MORE ON THE XE INTRODUCTION

Jaguar World magazine reported that part of the introduction of the XE was the display of the "Perfect Ten" of Jaguar's past models. The cars were chosen by a trio of experts: AC/DC lead singer and car enthusiast Brian Johnson, the founder of Goodwood Festival of Speed and Revival, Lord March, and Jaguar's Director of design, Ian Callum. The chosen top ten are (see p. 10 for photos):-

- 1 SS 100. Jaguar's first 100 mph production car.
- 2 XK 120 registration NUB 120: Driven by Ian Appleyard and Pat Lyons (daughter of Sir William Lyons) to numerous rally wins in the Fifties, in-

cluding the Alpine Rallye des Alpes in 1950 and 1951

- 3 C- type, registration NDU 289: Original entry in the 1953 Mille Miglia and one of just 54 cars built
- 4 D type registration 393 RW: This penultimate D-type won the 12 hours race at Reims, driven by Hamilton and Bueb.
- 5 Mk 2: The legendary sporting sedan for which Jaguar has become globally renowned. (The 420 is better...MJT)

- 6 E-type registration 77 RW: The earliest surviving E-type roadster, which was driven overnight by Norman Dewis to Geneva for its Motor Show debut.
- 7 XJ 13: The XJ 13 was built for but never raced at Le Mans and was designed by Malcolm Sayer. Just one was made.
- 8 XJ6 S1: Car of the year when launched in 1968 and still considered by many to be the best sedan in

the world.

9 TWR XJ-S: Tom Walkinshaw's TWR outfit returned Jaguar to the podium with the racing version of the legendry XJ-S winning the European Touring Car Championship.

10 XJR-9: This very car won Le Mans in 1998, Jaguars first since 1957

Commenting on his perfect Jaguar, Lord March said "For me it has to be the D-type. Way ahead of its time, the D-type looks as good to day as it did when it was first revealed 60 years ago." Brian Johnson said, "The Jaguar C-type takes some beating for me. Its purity and speed are exceptional today, and must have been simply mind boggling in the early fifties." Ian Callum commented "The

shape of the C-type has a simplicity and purity that have rarely been bettered, and have helped form the beauty and elegance of so many subsequent Jaguar models. It's a gem."

So there you have it. What would be your best ten? The only omission I would quarrel with is that I would promote the XJ 13 as the best ever Jaguar! But the D and the C are

very special. Very cool! I have sat in both drivers seats and felt the chills run up my spine. If only I could have taken them for a spin. Don't forget that you can see both the C and D together with the SS100 at the Simeone Museum.

It was an amazing time in Jaguar history 1965 when Frank Weikle and others founded our club. They had many competitive triumphs behind them with the C and D type and the decade had seen the

glory of their exceptional product line-up – perhaps the best – the MK2 and MK2S, the MK VII and 420 and to top off the line, the E-type. At the time I was living in Liverpool only thinking of the Beatles and raising three young children. Never thinking that in five short years we would all be living in Jamaica and later in the USA. Jaguar Mk 2 Sedan was the hot mode of transport and I had a white with red interior 3.8 version never realizing that one day it would become a classic. I wonder if it now is someone's pride and joy turning up at shows for 100 points.

Think our founders could have met such giants as William Lyons, engine designer Bill Heynes, aerodynamicist Malcolm Sayer and test driver Norman Dewis. What a quartet very likely unmatched again in the industry. I certainly could have basked in their presence as I lived only a handful of miles from Coventry.

It is appropriate that on January 18th we will be cele-

brating our 50 years surviving the turbulence Jaguar has experienced during that time and nearly going out of business before being rescued by Ford and then experiencing the good fortune of being acquired by Tata. They now have the best product line up since those sixties classics of today... the XE, the XF, the XJ and the F-type nearly matching their cous-

ins of the sixties and now Jaguar has just released the 2015 with manual transmission. There is a lot to celebrate.

Don't leave making your reservation too late. With reservations made to date a capacity crowd is expected.

Also I have been delighted with the response for donations for the Silent Auctions BUT WE STILL NEED MORE as we have two auctions to facilitate. Please see what you can contribute please.

