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

The Grand Prize winner of this contest receives Braggin' Rights" for a full year – no \$50,000 check or all expense paid trip to Saskatchewan. This car was one of nearly 200 vehicles displayed at the Antique Auto Show and Boardwalk Parade in Ocean City, NJ, sponsored by the Jersey Cape Region/AACA. The assets and intellec-

tual property of Devin Enterprises, originally founded in 1955, were recently purchased by a Philadelphia area entrepreneur who has relocated the company from California to Abington.

This was one of the dozen-and-a-half foreign cars among a sea of American land yachts, antique cars and muscle machines displayed on a picture-perfect summer Saturday. A 1959 Cadillac deVille convertible took up the most real estate followed closely by the last of the big ones, a 1976 El Dorado convertible. Mustangs, GTOs and Chevelles were, unsurprisingly, the most prevalent beasts with a few Mopars thrown in for good measure. British cars (MG, Triumph, Austin Healey) outdid the Germans (BMW and Mercedes) by a hair with single entrants by a Maserati, Porsche, 240Z and 300,000-mile Toyota Land Cruiser rounding out the field. Putting a few Jaguars on the field next year would be real attraction.

Speaking of Car Shows – It's more than just a car show and I hope you have Saturday August 7 marked on your calendar. That's our DVJC Concours d'Elegance held jointly with DVT's Cars and Motorcycles of England show and the Ales & Petals celebration at Historic Hope Lodge. To some people, the name "Concours d'Elegance" conjures up images of the exclusive Pebble Beach event. DO NOT BE DIS-SUADED FROM ENTERING YOUR JAGUAR. This is a perfect opportunity to show off your car to a large public audience. Our Concours offers several classes of entries to accommodate your preferences. Exterior, interior, engine and boot are all judged for Champion Division entries while only the exterior and interior of Driven Division cars are scored. For both divisions, judges evaluate the cars for authenticity, condition and cleanliness. Their detailed feedback can serve as a guide for further improvements to your car. Cars in the Display Division are not judged but are parked alongside the judged cars for viewing and appreciation by the spectators at the show. If you're new to the club or have not participated before, register now and give it a try. I'm certain you'll enjoy it!

You will be hearing calls for volunteers to help staff this signature event. Already, twenty-one club members have completed training and certification as judges. Thanks to the Sjoreens, Kobs and Browns who opened their homes for three training sessions this spring. Please step forward and contribute a few hours of your time when the call comes for volunteers to set up (Friday) and perform the many tasks that must be done Saturday for a successful show. With plenty of help, everyone will still have many hours to enjoy the cars, food, beer and grounds of Hope Lodge. Even if you're not entered or working the show, be sure to come enjoy the day.



Over the years, one of our recruitment tactics has been to introduce the club by means of leaving our "calling card" under the windshield wiper of unsuspecting Jags seen out and about the region. We have recently updated the content of these cards, which may be seen in the photo below.



Our new version now contains an email address and a telephone number (both of which happen to belong to yours truly) to facilitate contact, as well as our web address. I have copious amounts of these cards and am happy to furnish them to you with the request that you use them at your discretion in support of our recruitment efforts. Two of our signature events are on the immediate horizon. You'll read about the July 10 Slalom and the August 7 Concours d'Elegance in this issue. As previously observed in this column, these are huge opportunities to acquaint the car enthusiast community with DVJC and they also serve as perhaps our most valuable recruiting tactic.

I had the privilege of attending one of the judging 'clinics' conducted by our Chief Judge Alan Brown over the past month. I came away impressed with the level of knowledge and dedication apparent among our judging team, and grateful for the opportunity to learn some of the finer points of Jaguar evaluation. I encourage any member to take advantage of this activity, really a true benefit of belonging to DVJC.

So much for the business of membership, now for the "musings" part of this monthly exercise. While considering the variety of DVJC events now available during our return to something resembling normalcy, I continue to be impressed with the diversity of car culture interest even among enthusiasts of a single marque, let alone a single model. To illustrate this, I present here three vastly different takes on the venerable Jaguar XK 150, in which I have a special interest.

