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

2024. But – you need not wait that long to experience the change of seasons! Concours season begins ten days earlier



with the first session of judge training on March 9. Our JCNA sanctioned Concours d'Elegance will take place at Historic Hope Lodge on Saturday June 1. Our event is one of three simultaneous events on the grounds of the 18th century mansion. The others are the Cars and Motorcycles of England which is organized by Delaware Valley Triumphs and the Ales and Petals Celebration put on by the Friends of Hope Lodge. Every year, representatives from the three organizations begin planning in early January. Their work concludes several weeks after the event with a postmortem to identify improvements for next year's show and review of the financial results. This one-day event is the most important fund raiser for Hope Lodge which is a non-profit organization.



Our club is fortunate to have a strong cadre of capable judges who are ably led by our Chief Judge, Alan Brown. We need more judges! Why? Because the number of entries each year surpasses the judges' capacity to properly complete judging of the cars within a reasonable time period. If not currently a judge, I encourage you to participate in one of the two judge training sessions offered in March. During April, two workshops are scheduled. This is where judges (new and experienced) practice judging cars with guidance from Alan and their more experienced classmates. You are never thrown to the wolves. New



judges serve as apprentices on teams with experienced judges who provide feedback on their scoring. Give it a try! <u>Register for a training session</u> and workshops on our event page.

Jaguar is the Feature Marque at the 2024 Philadelphia Concours d'Elegance at the Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum on June 22 & 23. DVJC is honored to play a part in this worthwhile charitable fund-raising event that funds research into rare genetic diseases and supports the families of children born with these conditions. Since its founding in 2017, over \$400,000 has been donated to further research and patient and family support. Many of our club members have nominated their cars to be part of the concours. In fact, the response has been positively overwhelming. Cars produced into the 1980s are eligible to enter the concours. There is a separate Jaguar Field of Honour (car corral) for cars newer

than the eighties and any vintage car that owners would like to display. Awards are given to cars in the concours and field of honor. Several of our members have already submitted entries for the Jaguar Field of Honour – add yours to the roster now.



Don't miss the March 23 visit to the Classic Auto Mall and destination drive to lunch at Big Phil's. For those who have not yet been to the auto mall, it's almost overwhelming: eight acres under roof with space for over 1000 vehicles from some of the earliest cars and trucks to late models. Invite another member to come with you and <u>register now</u> so Phil has plenty of food.

A small team (Jim Sjoreen, Paul Merluzzi, Mike Wolf, Jay Greene, Greg Morrison and me) has been doing the initial work planning the 2025 JCNA Annual General Meeting that our club is hosting. The first order of business is securing the key venues to "lock in" dates. A Special Meeting of the Executive Committee (officers and directors) was conducted on February 12 to secure approval of a contract with the Sheraton Valley Forge Hotel , the host hotel, and establish parameters of an agreement with "The Simeone" for the Friday evening welcoming party. There is much more work to do to prepare for this event that is only one short year away. Within the next month or two, we will be recruiting club members to help in a variety of areas.

Effective February 9, my service as Northeast Regional Director of JCNA concluded. My original term began in 2019 and, shortly thereafter, I also accepted the "offer" to manage JCNA's insurance program. Gus Niewenhous, president of the Jaguar Association of New England (JANE), has succeeded me in both roles. During this time, I also served as JCNA Vice President and worked with many dedicated volunteers committed to the continued success of JCNA and its nearly sixty local clubs. I believe DVJC benefitted from my service and the many connections developed with members of other clubs.



Except for Formula E racing, there is no new news from Jaguar. After three races in the young 2024 season, Jaguar TCS racing holds the top team standings in Formula E

following their win in the most recent race in Diriyah, Saudi Arabia.

