Pictured on the preceding page are the front and back sides of a 5" x 7" card leave-behind piece which we are calling the "Nice Jag" initiative. The plan here is that these colorful glossy handouts will ultimately find their way under the windshield wipers of non-DVJC member Jaguars discovered out and about, subject to a few restrictions discussed below.

In the spirit of full disclosure, this is hardly an original idea. Something like this surfaced some months ago in a call among the various membership directors of the JCNA affiliate clubs. Nevertheless, I believe DVJC can execute this plan on a level above our peer clubs. The thinking here is that there is only so much potential new member identification which may be achieved by traditional methods like internet visibility and, most importantly, word of mouth. These cards will be used to "target" Jaguars (and their owners of course) which may be unfamiliar, but which are in plain view either at parking areas, car shows and events, or other public gatherings. One caveatthey will not be placed on vehicles located on private property such as residential driveways or common areas which are nonetheless considered private or member-restricted.

You'll notice that the cards have full color photos on both sides, featuring a mix of classic and modern Jaguars. We have also included all of our contact details, social media coordinates, the club logo, a QR code which links to our website and, of course, a summary of our purpose, club events and activities.

We have ordered enough of these to furnish several to each of our current 170 members. They are available now (by contacting yours truly) to those of you who may be attending "target rich" events, such as car shows, while the season is still underway. Later in the year, we plan to mail several to each of you along with our 2024 wall calendar distribution. (More about the forthcoming fourth edition of the DVJC calendar by our colleague Jay Greene appears elsewhere in this issue.) We will be asking that, when received, you consider it your personal service to DVJC to see that they are dispatched to a few worthy and unsuspecting Jaguars in your locale.

So much for the business of membership, and on to my usual errant musings. As I write this, I am in Italy, on my way to the region of Abruzzo, province of Chieti, for a gathering with my kids and their respective families near the small hill town of Guardiagrele-the homeland of my late father. The roads here are full of Fiats and Vespas, not very many Jags, and

It's an amazing assemblage of modern and vintage cars and artifacts of the iconic Italian automaker.

carefully curated three-level space. It's the veritable altar of Ferrari.

Naturally I was on the lookout for any mention of Enzo's famous "most beautiful car ever made" E-Type reference, however, and unsurprisingly, I did not see anything of that nature.

All the while during the visit, I was thinking that my father, another Italian born entrepreneur, would have just loved this. He was an auto enthusiast also; one of his



This event was inspired by founders John and Lydia Morris's love of cars, from a 1912 electric and a Chrysler used on the grounds to a chauffeur driven Pierce-Arrow EDL, special ordered by Miss Lydia in 1927.

As a neighbor and committee volunteer at the Morris Arboretum, DVJC member Steve Gendler was tasked by Executive Director Bill Cullina with finding one car per the Arboretum's 9 decades. Thanks are also due to both DVJC member Michael Wolf and Radnor Concours for helping source cars.

It was determined the selections should demonstrate stylistic and technological advances, as well as cultural expression for each era. What resulted presented quite a stylistic and performance progression, with the 1929 Packard 640 Phaeton and the 1938 SS Jaguar truly setting a high tone for

future generations of automotive design:

Engine size diversity: From Straight 6, 2.5 litres SS Jaguar to Straight 8, 6.29 litres (Packard's 384 cubic inches) which edges out the 6.2 litre Corvette:

Power diversity: 104 bhp SS Jaguar to 835 bhp Rivian (over 200 electric bhp on each wheel);

Transmission diversity: 2 speed automatic 1954 Corvette to 3 speed manual Packard to 8 speed dual clutch automatic 2023 Corvette;

Top Speed diversity: 75 mph 1929 Packard 640 to 199 mph 2008 Ferrari 612 Scaglietti dashingly driven to the Show by Carol Petrow;

0-60 Speed Top end are 2023 Corvette Z51 Package at 2.9 seconds and Rivian R1T at 3.0 seconds;

Coachwork exquisiteness: True ingenuity and authenticity were on display, from the rich Mark 2 burl walnut interior surround to the Ferrari 612 Scaglietti's sumptuous leather, finally to the 1954 Corvette brought by DVJC members Bruce and Shelley Menkowitz, which truly embodied America's post WWII aspirations.

The picturesque location, called the Azalea Meadow, was suggested by some of the owners to have tremendous potential for not only a repeat show, but also possibly for a larger concours type event. This was due to the extended vista from our show location gently upward to majestic trees and sculpture. Despite a very hot day in the 90s, made much more tolerable by the visit from the DVJC July lunch attendees, this first Morris Motor Show was a beautiful success!