First, here are Bill and Ethell Ross, pictured above beside their gorgeous XK 150 FHC, advertising for exhibitors at the Jaguar Driver's Club Scotland event on July 17-18, 2021, at Kincardine Castle, Aberdeenshire. Dressed in period late 50's attire, including matching hat, gloves, purse and shoes, she certainly puts the "Elegance" in Concours d'Elegance.



Next, as the saying goes, from the sublime to the ridiculous. Here is a somewhat less presentable XK 150S DHC which, despite its apparent flaws, sold for \$127,552 at the Bonham's spring auction-about six times the presale estimate. The backstory is that it spun off the road on a rainy day in 1996 and the driver, too embarrassed to tell his insurance company, put it in dry storage since then. Not a bad investment, but some restoration project.



Finally, in the "love it or hate it" category, a 1960 XK 150 one off project in which the back of a fixed head coupe has been removed and the boxy wooden frame of a Morris Minor Traveler has been transplanted. The creator calls this the "Foxbat", a reference to the Russian MiG-25 fighter jet, in which a Soviet pilot defected to Japan in 1976-at about the time this restoration project was underway. It's for sale currently in the UK for £44,995 (a little over \$62,000 at the current rate of exchange). Perhaps the only classic Jaguar "Woodie" in existence.

My point here is simply that while the Jaguar community is focused on one legendary brand, nevertheless it's under a big tent that welcomes and celebrates a broad array of tastes, inclinations and enthusiasms. Certainly, with the diversity of member vehicles represented, our DVJC cohort is a fine example of this. See you at the Concours!

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Speaking of Things Jaguar - July 2021

What is the DVJC Concours and Why Should I Enter?

"The Concours" is a Delaware Valley Jaguar Club signature event. It is, perhaps, our most anticipated and widely attended event of the year. In 1967, only two years into our existence, DVJC held its first concours and has held one almost every year since. Unfortunately, we were not able to hold it last year due to the COVID 19 pandemic and, in fact, this year we had to delay it two months from the usual date in June. BUT, the DVJC is having our concours on August 7th, rain or shine! So, what exactly is the DVJC Concours?

Let's start with the definition of the term "concours". Concours, in the context of our use, is a shortened version of the French term concours d'elegance which literally means "competition of elegance". The term and concept dates back to 17th century France when aristocrats would parade their most elegant carriages through parks and "compete" for the admiration of the crowd. Today a concours d'elegance is a car show where the vehicles are judged against standards of condition and originality. Perhaps the best known concours d'elegance in North America is the Pebble Beach concours d'elegance held in California each August. There multimillion dollar classic cars are entered by invitation only. Sounds a bit intimidating, doesn't it? Well, those concours d'elegance events certainly can be, but the DVJC Concours, not so much. Yes, some cars are competitively judged and that aspect is taken rather seriously by some, but there is more to it.



Jaguar Clubs of North America (JCNA) sanctions the DVJC Concours, which means they provide the framework and rules for conducting the event as well as the liability insurance. As a member of the Delaware Valley Jaguar Club you are also a member of Jaguar Clubs of North America. The sanctioning of certain events and the blanket liability insurance are just a couple of the benefits of being a member of JCNA. The stated purpose of the JCNA Concours is twofold:

- 1. To encourage the owners of Jaguars to preserve, maintain, and present their Jaguars in as clean and authentic condition as possible.
- 2. To celebrate all Jaguars and their owners by creating an event where people may share all degrees of interest in owning, driving, maintaining, and restoring Jaguars.

While I am a JCNA certified Judge for the competitive aspect of the DVJC Concours, I think "To celebrate all Jaguars and their owners" quite accurately sums up my perspective on "The Concours". It is a celebration of Jaguar ownership and enthusiasm. Car enthusiasts celebrate their cars by putting a bit of extra shine on their cars and getting together with other car enthusiasts to display and mutually admire them. That is the basic premise for car shows and cars & coffee events. The DVJC Concours is essentially a car show; actually a car show within a car show since it is part of the Cars and Motorcycles of England (CMOE) show. CMOE is a grand celebration of British motor cars and motorcycles complete with music, food and all of those things that make a celebration fun. Aside from all of the Jaguars on the DVJC part of the field there will be MGs, Triumphs, Morgans, Aston Martins and other British motor cars on the CMOE side. A grand celebration of British car ownership and enthusiasm!

