VISIT TO A JAGUAR SANCTUARY

In early December Mo and I travelled to Bushkill Township. to visit with DVJC members Ana and Alex LaRoche at their magnificent home set in acres of woodlands and featuring a circular pond, which has an Island situated in the middle. Nestled, of course, in the trees there is a multi station garage as they have managed to accumulate a serious number of vehicles. But first we had to explore this lovely home. Ana took us into her perfect kitchen where she had laid out a variety of tasty dishes, for we were not the only visitors invited that day, but we were early arrivals by special arrangement so I was able to explore his special treasures. But first a taste of some of the tempting dishes....delicious! Now fortified for the mental treat.

Some of you may recall that I had one thousand model Jaguars before I sold the majority of them at auction. My total collection was 6,000 miniature vehicles. I had accumulated them over many years and had carted them all

around the world. My intent was to build glass cases and exhibit them every but time I was about to start we moved home again. In the end it never got and done

they all went to the same auction as the Jag models. Now Ana and Alex have completed my dream. They also collect model Jaguars. I was led into Alex's "Home Office" just off the Kitchen and Family room. Low and behold there they were behind glass and neatly set out from models of the earliest cars filling walls to four sides of the room. Successive eras followed. E.G. SS1 was followed by SS 100 and those by Mk IV & V. There was not just one model by era but many. If a manufacturer made a SS 100 in blue and red and yellow & then by scale 1/43 or 1/18 etc Alex had just about all of them. The best part was that the models were not crushed together but given proper space to show their lines and sculpture. Below and above the glass cases were cupboards to store the boxes the manufacturer housed the models in when sold. Don't forget the golden rule. "If you have the original box the model is double in value" Also all duplicates were housed there too and are being considered for sale.

Was that the end NO WAY! I was led downstairs into the basement, where they had recently added replicas of this "home office". It was here that Alex showed me that each model had been assigned its own number which was then stored in his computer with the detail of model type, year, color, where purchased and amount paid. Two photographs of each model have also been captured. A complete catalogue is their ultimate goal, but that may take some time to fully compose. With cupboards top and bottom in the same luxurious cherry wood. But were we done...NO. There was a third room which finished with today's XF/ XK/XJ and to complete the range a "Spark" model made by Minimax of the 2010 Concept C-X75. Stunning. Also it was here that Alex had a display of all the Jaguar Formula 1 cars together with a number of other collectibles. To my surprise and delight Alex then presented me with one of those small gift carrier bags which was certainly big enough to contain that superb C-X75 model. THANK YOU.

Having completed the models we then viewed the real thing. In the garage attached to the house there were of course their two 2005 X-Type Wagons. One for each of them. Then to the garage in the woods. This housed a 1973 Lotus Elan vintage racer, which had belonged to his Father, a 1975 XJ12C, a 1967 420, a 1969 E-Type Coupe, a 1978 Ford Econoline conversion van, and Ana's 2001 Hyundai. Alex also has recently acquired a 1948 MK IV DHC and a 1949 Mk. V DHC, which are not yet housed on home premises but he intends to build another garage to bring them home. Will it not be a great day when they bring them to the annual Concours. It is very rare that we see these pushrod Jags.

Would you say Alex is hooked on Jaguar? Is that a YES!!!! You bet he is and in a convincing way. That was the end of the tour so it was back to the kitchen and more of Ana's meatballs, shrimp, cheese etc not to mention the deserts. Lovely Ana. Thank you. A memorable visit so much enjoyed. Sitting in front of me I have a special edition model of a Scalextric Jaguar XKR GT 3 limited edition NSCC 30th Anniversary, BRG and lots of decals, which I did not see among the 1,200+ models. I wonder what Alex would bid for it???? Extremely rare!!!

Most importantly Ana and Alex are two of the younger club members. Not a grey hair to be seen! So it is extremely encouraging to see them involved in the Jaguar brand and know that they are the next generation to carry the club and Jaguar name forward. The future is in good hands. We must work at getting more members in their

On January 3rd Pauline and I reluctantly said a final farewell to our 2003 X-Type. It was used as a trade for our daughter's new Hyundai Genesis coupe. The paint still had its luster but there were noticeable signs of wear and tear after 95,885 miles. A front end accident resulted in the hood being not just right, a recent parking lot mishap resulted in a small dent and missing left side marker light, the defroster was ineffective except for a small section of windshield, and the driveline noises were getting louder. In addition it was one of three cars in a two person family and spent a lot of time sitting idle while the insurance premiums continued on unabated. Pauline and I loved this car and enjoyed many wonderful experiences comfortably ensconced in its cabin. We both agreed it was a joy to see, especially in its wonderful Phoenix Red covering. However, as reluctant as we were, the time had come to part ways.