2024 DVJC Concours - CMoE (Cars & Motorcycles of England) - Ales & Petals at Hope Lodge

As Bill Beible shared in his monthly column, planning for this year's concours and CMoE is well underway. 2024 will mark the seventh year that the event returned to Hope Lodge. The planning committee, with representatives from DVJC, DVT (Delaware Valley Triumphs) and the Friends of Hope Lodge have been meeting via ZOOM to review the prior year's event results and make plans for any changes this year. As you might expect, the format of the day does not change much from year to year but the challenge of making it all work remains. An all-volunteer army is what makes it a success year after year so for those that have contributed their time in the past, thank you. For those that may have thought about helping and for new members, please consider volunteering this year. It's also worth noting that certain costs have increased, including the trophies sourced through JCNA. As a result, we are increasing the concours registration fees by \$10. The cost to enter one car is \$75, \$45 for the second and \$25 for the third (or more) cars. The cost to display a car will remain at \$35.

For those new to the club, the three events are held on the grounds of the Historic Hope Lodge in Ft. Washington, PA and for 2024, the date is Saturday, June 1. It is a rain or shine event. DVJC's annual Concours d'Elegance is one of the club's signature events and brings together a wide range of Jaguar cars to be viewed and/or judged in this JCNA sanctioned event. Combined with the more than 150 British cars and motorcycles registered with the CMoE, there is something for everyone. Ales & Petals, sponsored by Hope Lodge, includes food, beer and music available in the gardens surrounding the home. More information will be forthcoming but mark your calendars...it is not to be missed!

The concours and CMoE are also opportunities for members to show their support for the club, both through registering their cars and volunteering. Those who have participated in the past know that it takes dozens of volunteers to make it happen and we have been fortunate year after year with members stepping up to help. Each year I am amazed at the number of members willing to chip in and assist with all that it takes to make the show a success. What we have learned over the years is that we need to divide and conquer the various responsibilities as it is nearly impossible to have a successful show unless we have individuals to help manage the critical tasks that are key to the success of the concours and CMoE. It is vital to fill these leadership roles to provide a point of contact before and during the event. In no particular order, the roles are:

- Chief Judge Alan Brown
 - Responsible for recruiting, training, assigning & assisting concours judges.
- Show Field Parking Open
 - Recruit and assign parking volunteers on Saturday to direct registered cars to the assigned parking spaces. (Starts at 7:30 AM and goes until all show cars are parked.)
 - Assist with field layout on Friday (Timing is dependent upon field layout by DVT)
- Spectator Parking Open
 - Responsible for coordinating with DVT and Hope Lodge on all things related to spectator parking including:

- Coordinating the volunteer schedule (time slots) for day of show parking with DVT and Hope Lodge.
- Help DVT & Hope Lodge with setup of spectator parking on Friday (if needed)
- Recruit & assign DVJC volunteers to agreed upon time slots.
- Monitor assignments the day of the show to ensure slots are filled.
- ♦ Attend Hope Lodge monthly planning sessions (ZOOM or in person) when possible.
- The second largest commitment of volunteers behind judging.
- Concours Score Sheet Tabulation Open
 - Responsible for the timely and accurate tabulation of the concours score sheets.
 - ♦ Works with a small team
- Membership Tony Tinari
 - Recruit and assign volunteers to staff the membership tent.
- Merchandise Noe Laframboise
 - ♦ Responsible for inventory and point-of-sale activities the day of the show
- Assistant Concours Chair(s) Open
 - The purpose of this role is to assist the concours chair with a variety of responsibilities leading up to and on the day of the concours, including filling the above roles.

One thing to keep in mind when reading the above is that no one in any of these roles is on their own. It is my responsibility along with members of the Executive Committee to make sure everyone has the support they need to successfully accomplish the tasks at hand. This is a group effort and history has shown that we also have some fun in the process. These are short term but important commitments so I encourage everyone to ask questions to understand how you can help. A more detailed list of all the specific volunteer roles will be sent out via blast email next month.

Membership Musings

As I was wondering what the heck to write about this month, I came upon an article in the Hagerty newsfeed entitled "*Do Classic Jaguars Face a Dark Future?*" (Derek Tam-Scott, <u>Hagerty Insider</u>, 22 February 2024). You can read it yourself at <u>www.hagerty.com/media/</u> <u>market-trends/hagerty-insider/do-classic-jaguarsface-a-dark-future/</u>. This one called out to me like a porch light to a bug.