Going back to the 1930's I was very surprised to recently see an SS2. I have owned a 1934 SS1 which had a long low slung body. This SS2 I had never seen before. It was very compact and quite handsome and I

am hoping Brian Craig will include the photo I sent him. I also sent him a photo of a MK 2S -type that was taken at the club's recent breakfast. It is extremely rare to see one of these models even more so one parked next to my 420 where you could see the similarities. These two cars were the last two extensions of the much admired Mk2 sedans. From the front doors back they look identical. The MK2S front end is classic MK2 whereas the 420 front-end leans more to the MK X and 420G. The 420 has virtually the XJ6 S1 mechanicals including the fully independent rear suspension. This MK 2S had a Chevy engine replacing the XK 3.8 compared to the 420 with its 4.2 Liter version.

The Early Years—A Personal Chronicle of DVJC (installment 4)

Copied from the Monthly Newsletter, "The Scratchin' Post", November 1966:

"A CLUB BY ANY OTHER NAME"

When we organized our club in September 1965 we arbitrarily decided to call it the "Philadelphia Division of the Jaguar Clubs of North America, Inc." We have operated under this name for our first year, during which time the club has evolved from a nebulous idea to an active organization. At this writing it now contains 65 active members.

The advent of our first anniversary and our rapid growth over the past year have given us thought to reflect on just who we are and where we're going. One of the results of this reflection has been a decision made by the Executive Committee and approved by the general membership at our November 18th meeting to change the name of our organization .

This decision was prompted by several considerations. The name, "Philadelphia Division of the Jaguar Clubs of North America, Inc." is both misleading and awkward. While Philadelphia can be considered the hub of our operations, we are by no means a "Philadelphia" club. Our current membership list shows that we have 21 members residing in the city of Philadelphia and 44 members in the surrounding suburban area. Thus, "Philadelphia Division" is a restrictive misnomer.

The term "Delaware Valley," commonly accepted as meaning the area comprised of south-eastern Pennsylvania, southern New Jersey and Delaware, fits us more appropriately, so we have agreed to abandon "Philadelphia" for this more inclusive phrase. Further, we recognize the need for a more succinct phase which identifies us as a local entity. For these reasons we have changed the name of our organization to:

THE DELAWARE VALLEY JAGUAR CLUB

Lancaster Insurance Classic Motor Show

This was a UK visit with three other colleagues from the Delaware Valley Triumph Club, although one a Jaguar Shooting Brake owner also. I left a couple of days before them. I started out at Newark airport, with a visit to the disappointing United Airlines Club. Oh well. But good news, the flight was half-empty, three seats to myself! Arrived at the huge new Queens Terminal 2 at Heathrow which had just opened earlier this year, and after a lot and lot of walking for passport, baggage, and customs, wound up on the Heathrow Express to London, to catch a train to Gerrards Cross at Marvlebone station. There was a gorgeous beautiful sunrise orange sky. My friends live in Buckinghamshire, one hour north of London. On Wednesday, I explored London myself, visiting some new



places I have not been Bank to....the of England Museum. The Film London Museum. with "Bond in its Motion" exhibit, and most of all the James Bond cars (and

other gadgets) used in that series of movies. I also was fortunate with timing to visit the inspiring 888,246 red poppies surrounding the moat at the Tower of London for 11 November, Remembrance Day. I also got to spend Wednesday night at Pinewood Studios, home of the "James Bond" films (and also now filming the new "Star Wars"), watching a taping of a British comedy "Birds of a Feather", that my British mate is in charge of the the lighting for.

I met up with my colleagues at the Hertz car rental in Heathrow, as we picked up our Volvo diesel station wagon.

The first stop on our five day excursion was the Bugatti Trust in Grettan. We were welcomed with a spot of tea (or coffee), and some biscuits. We had a lovely tour by two older gentlemen, who are trustees of the museum. The museum is small, but has a multitude of car parts, engines, several cars, posters, painting, and a lifetime of the history of the innovative Ettore Bugatti. They have a huge archive, for those wanting to do detailed research. Upon leaving, they left us a few flyers, as well as a book "Bugatti The Designer" by Barry Eaglesfield, that we have added to the growing DVT library. As

we were leaving, we asked if we could go up the Prescott Hill Climb route, and they encouraged us to do so....but at a proper speed. No problem, with our rented Volvo diesel station-wagon, and the four of us, plus luggage in it. Needless to say, we did not break any hill climb records!

Then it was on to Kenilworth, for a dinner and an overnight at our usual Holiday Inn (aka in previous years, the "DeMontfort Hotel).

Friday morning we were up bright and early, had a quick beverage and food at the conveniently located Starbucks on the first floor of the hotel, and then it was off to Birmingham through my friends knowledge of the back roads to the massive NEC convention center. Once there, we parked in the "Press" area close to the halls, and off to get our 3-day Press credentials, from the office for the "Lancaster Insurance Classic Motor Show".