Muriel "Mo" Tate September 2, 1934 — July 9, 2023

Michael and Muriel Tate were my first Delaware Valley Jaguar Club (DVJC) friends when I joined the club after acquiring my first Jaguar in 2002, a 1958 XK150 FHC. The Jaguar marque had always been a favorite of mine and I wanted to meet others with the same passion. I searched on-line and in the automobile periodicals that I frequented and came across the DVJC and Mike's name. I believe he was editor of *The Purr* at the time. Mike had an XK150 S roadster (among the more than 20 Jaguars he owned in his lifetime) and we instantly became kindred spirits. He invited me to join him at the New Hope Auto Show, where I met him for the first time in person. It was then that I became aware that he was one of the pillars of the DVJC and that his lovely wife Muriel provided strength, support, and endurance to that pillar. Muriel, or Mo as Mike called her, was a strong woman who had considerable influence on Mike and others through her quietly tenacious manner. Her tenaciousness and toughness came about because of the era and geography in which she grew up.

On Sunday September 2, 1934 Muriel Margaret Jordison was born into the world in a nursing home in North End, a district in the city of Portsmouth, located on Portsea Island in Hampshire England. Her family lived in Southsea Hants. Her father, Frederick, was an engineer and worked at the HM Dockyard (His Majesty King George VI) in Portsmouth. The British fleet had a large presence there including the H.M.S. Victory, on which the famous Lord Horatio Nelson fought the Battle of Traflgar. As she was starting her education at the age of five at a small private school in Southsea, Hampshire, her father was sent to Singapore in "The Far East" by the admiralty. The plan was for

Muriel and her mother to join him in Singapore and they were scheduled to sail in September 1939 on the HMS Rawalpindi. But war was declared on September 2, 1939 (her fifth birthday) and it was just as well they did not sail. The HMS Rawalpindi was sunk in a surface action against the German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau during the first months of the Second World War.

Portsmouth was heavily bombed by the Nazis in the early days of the war because of the high density of battleships and merchant ships there. Mo's grandfather, who lived in the north of England, begged her mother to bring her north where it was much safer and there were fewer bombing raids on the cities. To ensure a better chance of surviving, Mo and her Mum went north. They lived with Mo's grandparents in a small town on the Tyne River for about two years. In 1941 the Japanese entered the war, captured Singapore, and marched into Hong Kong. Fortunately, Mo's father was able to leave Singapore on one of the last landing boats and escaped, going back to England via Australia.

The family survived the war and after the war they were all in Singapore with Mo's father for about five years, during which Mo was very active in local clubs including swimming, tennis, and especially singing and drama. The family returned from Singapore to North Yorkshire and lived in an apartment for a few years in a manor house called Ingleby Manor in the village of Ingleby Greenhow. Mo began doing her exams and training for secretarial and personal assistant work to executives. After a few years in Ingleby Greenhow, the family moved north to Newcastle-

Upon-Tyne where Mo got a marvelous job working as a personal assistant and secretary for a local professor of pediatrics at a large hospital, the Royal Victoria Infirmary, which is still one of the largest in the UK.

It was in Newcastle that Mo met her beloved husband, Michael, while walking along the promenade in Whitley Bay where she used to take her two younger sisters, Patricia (Pattie) and Carole (Caz), with her to buy them ice cream. She and Michael fell in love, married at St. James' and St. Basil's Church in Fenham, Newcastle-Upon-Tyne in 1957. After they married, they lived in their first house in Formby Lancashire. The house was called Mirumo. They then moved to the Norfolk Broads near Norwich, and then Bourne End, Buckinghamshire. They had three children. Russell was born in Yorkshire, Suzanne and Gary were born in Liverpool. Mo was a wonderful 'mum' and the children would take up most of her time at this point in her life.

As Mike's career with Burroughs/Unisys continued on its upward trajectory, he became VP of International Sales and VP of Asia Pacific. They traveled the globe and shared a wonderful international lifestyle with stops in Jamaica and Hong Kong. Eventually they returned to England to live in a beautiful beamed 17 century house in Henley on Thames, which they loved. Mike's career with Burroughs/Unisys took them to Detroit MI in 1972. After a successful career with Unisys, he retired and then worked briefly for Key-Corp, a bank holding company. That took them to Melbourne Australia for a couple of years, after which they moved back to the USA and settled in the greater Philadelphia area. We at the DVJC are better for that move.

It was sad to see Mo's mental acuity decline in recent years. In July of 2020, Gary, Gary's wife Julie, and Suzanne were moving Mo into Woodbridge Place, an assisted living facility in Phoenixville. They were sitting outside the facility, enjoying the beautiful, sunny day while waiting for Mo to be admitted. Several members of the DVJC were also enjoying that day by participating in a Bridges and Barns drive that took them through Chester County. Due to a road closing, the event route had to be changed at the last minute and the parade of Jaguars was diverted to Rapps Dam Road where, incredibly, they passed in front of Woodbridge Place just when the Tates were sitting outside the building. Suzanne texted me to confirm that we were indeed the DVJC. That might have been Mo's last contact with the DVJC and it was just a coincidence. Or was it? I think Mike had something to do with that turn of events.

Because of the COVID outbreak and my own mysterious illness that kept me hospitalized for most of 2022, I was not able to visit Mo while she was at Woodbridge. I regret that and know that I will miss her for years to come. I still miss Mike and think of him at every DVJC event, especially the Holiday Party. It was a pleasure getting to know them, becoming friends with them, and becoming friends with their progeny who were a great help in gathering the background for this article.