You may, at this point, be thinking "yeah, that sounds like fun, but what about all of that judging, scoring points for a championship, etc.?" Well, yes, some of the Jaguars on the DVJC part of the field are, at their owner's request, judged by certi-

fied JCNA concours judges against a consistent standard. More about that later. Notice I said "at their owner's request". Having your Jaguar judged is not mandatory for entering the Concours. You can opt to enter your Jaguar as "Display Only". "Display Only" means I want to proudly display my Jaguar on the concours field, but prefer not to have it judged. You are in the show along with all of the other Jaguars and you can feel free to accept compliments on your Jaguar and spend the rest of the day admiring the rest of the Jaguars and all of the other British cars. AND, and this is a BIG "AND", if you volunteer some of your time helping the DVJC Concours be a success you can enter your Jaguar as "Display Only" for FREE! Oh, and get a free lunch out of it too. Jim Sjoreen, DVJC Concours Event Chairman, will be sending out a volunteer sign-up request in the next couple of weeks. The volunteer assignments do not require any special talents, just a bit of your time. It is a great way to spend time with some of your fellow DVJC members and be a part of the action.

Now you may be thinking, "*That's a pretty good deal, but isn't this really just for classic Jaguars?*" I, of course, believe that all Jaguars are born as classics making that question a bit on the moot side. However, the more definitive answer is "no." The DVJC concours is open to all Jaguars or Jaguar powered cars and strongly encourages the owners of all Jaguars old and new to participate. A brandnew F-Pace, XE or I-Pace is as welcome as an XK 120. The Jaguars are displayed in groups according to the defined JCNA Concours classes which are based upon the various models of Jaguar from 1938 to the present, so your cat will join similar cats on display.



Hmmm, maybe I'd like to better understand how my Jaguar might fare when compared to other Jaguars in the eyes of judges. So, let me be clear, if you choose to have your car judged in the concours, it will not be judged by comparison to other Jaguars. It will be judged against a consistent standard. It is not about liking one car over another. Sure, as a Jaguar enthusiast, a judge may prefer the color or the trim of one Jaguar over another, but the actual judging of the Jaguar is an unbiased inspection of the car that is scored based upon a consistent set of criteria that establishes the degree to which it conforms to original factory specifications and condition when it left the factory. Every car leaves the factory as a 100 point car. Every car drives onto the concours field as a 100 point car. Points or fractions of points are deducted from that 100 point total for every deviation from original specification and condition discovered during the judging inspection. In the Championship Division the judges inspect a potential of sixty-five items on the exterior of the car, forty-six items in the interior, twentyfive in the boot and eighty in the engine compartment. The amount of deduction, both minimum and maximum, for each item is specified in the JCNA Concours Rule Book to ensure consistency. While cleanliness and condition are very important aspects of the scoring, there are many other aspects that reflect the originality of the car and, therefore, impact the amount of deduction. For example, Your XJS may have a couple of scratches that just won't buff out and a bit of curb rash on two of the wheels. The XJS next to you has absolutely flawless paint and wheels. However, that stunning XJS does not have the front license plate bracket that was supplied with all Jaguars exported to North America. Your car would have 0.3 points deducted for the three small scratches on the paint and another 0.4 points deducted for the small curb rash on the wheels for a total deduction of 0.7 points. The car next to you with the flawless paint would lose 2.0 points for the missing front license plate bracket. All other things being equal, your car with a score of 99.3 would score higher than the 98.0 score of the car with the flawless paint and wheels. From an overall perspective your car is, based upon the JCNA concours judging criteria, closer to the specification and condition of that Jaguar when it left the factory. The reason I offer this, perhaps a bit exaggerated, example is to show that just because you think your Jaguar doesn't quite look as nice as some others; looks aren't everything. Bring your car to the concours and you may be surprised that it

scores better than you expect. As a bonus you will have a list of items that that you may be able to take care of to get a higher score next time.

