

Dear Jack,

Now that another wonderful Jag-filled summer has passed, I do want you to know what a great job you're doing for the club, organizing, publicizing, promoting, etc. I know how much work you must be putting in, and the results of your efforts show! I do, however, have a suggestion for a change in how the club does things, and I hope you'll agree its a good one.

One of the club's purposes is to encourage knowledgeable preservation of the marque, which we do by holding several JONA accredited concours during the year, sponsoring educational activities, tours and clinics geared to maintenance and restoration, and recognizing the success or progress of participants' efforts by awarding prizes. Another goal is to spread our enthusiasm to the general public, giving non-Jag owners a chance to see these fine cars, learn a bit about them, and perhaps, even buy one! We bring our passion to the public at mixed-marque concours like New Hope, and at all-Brit or all-Jag shows held at high visibility locations like Penn's Landing and the Court at King of Prussia.

I noticed at a recent concours that two guys brought out the only XK 140 and the only XK 150 at that show. The 140 is an older restoration driven regularly, but $\overline{1}$ know the owner is trying to keep the car up in the 80-85 point range; I didn't get a thorough look at the 150, but it looked to be at least 85 points. These two cars were lumped in with the large XK 120 judging group and of course, neither won anything.

A plate or trophy only costs a few dollars; as a club, do we want to encourage these Jag buffs to bring out their cars for our shows, so that people can see these less-collected but historically important examples of Jaguar's development through the 1950's? Do we want to motivate these owners to maintain their cars in concours condition, get involved with the club, and come out to our clinics?

Of course we do! So, as a matter of club policy, we should be giving out the most trophies we can, even if a car is only good enough for a 2nd or 3nd place based on its points! JONA concours rules permit judging 140's and 150's in their own categories and giving out only a second or third place award if no car has over 90 points, and, in past years, our club has given out trophies in one-car classes (Myron Klein's Mark V comes to mind) even when no car was good enough for first place. It's no harder for our judges, who have to score each car carefully anyway, and it's no skin off the chrome of the XK 120's not to have the extra two or three competitors (some several years younger) in the judging group.

In short, I can't think of any reason not to do it this way, and many reasons seem to favor the more trophy-generous approach. Is there a reason that the club has started doing it the "lumpy" way?

Let's discuss this at our next meeting or publish it as an open proposal in the newsletter(preferably anonymously or over your signature, please) and see how the membership responds. I hate to sound like a bad sport and would be willing to withdraw my car from concours judging (under the system I'm proposing) to show that my interest is more than just selfishness, but I really think that this is how we should be doing our concours, and that except for the few members directly effected by it, nobody has ever stopped to think what the best policy for the club as a whole should be.



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
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