A Celebration of Life for Mo is being planned for the end of this year.

How To Photograph Your Jaguar

By: Jay Greene

It is time to start thinking about making photographs of your special Jaguar. The 2024 DVJC Calendar Committee will assemble all the photographs in October and print it in early November. Here is a short guide to making great photographs of your car. If you would like me to do it for you at no charge, call me to make arrangements (see below).



1- Lighting is important. The open sky lighting that occurs during the 1/2 hour before sunset or 1/2 hour after sunrise is called the golden hour. Notice how nice your paint looks during these times compared with broad daylight. Work in the open shade. Don't stand with the sun at your back and cast your shadow across the car!



2- The background is important. What is behind your car completes the story about your car. Try to find a place that is a similar era to your car. The car is part of a composition. The most visually important places are at 1/3 and 2/3 of the horizontal and across the center in a diagonal. The car will make a diagonal leading your eye from front to back. The background helps bring your attention around the top and back to the front. Avoid distracting background content.



3- Avoid a wide angle lens. Todays camera/computer/phone devices are very capable. They default to wide angle "to get everything in." What you want is a portrait lens that is equivalent to about 80mm in 35mm format. The portrait setting that blurs the background on your phone might work, but it is designed to recognize people, not cars. Be prepared to stand back about 25 to 30 feet from your Jaguar.



- 4- Resolution and cropping are important. Each year we receive lovely photographs that are too small or cropped too tightly. The calendar page is 8.5x11 inches and the printer's standard is 300 pixels per inch (ppi). A high quality photograph that measures 7x10 at 300 ppi will work well. A little will get cropped off each side. A full frame 35 mm has an aspect ratio of 2x3, which works out to 6.7x10 inches. About 1/2 inch will be cropped off each side. Some camera phones have an aspect ratio of 3x4. This is more square, so some is cropped off the top and bottom. Use the 16x9 video setting with caution. It is very narrow.
- 5- Have fun and be creative. Try low angles, high angles, looking at the other side, the back and different backgrounds.







Sunday, October 1 – Sanctioned Slalom



My 1984 XJ6 Vanden Plas was <u>not</u> stored in a hermetically sealed mayonnaise jar on Funk and Wagnall's porch. (For those of you who don't recall, this is a reference to <u>Johnny Carson's "Carnac the Magnificent" sketch.</u>) Instead, it was stored in a limestone cave near Kansas City, MO. There are a number of these caves surrounding the city. After being mined out, they have been repurposed and developed for a wide range of businesses for which the natural environment of constant temperatures and relatively low humidity is advantageous. For example, the U.S. National Archives began storing both permanent and temporary records underground in the 1960s.

The mine where my car was stored is known as the "Subtropolis" and was developed by Hunt Midwest, the real estate arm of the Lamar Hunt family, founders and owners of the Chiefs. One hundred feet below ground, it is the largest underground business complex in the world – over 1,100 acres! Within it are full-size railroads and many miles of illuminated, paved roads supporting regular tractor-trailer traffic. Among the industries using these facilities are pharmaceuticals, animal health, food distribution, e commerce and auto and truck services and storage of important government and business records including film and computer tapes. The original owner of my car was the CEO of Hunt Midwest.

My car was purchased new in September 1983 from Manhattan Jaguar in Rockville, MD and shipped to Kansas City. The "out the door" price was \$37,145 (not including taxes and fees), roughly equivalent to \$114,000 today. It was used for two years by his wife as a daily driver and, thereafter, was stored in the Subtropolis and used sparingly for weekend drives and special occasions. Anticipating their relocation to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho upon the husband's retirement, the car was offered for sale on Hemmings Classic Cars when I was looking for a black Vanden Plas. I had sold the first XJ6 that I owned when I purchased my E-Type to adhere to my " no more than three Jaguars" rule. After a few years, I found myself wanting to, once again, enjoy the special nature of these beautiful Pininfarina designed automobiles. To make space within my self-imposed ownership cap, I sold my 1996 XJ12

to a member of the Jaguar Touring Club who happens to live in the New Jersey town of Montclair where Nancy grew up.

I took ownership of the car in April of 2019. The complete set of maintenance records supplied with the car validate the 48,000 miles shown on the odometer. While well maintained, the car did need suspension work to address the aging of rubber and other components that degrade over time. The valances beneath the front and rear bumpers were refinished to address the stone chips and associated surface rust. As with all these cars, the burl walnut veneer on the dash had faded, cracked and delaminated. I replaced it with a complete set of new wood trim including the dash, radio/control stack and waist rails on the doors with the help of my 15 year-old grandson.

When introduced in 1979 as a 1980 model, the XJ6 was lauded for its incredible balance of smooth ride and sporting handling. The Series III took that to a new level and epitomized the grace, pace and space for which that marque was

known. Nancy and I are proud to own this car and enjoy using it on special occasions and for spring and fall drives.

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

A reminder notice will be emailed to users 3 days before an item is due.


Members interested in extending the loan period can do so if there are no holds placed by other members. The extension request can be made by emailing library@delvaljaguarclub.com