Wait a minute; just wait a minute! I don't want a couple of guys who don't appreciate my Jaguar pawing all over it scratching it with their belt buckles and leaving fingerprints on my waxed bonnet! I understand your concern, but it is unfounded. First and foremost, the judges are not permitted to touch your car. They may lean into the interior, boot and engine compartment, but only to the extent that they can do so without touching your car. Here is how it works. You must be present for the judging. The judging team leader will introduce himself and the other two members of the team. The team will then make a quick walk around the exterior of the car to observe the panel fit of the doors bonnet and boot. The Team leader will then ask you to open the doors, bonnet and boot. Each of the three judging team members has a specific area to inspect; one for the exterior, one for the interior and boot and one for the engine compartment. Those assignments are strictly maintained for each car judged to ensure consistency of inspection and item deductions. You may be thinking "wow, that's a lot of stuff. I'll be tied up all day and miss the rest of the show." Relax, the judging team is allowed 15 minutes total to judge a car. When the judging team has completed their inspection and listed any items for deduction, the team leader will ask you to initial the section of the score sheet that lists any missing or nonauthentic items. Initialing does not imply that you agree that the items are missing or nonauthentic, it just means you acknowledge that the judges have noted them. If you disagree you may have a conversation with the Chief Judge, as the judging team must move on to the next car. Once you have initialed the score sheet, if applicable, the judging team leader will hand you a paper tag to slip under your wiper that indicates "Judging Complete". At that point the judging of your car is complete and you are free to enjoy the rest of the show. The Judging team does not total up the score. There is a scoring team at a central location which is responsible for totaling up the deduction points.



Hey, I've taken excellent care of my twenty-yearold Jaguar since it was new, so it has a little patina. I don't think it is fair that I have to be judged in the same class as Jaguars that have had a nut & bolt restoration. JCNA agrees and there is a class known as Preservation Class. It is for unrestored and/or near original Jaguars over twenty years old that are well prepared and in good to excellent condition. The judging of Preservation Class entries is quite similar to the Championship Class except that items that have been reconditioned or restored are counted as non-authentic with point deductions.

My Jaguar is my daily driver, but it is in great shape. However, my engine bay is just not spotless like those cars that sit with a cover over them all the time. That is the case with many Jaguar owners and JCNA wants them to feel comfortable entering their Jaguars in a concours, so they have a Driven Class. The Driven Class encourages owners who regularly drive their Jaguars to participate in the concours. The Driven Class entry is judged in a similar manner to the Championship entry except the boot and the engine compartment are not judged. So, if you want to focus on just the exterior and interior of your Jaguar you can enter it in the Driven Class and keep your bonnet and boot closed.


Since, hopefully, I have answered all of your questions and concerns about the DVJC Concours and perhaps demystified it a bit, let's return to its purpose to celebrate all Jaguars and their owners. This is unquestionably a time to celebrate all Jag-

This is also a year of anniversaries for Jaguar owners and enthusiasts. It is the sixtieth anniversary of the iconic E-Type. It is the fortieth anniversary of the XJS that powered Jaguar through the late seventies, eighties and into the nineties. It is the twenty-fifth anniversary of the XK8, the sleek and sultry sports car that took Jaguar into the new millennium. And last, but certainly not least, it is the twentieth anniversary of the X-Type saloon, the first Jaguar with standard four-wheel drive. Along with all of the other Jaguars, new and old, let's see how many E-Type, X-Type, XJS, XK8, and V-12 powered Jaguars we can park together on the DVJC Concours field to celebrate their respective anniversaries this year! The Delaware Valley Jaguar Club Slalom is Back! Saturday July 10th 2021

It's Slalom Time! We didn't have one last year due to the COVID 19 pandemic, but we're having one this year, so get ready to rev up your 4, 6, 8 or 12 cylinder Jaguar and launch it onto the course. If you've never seen or participated in a Jaguar Clubs of North America (JCNA) sanctioned slalom you are missing out on one of the best examples of the "Art of Performance" there is. The slalom is a great opportunity to spend some quality time with your Jaguar and your Jaguar friends.



