe quite the way Jaguar does," so says Autoweek. To me there is a resemblance to the present XK but it is 175 in compared to 188.7 in for the XK. Wheelbase is 103 in compared to 108.3. Both cars are 52 high. It is powered by a 375-hp, 332-lb-ft, super charged 3.0 liter V6 plus a 94-hp, 173-lb-ft electric motor, with an eight-speed automatic gearbox, stop/start and KERS. There is no word if or when it will go into production

There were many concepts at the show. The competition was fierce but the C-X16 was judged The Best In Show. Of course we are not surprised because we know what's best!!!



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