In the last months of 2002 we were looking for a new car. Our Pontiac Grand Am was a very nice car but we just weren't happy. We missed the all wheel drive of our previous Blazer and had experienced some difficulty in the snow. We were leaning toward a Ford Explorer when we went shopping at the Plymouth Meeting Mall. On display was a vehicle instantly recognizable as a Jaguar. Knowing I could not afford such a car but drawn to its handsome appearance I wandered over to look at this object of desire. The sticker gave me a shock. Here was a car comparable in price to the Explorer, it had all wheel drive, and it was available with a manual gear box, our preferred transmission. Here was a car that was a joy to see, functional, affordable, and appeared as though it would be fun to drive. Additionally, and not trivially, it was a JAGUAR!

I did some research and learned much about this new offering from Jaguar. Knowing full well it was a Ford controlled product built around a Ford Mondeo I went to The Great Britains. A test drive increased

my interest but I didn't want to make a snap decision. More research, test drives of alternative cars, another test drive, and discussion with Pauline. I discussed with Pauline that fact that some of the other cars we considered would probably be less trouble, more reliable, etc., etc., but the Jaguar looked like a JAGUAR!! Without doubt it was the best looking car we had under consid-

eration. Additionally, it was guaranteed for 4 years or 50,000 miles and routine service was included. On December 30, 2012, we returned to The Great Britains. They had two X-Types available, one in BRG and one in Phoenix Red. We wanted a moon roof and that eliminated the green car. I thought the red was a little flashy but it had the equipment we preferred. One option it had was heated seats. Pauline's initial reaction to that was, "I don't care about heated seats, why do we have to pay for that?" Shortly after taking delivery that changed to, "I'll never buy another car without them."

The next day we drove to Ocean City, New Jersey, to visit daughter Monica and enjoy New Years Eve festivities. I thought I'd made a terrible mistake as the car's ride was very hard. We felt every expansion joint on the Atlantic City Expressway. When we returned home on January 1, 2003, I check the tire pressure. 60 psi!!! When I adjusted the tire to the recommended specifications the personality of the car changed positively. I later inquired about this at the dealership and was informed they keep the tire pressure high while in storage to mitigate flat spots on the tires. They forgot to adjust that before turning the car over to us.

In the course of researching the X-Type I learned about the Jaguar Club of North America and the local Delaware Valley Jaguar Club. Pauline and I discussed it and, on a whim, decided to join to see what was involved. Shortly thereafter we received an invitation to test drive the new XJ Jaguars at Summit Point, West Virginia. I made the trip with son John-Paul. On May 16, 2003, we arrived at the track and met Mike Tate, Paul Racette, and Jim Shields. We were warmly received and enjoyed both the driving experience and the conversation with fellow DVJC members. In spite of this positive experience we were slow to get involved with club activities.

In July, 2003, we drove the X-Type to the Dallas, Texas area to visit Pauline's sister. Pauline was nice enough to let me do all the driving and I enjoyed every minute of it. While we had taken trips of 100 or so miles we had no idea how the car would be on an extended journey. We now knew it would be totally enjoyable.

On February 15, 2004, we attended our first DVJC social event at the Desmond Hotel. We were a little overwhelmed and basically stayed in the background. We enjoyed seeing the other Jaguars and our conversations with some of those present but for the most part everyone seemed to be talking to others they knew. Our next outing was the Fall Foliage Tour on October 24, 2004. We met at the home of Al Pincus. Here we had an op-

portunity to meet DVJC members and actually spend some time getting to know some people. Pauline immediately took to Phyllis Mullin and they had a very enjoyable conversation. Others were equally welcoming. We drove home wanting to experience more of the club's hospitality.

December 5, 2004, was our first Holiday Party at the Whitemarsh Valley Country Club. The first person with whom we came in contact was Kit Racette. She provided the warmest welcome, made sure we knew what was happening, and introduced us to other club members. Kurt Rappold was the club president and we had our first real discussion with him at this event. Kurt's enthusiasm was infectious. He encouraged us to participate on all the activities including the rallies. We promised to consider those things but were non-committal. Little did we know Kurt had worked his magic.

During 2005 the X-Type took us many wonderful places. It also transported us to the DVJC Social at The Desmond, a lunch at The Moshulu, another Fall Foliage Tour, and another Holiday Party. This particular event was interesting because it had snowed. The number of Jaguars present was limited as some of the members were understandably reluctant to expose their prized possessions to the elements. However, the X-Type owners (we were not the only ones at this point) were wonderfully represented.

2006 marked out total immersion into club activities. The X-Type made an appearance at the Social on March 19th. On June 4th our lovely Jaguar carried us on to the Rankokus Indian Reservation for the Concours d'Elegance. As the X-Type was our daily driver (read Pauline's daily driver) we entered in the driven class. In spite of the fact that we weren't as prepared as many of the participants we took home a first place trophy. Being the only X-Type present made that a little easier. We also participated in the activities at New Hope and Kendalwood. The X-Type also maneuvered its way around its first slalom course on July 29th. While it posted respectable times it was no match for the driving skills of the likes of Steve Kress, Rich Rosen, and others who obviously knew their car's capabilities.

Kurt Rappold's persistent encouragement also took hold in 2006. 