For our newer members who may not have had the opportunity to attend or participate or even know what slalom is and as a refresher for others, the slalom is a solo, timed speed event where drivers pilot their Jaguars, and sometimes other lesser cars on a tight course of nine overlapping curves that form an hourglass, a figure eight and an oval to achieve the lowest elapsed time from start to finish. Each driver is allowed five attempts to improve their time. It is, perhaps, the form of speed related motorsport that is the least stressful on both the car and driver. The actual highest speed achieved on the course is less than 40 mph, but it will feel much faster. It is just you and your Jaguar with 100% focus for 40-60 seconds of pure exhilaration. The course is set up on a large parking lot with plenty of open space around it, so if you should go off course the only damage you might do is perhaps some bruised pride. All cars will be given a safety inspection prior to the start and drivers must wear a helmet and have their seat belts securely fastened. Don't worry if you don't have a helmet, loaner helmets are available. A number of other Jaguar clubs within Jaguar Clubs of North America (JCNA) also hold slalom events and the course layout and rules of participation are the same. This is a JCNA sanctioned event and the times of each participant are posted to JCNA to be compiled for National Championship standing. Cars are grouped in JCNA established classes based upon Jaguar model and power plant variations, so someone in a Series III XJ6 isn't competing against another driver in an F-Type R. There are classes for literally all Jaguars including the F-Pace and I-Pace SUVs. Over the past few years DVJC has had several National Champions in the slalom. A couple of them are generally available to share the value of their experience with first timers.





So why not join us on Saturday July 10th at Garnet Valley High School, the home of the Jaguars, for some motoring fun with your Jaguar. Technical inspection starts at 8am and the racing begins shortly afterward. The racing is usually over in plenty of time for everyone to adjourn to a local restaurant or pub to relive the excitement of the morning over lunch.

Pre-Register on the DVJC web site by July 9th. Online registration is \$10 for DVJC members or \$20 on the day of the event. Registration for non-DVJC or JCNA members is \$30. <u>Click Here</u> for more information and registration.


- * Spectator parking will require additional volunteers this year so PLEASE, commit to a shift and help us out. DVJC needs to step up.




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USING MEMBER FORUMS by Tom Shaner

During this time of confinement, if you find something interesting to our fellow car club members, you can share it on our website through the use of MEMBER FORUMS. Here are the steps to post information, pictures or even videos.

- 1. Logon to the DVJC website.
- 2. At the top of the menu bar on the far right choose Member Forums.
- 3. Now click on DVJC Connect on the left side of the screen..
- You will see a list of viewing topics for you to peruse at the top. Below that, is a section called Create New Topic. You may click and select any topic from the top to find out more on that topic and you can then respond to that topic at that point.
 OR if you don't select one you can make your *new* topic for people to respond to.
- 5. Now make a Title (up to 80 Characters) that accurately describes your subject.
- 6. In the large section below place text information with any JPEG files or links to movie clips (You Tube videos). ****Use the** instructions below for more info on images and video**
- 7. Topic Tags are for people who are searching for information. When you place descriptive info in this box about your post, it will help users to find that specific information.
- 8. "Notify me" check box (when checked) will give you an email reply when people respond to your post. Check this **only** if you want a reply to your posts.
- 9. Lastly, after you have entered all your info, you need to enter **SUBMIT**. Your post will now be listed with the other posts at the bottom for other DVJC users to see, use and react to. Check back regularly to see new and interesting posts from other DVJC members.

Note: After viewing one post and you want to go back to the full list, look to the top of the page and find **DVJC Connect** and click on that (it's small text).


***Posting pictures and video's ***


- Pictures need to be in a certain format to be displayed in the forum properly. They can't be stored on the DVJC website as is due to space requirements. Here is a short list from which pictures can be **displayed directly on the screen** in the forum. Facebook, Flickr, Giphy, Hulu, Instagram, Photobucket, Tumblr, Twitter, Viemo and YouTube.
- Make sure the link is shareable or on the above list (Ex. Flickr), then copy the link (Ctrl C).
 Ex. With a dropbox link, right click the mouse and scroll down to Share section and copy the dropbox link. (It works with Google drive or OneDrive too.)
- 3. Now go to the forum box and Ctrl V (paste the link). The image will now appear in the forum box if from the short list, otherwise a link forms.


This doesn't mean you can't display your JPEG pictures, you just will have a link to the cloud (ex. Dropbox) that needs to be clicked on to see the picture. This is an example using the free Dropbox program. This process works for YouTube videos too.

After you have pressed SUBMIT, the link will work for your picture. Anytime it is pressed the picture will appear. After viewing the posted picture, to go back to read more of the forum, use the *back arrow*. You are back at the forum screen.