C-Type Continuation in the Spotlight

My first reaction was entirely defensive. Kind of along the lines of the famous Mark Twain quote, after his obituary had been mistakenly published: "Reports of my death have been greatly exaggerated." I immediately thought, how dare some obviously ill-informed hack at Hagerty, the company which owes its very existence to the insurance premiums, sales commissions, and fees of classic car enthusiasts like us, publish such blasphemous remarks about the revered Jaguar marque? Upon closer examination, however, the article is as much about all there is to love about classic Jags, as it is a lament for the lack of more broadly shared appreciation of them. Despite the provocative headline, the author first proceeds to extol the virtues of Jaguars from the 50's and 60's: their success in racing, the revolutionary twin cam XK engine, the "groundbreaking" and "gorgeous" E-Type lauded as the most advanced sports car in the world, and the relative lower cost of those models versus their competitors at Porsche, Aston Martin, and Ferrari. He even pays the obligatory homage to the famous Enzo Ferrari "most beautiful car in the world" quote, the placement of an E-Type roadster in the New York Museum of Modern Art, and the renowned British styling and luxury of the Jaguar sedans.



Endangered species? Don't think so, Hagerty . . .

In support of his provocative introductory premise ("Jaguar, as a brand, is on the rocks.") he implicates the corporate transitions of the British Leyland and Ford ownership eras. (By the way, for a more thorough examination of that history of the Jaguar marque, one could not do better than to refer to the decade by decade history chronicled by our own Paul Trout in the "Speaking of Things Jaguar" pages of previous editions of this newsletter.)

Membership Musings

The Jag bashing continues as the author characterizes models of the early 2000s as offering "an aesthetic experience that had become anachronistic." Wait, what? Anyone else remember the head-turning buzz that attended the introduction of the revived S-Type? Nevertheless, it is then asserted that the even more contemporary models, including the XF, F-Type, and Jaguar entries in the SUV market, "simply never resonated completely with buyers", and that the Jaguar assertion of an all-electric future casts uncertainty on the values of the classic models.

And that is where I find some conclusions of the article most illogical. Why and how the extent of consumer acceptance of the contemporary Jaguar product should negatively impact the perception of value of the classics seems to me a bridge too far. I do, however, find myself in agreement with the corollary that collectability is driven by relevance to enthusiasts, and that not enough of to-day's enthusiasts associate Jaguar with their "core automotive memories." Still, that lack of relevance has little to do with the intrinsic value of the particular automobile, but much to do with the proclivities of the collector.

So, what are the implications of this for us as a group of Jaguar enthusiasts? Well, beyond the fact that the current state of affairs presents a good buying opportunity, particularly for Jags, perhaps there is a collective responsibility that we have. I agree wholeheartedly with the Hagerty column's concluding observation that "If Jaguar as a company can't endear itself to a new crop of car fans, it's up to those of us who know better to do that work instead. Regardless of their values, the experience provided by these cars has lost none of its appeal." We as a club are united as much by shared experiences as by the material objects we collect, some of which may happen to be vintage Jaguars.

Please read the article and draw your own conclusions. As for me, I can't wait for more experiences in the spring classic car driving weather!

The Michelotti D-Type, A Tale of Two Cars

The name Michelotti is not one that is familiar to most Jaguar enthusiasts, more so to Triumph fans. Giovanni Michelotti (1921-1980) has been called "The greatest Italian designer that nobody has heard of", even though he designed more than 1200 cars. Ironically, while he was an Italian designer and coachbuilder, he is best known for English cars he designed, most notably the Triumph TR4, TR6, Spitfire and GT6.



The story of Michelotti's D-Type begins in 1955. XKD513, one of the first customer D-Types, was built in Coventry in 1955 and painted in French Blue at the request of Henri Peignaux who purchased the car through Paris Jaguar dealer Charles Delacroix. Peignaux licensed the D-Type for the road and drove it until he sold it to Jean-Marie Brussin (also referred to as Jean-Marie Brousselet). Brussin bought XKD513 in 1957 with the intent of racing it in the 1957 Le Mans 24 Hours. He had the car shipped back to Coventry for the latest competition upgrades. When the updated modifications were completed, XKD513 was tested by Norman Dewis and shipped back to France for the event.



