GRACE...SPACE...PACE

Three immortal words someone dreamt up in Jaguar in the 1950's. How well they described the spirit of the product then and also of the offerings since and today. One of the most sensational was brought to my attention this week when my grandson, Christian, sent me an article which featured a badly crumpled XJ 220. To see such a beautiful creation in metal (aluminium) so brutally crushed just illustrated more

vividly the beauty of the original design.
The 20th

The 20th anniversary of the XJ 220 is this year. It was maintained



by Jaguar that the XJ220 was no more than a design study until December 1989, when it revealed plans to put it into production in limited numbers by Jaguar



Sport Limited, owned jointly by Jaguar and Tom Walkinshaw Racing. (TWR). A production run at their factory in Bloxham, Oxfordshire, England of 220 cars was under-

taken, with a provision to go to 350 if there was a demand. In place of of the V12 engine, the production XJ220 had a road-going version of the V6 turbo used in the XJR 10 and XJR 11, and rear wheel drive only. 0 to 60 mph was 4.0 seconds with a top speed of plus 200mph. The price had escalated to \$450,000! The classic car bubble at the time collapsed as did prices. The 350 "firm orders" Jaguar had disappeared and in the end only 280 XJ 220's were made.

A concept XJ220 was seen at the Birmingham Motor Show in 1990 drawing huge crowds and rave reviews from the media. I saw this concept at this show and was captivated by its stunning presence.

Further development was the racing version known as

the XJ220C. This version of the car was hailed as "Jaguars Le Mans racer" and entered for the 1993 event. Hopes for its performance were muted with perhaps a finish in 5th or 6th place in its class as the competition from Porsche, Lotus and others was fierce. Don't forget that in 1988 and 1990 XJR racers had pulled off outright victory and learning from Sir William Lyons, who never entered any race without a reasonable expectations of victory, the team for the XJ220C only promoted a moderate performance as it had not been specifically conceived for competition. The major concern was endurance in such a 24 hour race as there had not been the opportunity to test the car over hours of driving.

Standing just above the pits for the 1993 race I could see the Jaguars waiting for the start. Yes...I was there. Painted in British Racing Green, decals for Jaguar, TWR Racing, Unipart, and the Union Jack flag adorned the body with the number 50 distinguishing one of the team cars. It was then that I fully realized the difference between the cars that originated from road cars and those that were specifically were designed for racing. Example Porsche 911 as the road car and the Nissan race car. The major impact on me as the race progressed was the noise. The high pitched "screeching" of the race cars as they catapulted from the pits is something that I have not experienced since. Also as they thundered past the stands screaming in unison as strained to beat each other

I was hoping to go to Lime Rock with club member Alex La Roche this Labor weekend and having made the commitment feel very bad that I had to withdraw and bow to managements demands that we spend the weekend with her sister in Connecticut for a celebration of her birthday. I was hoping to hear that special noise again. Seeing the race as it developed opens your eyes and senses to the huge demands made on drivers and machines as the afternoon hours drag on into night time and the race track is illuminated from head lights. The majority of racers are exceeding 200mph!! Also you lose the position of each car as the racers pass and re-pass. As the night wears on and the chill night air penetrates your bones and one of the Jaguar team returns to the pits for good and we

see all the crew gathered round it lost in animated discussion. "Yes I will have another beer and a burger to celebrate that number 50 is still running". By dawns light I see that the number of participants has been reduced because of mechanical failure or have crashed but #50 is still there. I am assured that it is doing well. The most striking impression I have of the XJ220C as it travels down the straight in front of the stands is it looks ponderous. Yes ponderous! In comparison to the specifically designed race cars screaming by at nearly 200mph it looks ponderous. So where is the Pace and the Grace I cry!

The answer "Oh you of little faith. XJ 220C in its first major race has won its group against all that lightening opposition " It is mid afternoon and time for another beer & burger and a salute to the XJ 220C. It sits in the pits before me covered in dirt but even so its British Racing Green and "50 Jaguar" shines through. At rest no better three words describe a winner "GRACE...SPACE...PACE"