Since there are 17 huge halls in the convention center, we all were wandering on our own (with our walkie-talkies for communication), had a lunchtime rendezvous, then a show-closing rendezvous back at the aforementioned press office. We wandered the halls with car clubs, autojumbles, many vendors, car auctions, a car corral, live stage presentations, the "Big Screen" themes, with the like of the "Ghostbusters" car, the DeLorean from "Back to the Future", and others. There were 1,700 classic cars on display, and 250 clubs. I was lucky enough to talk to Mike Brewer and Ed China, of

"Wheeler Dealer" and fame, get a guick photo-op, since they were on the live stage for three days. I also meet Stirling



Moss again, who was there on Saturday at an insurance company booth. He autographed a photo of him and I, from several years ago at the NEC.

The show is astounding in the amount of clubs that attend and show their cars. Jaguar was well-represented with various clubs. Plus several in the Silverstone Auction, as well as drives being given for a charity donation at the "Sporting Bears Dream Rides". One particular interesting drive, was a rare

chance to drive in a Jaguar D-Type. It went out in the rain, with many passengers!

The Jaguar Heritage had a huge display, one of the largest at the show. Some Jaguar display highlights were the new E-type prototype, and D-Type cars at their display.

Also attending was: Jaguar Drivers Club, Ltd Jaguar Enthusiasts Club Jaguar XJS Club and our "cousins" at the Daimler and Lancaster Owners Club, Ltd

A follow-up email from the show's promoters stated that 65,000 attended the show over the weekend. They are already planning to expand from 82,000 square metres to 93,000 in 2015 (November 14-15, 2015).

Saturday found us going to the Triumph monument in Coventry, on Herald Avenue. We also drove to



to check out what was left of the Jaguar factory (nothing, leveled, and a housing development now there). We

Sports and Social Club behind the current remnants of the Jaguar factory.

From there it was on to "The National Brewery Centre" in Burton-upon-Trent. The centre represents the many breweries that in the "Home of British Brewing", that used to be in Burton-upon-Trent, lead by the icon red triangle of "Bass". Then back to the NEC, to spend more time at the show.

After a full-day of touring and going back to the NEC, we went for dinner at the long-time favorite pub, "The Virgin and Castle Pub" in Kenilworth. Despite a busy Saturday night, we were quickly given a table by the owner we know, and treated by the pub's "real ale keeper", to a tour of the pub's cellar that goes back to the pub's founding in 1563.

Sunday we dropped a colleague off at the NEC, and headed north to the Nottinghamshire area, to Newark, and huge indoor and outdoor autojumble. The parking lot itself was a car show of vintage autos driven to the autojumble (including several Jaguars). Then back to the NEC for our final visit, to spend more time at the show and thank our media colleagues for their hospitality.

Monday was the rare opportunity to visit and tour The London Taxi Company in Coventry. We were given a power-point by the Export Manager, Nigel Walters. He gave us a taxi history, starting with "Ply for hire" around 1150AD. The company started as "Hackney Carriage" by Robert "Bobby" Jones in 1919, then "Carbodies". 1958 gave us the iconic design, with the 25ft turning circle. The company was part of BSA, then British Leyland, then in1973 Maganese Bronze Holdings. Engines at that time were from Austin and Land Rover. 1989 was the introduction of the Fairway model, Classic design, with a Nissan engine. In 1997 the current design was introduced, and in 1989 colors added (now 12). A Ford diesel engine (Ford Transit van engine) started in 2002 for Euro 3 emissions He explained that the taxis were grandfathered in for safety regulations. There are dealerships for private sales (not in the US) UK, Europe, etc.. 2006 came the current, TX4, with first a Penske engine, then Fiat, for Euro 4 emissions. Euro 6 will start soon. Current costs....39,000 £

Geely (China) also owns Volvo. There is a LTC factory in Shanghai. In 2012 LTC went into bankruptcy due to the economy, and a faulty steering box. In 2013 Geeley LTC owned it outright. When there is capacity, they produce 20 vehicles per day. They are looking at new factory site (in the Coventry area it is rumored), since the current one is 86 years old. They average 2,500 units per year. London Mayor Boris Johnson wants TX5 zero emissions by 2018; so all taxis will be electric or hybrid.

All in all, yet another great UK Motoring outing!


Driving directions from the Pennsylvania Turnpike:

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