The private entry was with team Equipe Los Amigos, led by Jean-Marie Brussin, nicknamed "Mary" by his team and the other Jaguar drivers. Jean Lucas was his co-driver. Jean Lucas, unrelated to the Prince of Darkness, was an experienced privateer race driver who had made his fortune in the sardine business in North Africa. He won the 1949 Spa 24 Hour race and competed at Le Mans several times in Ferraris. Jaguar had no factory "Works" entries in the 1957 race, having officially withdrawn from racing the previous year. The Brussin/Lucas entry was one of five privately entered D-Types; two from Ecuri Ecosse, the Scottish team that was now carrying the flag for Jaguar having won outright in 1956, one from Equipe Nationale Belge (painted in Belgium Racing Yellow) and one entered by Duncan Hamilton,

who had driven a Jaguar C-Type to victory in 1953. All five D-Types not only finished the 24 Hours, but they swept the first four places with #17 the Brussin/Lucas XKD513 placing third.



Following his success with XKD513 in 1957, Brussin returned to Le Mans in 1958. In 1958, partly as result of the spectator fatalities at the Mille Miglia the previous year, the top-class race cars were limited to 3 liters displacement. This required Jaguar, having run their new 3.8 liter engine the previous year, to de-stroke the older 3.4 engine down to just under 3.0 liters. XKD513, wearing number 11, was entered this time by Henri Peignaux, the Paris Jaguar dealer, and was again one of five D-Type Jaguars plus two Lister-Jaguars. Brussin was teamed with the Moroccan born French driver Andre' Guelfi. Unfortunately, in the rainy darkness of the Le Mans night, around 11pm, Brussin crashed just past the Dunlop bridge and was hit by a Ferrari. Brussin survived the initial crash, but was run over by the Ferrari and killed. XKD513 was destroyed. In his book "Touch Wood", Duncan Hamilton, who was driving his privately entered D-Type, recalls the incident, "Cars were crashing all around the circuit and J. Brousselet, better known by his pseudonym of Mary, was killed when his Jaguar crashed and an American -driven Ferrari ran into his car and over him. I nearly joined the pile up, and had it not been for a Frenchman who threw his hat on the road in

front of me, I would have done so. This Frenchman - and I have never been able to find out who he was – saved my life."



XKD513 sat at the edge of the track for the rest of the race. The crashed D-Type then spent two years in storage before a young Turin based Italian designer name Giovanni Michelotti purchased it. Much of the bodywork had already been scrapped, but the monocoque, suspension, engine and gearbox were still intact. Michelotti spent two years reconstructing the D-Type into a two-seat fastback coupe he tagged as the "Jaguar Le Mans". He first showed the car at the 1963 Geneva Auto Show where two years earlier Jaguar had introduced the iconic E-Type.

Sometime in the late 60s the Michelotti Jaguar Le Mans was purchased by Richard F. Carter and shipped across the Atlantic to Georgia. Carter reportedly used the car as a display piece to raise money for his church. In 1973 the car was purchased by an Englishman named Andrew Gortway. He had the car shipped to Lynx Engineering where the Michelotti body panels were removed from the original tub. The car was then sold to Laurence Bristow who had Lynx restore XKD513 back to its D-Type structure using original D-Type components.

The car was then shipped back to the US and sold to Peter Giddings who raced it extensively in California. XKD513 changed hands a few more times before it ended up in the hands of Terry Larson, renowned Jaguar expert who vintage raced it in its 1957 Le Mans livery until 1999 when it was sold to Fred Bohlander. Under Bohlander's stewardship XKD513 participated in the 2001 JCNA Challenge Championship held in Franklin Tennessee where it joined the largest collection of Jaguar C and D-Types ever assembled. There it was once again driven by Norman Dewis.



Around the same time as XKD513 was restored to its original D-Type configuration, the Michelotti body panels that had been removed were fitted on a modified E-Type chassis and a 4.2 liter Jaguar engine was dropped into the chassis. The Michelotti Jaguar Le Mans was reborn. Over the years the car changed hands and colors, going from light blue to red and back to light blue.

While the car is visually the same as the original Jaguar Le Mans, it no longer has any D-Type components, nor does it carry the VIN XKD513. The Michelotti Jaguar Le Mans still shows up at various concours in the US including Amelia Island in 2009 and the Chantilly Concours in 2014.



XKD513 also shows up in the public's eye from time to time. It went unsold at Gooding's Peb-

ble Beach auction in 2008 and appeared at the 2014 Goodwood Revival Jaguar D-Type 60th Anniversary celebration along with 29 other D-types. With Gary Pearson at the wheel, XKD513, in former Le Mans livery, dominated the all D-Type Levant Cup race, winning handily.





It also showed up at the Hampton Court Palace Concours in 2017. Thus, the Michelotti Jaguar Le Mans and the Le Mans podium finishing XKD513, born of the same chassis, continue their now separate, yet storied, lives drawing smiles from Jaguar enthusiasts around the globe who are lucky enough to encounter them.



Ruby Red (March Calendar Car)

I have had two nice Jaguar surprises this year. One, finding out my 2001 XJR (Ruby Red) is the featured March Jaguar in the club's annual calendar and two, being reminded in the January *Purr* that I have reached my 19th anniversary in the DVJC. Egad, where has the time gone!

This article has allowed me to remember my Jaguars, past and present. I owned some of them prior to joining DVJC and most of them after I joined the club. They number eleven. Twelve if I count "All Things British," a 1968 Austin America I owned in college. My current four (4) Jaguars are **highlighted in red** and if named, their name is in parentheses. We can thank my partner Joan, who names the Jaguars she likes. We can also thank Joan for referring to Jaguar owners as "My Cult." Let's face it, she is "spot on."

- 1996 XJS Red Convertible Celebration Edition
- 1995 XJS Topaz Convertible 6.0L V12 (Smooth Operator)
- 1987 XJ6 Black Vanden Plas Saloon
- 2000 XJR Black Saloon 4.0L Supercharged, precursor to Ruby Red
- 2005 XKR Black Coupe 4.2L Supercharged (Black Cat)
- 2001 XJR Red Saloon 4.0L Supercharged (Ruby Red)
- 2003 XK8 4.2L Silver Convertible
- 2001 S-Type 4.0L Red Saloon, my previous daily driver
- 2005 X-Type Topaz Estate 3.0L, my current daily driver
- 2011 XJL Supercharged 5.0L Celestial Black Saloon - Neiman Marcus Edition – (Gray Poupon)
- 2014 XKR White Coupe 5.0L Supercharged (White Lightning)

Reviewing the list, I can conclude I prefer "Ford Era" Jaguars, V8s, preferably supercharged Saloons. While one can never have too many Jaguars, life is good if I have both an XJR Saloon and XKR Coupe in the garage.

Here is how I acquired Ruby Red. I found my earlier Black 2000 XJR Saloon in Ohio in 2006 with 14,000 miles. I had been without a Jaguar

for a while having sold the 1995 XJS V12 Convertible (Smooth Operator) in 2004. The Black XJR was my first supercharged V8 Jaguar. For me it epitomized Jaguar's by-line, "Grace, Space and Pace." Being one who regularly visits eBay Motors to search for Jaguars, I spotted my 2005 XKR Black Coupe (Black Cat) in 2007. It was located on a Ford Dealer's used car lot in Northeast Pennsylvania. I went to see it the following weekend and bought it. To help pay for the 2005 XKR I sold the 2000 XJR. While the 2005 XKR was an impressive car. I missed the XJR. In 2008 I found Ruby Red in Norfolk, bought it and my Jaguar Universe was "in balance" with both a supercharged V8 XJR Saloon and supercharged V8 XKR Coupe in the garage. I sold my 2005 XKR Coupe (Black Cat) three years ago. It now lives in San Diego with another Jaguar Cult member.

What can I tell you about Ruby Red? The color is Carnival Red. The interior is black (Charcoal) leather with gray stained maple wood veneer. It's 370 horsepower and 387 ft-lbs. of torque propels it from 0 to 60 mph in 5.1 sec., 0 to 100 mph in 12.2 sec., and 0 to 150 mph in 40.2 sec. It is limited to 155 mph but could easily exceed that without the speed limiter. The V8s displacement is 3996 cubic centimeters / 244.8 cubic inches. Its net weight to power ratio is 10.9 lbs./hp. For the year 2001, these are impressive figures and the 245 cubic inch displacement supercharged Jaguar twin cam, 32 valve, V8 is a remarkable power plant.

This power plant has a few known "bad bones," the timing chain tensioners and water pump. I replaced these with upgraded parts years ago. Earlier versions of the power plant suffered from failure of the Nikasil cylinder liners, but Ruby Red was manufactured after Jaguar switched to steel cylinder liners. It is a small, light, and powerful V8 engine.

It is a big car, 197.8 in. length, 70.8 in. width, and when driven, it feels more like driving a Coupe vs a Saloon with its short 113.0 in. wheelbase and 52.7 in. height. It weighs 4050 lbs. due to its all-steel construction. Comparatively my 2011 XJL Supercharged Saloon (Gray Poupon) is 206.6 in. length, 74.6 in. width, 124.3 in. wheelbase and 57.0 in. height and weighs 3909 lbs. due to its all-

aluminum construction. The XJL feels like a saloon when driven.

But for a few sympathetic modifications, Ruby Red is in stock condition. My goal with Ruby Red and with all my Jaguars is to bring them up to as close to as new as I can get them. I want to experience my Jaguars as they were when delivered new. I have been told that installing a pully kit to increase the output from the Roots Eaton 0.8 bar supercharger transforms the XJR's performance but have never seen the need to make this modification to Ruby Red. "Why mess with success."

Early on I noticed Ruby Red had too much "nosedive" when cornering at speed. I had the suspension rebuilt and replaced the stock shock absorbers with moderately stiffer Bilstein shock absorbers, an uprated rear sway bar and sway bar links I obtained from a Jaguar performance shop in the UK.

These sympathetic modifications improved Ruby Red's handling, the nosedive is gone, without compromising its ride. I believe replacing all the undercarriage rubber bits, adding the Bilstein shock absorbers and uprated rear sway bar produced an X308 XJR that handled as I would have liked it to handle when new. But I did not know what was missing until a year and a half ago.

Ruby Red came with Pirelli P-Zero tires when new. Pirelli makes a line of retro tires for classic cars that have the exact tread design and exact markings of the Pirelli tires that came with your classic car when new, only manufactured with modern tire compounds. For a brief time, Pirelli made P-Zeros for the Jaguar X308 XJRs that exactly matched the original P-Zeros that came with Ruby Red in 2001. Since the original P-Zero unused spare (that is right, a full-size spare wheel and tire) was still in Ruby Red's boot, I know this to be true. I was fortunate enough to obtain a set. I mounted them on the original Asteroid wheels for Ruby Red (the pictures in this article have a set of five spoke Penta wheels and Michelin Super Sport tires). It is amazing how the P-Zeros transformed Ruby Red's ride and handling. I could not believe what a difference the P-Zeros made over the previous Michelin Super Sports. P -Zeros are soft when compared to harder Super Sports. Driving Ruby Red today is to truly experience this marvelous Jaguar Supercharged Saloon as Jaguar intended it.

In December I brought my Jaguar Universe "back into balance" since selling my 2005 XKR Coupe (Black Cat). I purchased a 2014 XKR White Coupe in Allentown, PA. "White Lightning" and it is a beast! But that is another story. Once again there is a supercharged V8 XJR Saloon and a supercharged V8 XKR Coupe in my garage.

Thank you for the opportunity to tell you a little about Ruby Red. Since it's March appearance in the club calendar, Joan has given Ruby Red a second name. "Calendar Girl" by Neil Sedaka. "I love, I love, I love my calendar girl. Yeah, sweet calendar girl. I love, I love, I love my calendar girl. Each and every day of the year!"

Ruby Red, a/k/a Calendar Girl, is entered in the 2024 Lewes, DE British Car Show this May. I hope to see you there.

One of these is the JCNA-sanctioned Concours d'Elegance held in York, PA, on Saturday, May 25 (the weekend before our DVJC Concours). For all events, I recommend calling ahead or visiting the organization's website to confirm dates, times, and weather contingencies.

You probably know about **Cars & Coffee**. In southeastern PA, the biggest one is in Bethlehem. 

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
