Jim Sjoreen and Alan Brown deserve particular recognition for all the work they do as Concours Chairman and Chief Judge, respectively. Brian Craig is the third key member of the Concours team. While he's seen at the registration area and shooting photographs on the show field, his behind the scenes administrative work is critical to the smooth execution of our show.



The <u>Philadelphia Concours</u> <u>d'Elegance</u> follows three weeks later on Sunday June 23 and is preceded by a Gala Preview Dinner on Saturday evening. This philanthropic event raises money to support children born with rare genetic diagnoses and their families.

The event also funds research leading to improved treatments and cures. Jaguar is this year's Feature Marque. We have been working closely with the organizers of the show by recruiting cars, helping with advertising and publicity, soliciting donations from dealers and other sources, augmenting their regular staff of judges and providing signage to bring home the Jaguar theme of the show.

I encourage you and your family to take it all in on Sunday. Seventy-two cars will be displayed and judged in three separate groups, each with its own awards. Those groups are the Concours d'Elegance, the Jaguar Field of Honour (cars that are essentially duplicates of Concours cars) and the Car Corral. Jaguars represent forty-one of the seventy-two cars and DVJC members own twentyfive of them. Additionally, Main Line Cars and Coffee will be displaying cars in the lot behind the museum. The day's program includes a panel discussion about Jaguar racing and concludes with the awards program.

We will be able to introduce DVJC to many new people by way of our membership table and a club video that will run throughout the show. In addition to promoting our club, we will share information about JCNA and the Coventry Foundation.

Tickets for Sunday's events can be <u>purchased in</u> <u>advance</u> or at the museum on the day of the show. Sale of <u>tickets to the gala preview dinner</u> closes on June 8.

Congratulations to Kevin Fitzgerald for publication of his article, "Road and Track," in the May/ June issue of the *Jaguar Journal*. This feature story chronicles the long, interesting history of this E-Type racer recently rebuilt in cooperation with another DVJC member, Terry Lippincott.

Jaguar finished first and third in the inaugural Shanghai E-Prix and is in first place in overall points standings.

Membership Musings

Faithful readers of this column will appreciate that every now and then (okay, more often than not) I tend to go "off road" a bit. This month will be no exception, as I intend to explore some of my favorite subjects: healthy kids, worthy causes, serendipity (a/k/a dumb luck), happy endings, and of course cool cars. Bear with me here, and I'll try to pull those things together.

First the cool cars, and specifically Cool Cars for Kids, the non-profit philanthropic organization which was conceived to sponsor the yearly Philadelphia Concours to be held again at the Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum on June 22-23, 2024.



Pictured above is the Philadelphia Concours team who joined us for the DVJC Concours at Hope Lodge last weekend, led by our own Dr. Ian Krantz. By now you know that Jaguar will be the feature marque at this event, and that our club will be very well represented. I encourage you not to miss what will undoubtedly be an amazing gathering of fabulous automobiles for an exceptionally worthy cause, namely research and clinical care at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) for children and their families with rare genetic diagnoses.



What you may not be aware of is just how exceptional are the services at CHOP and how fortunate we are to have this resource here in the Delaware Valley. I can attest to this from personal family experience. You see, in July 1985, our third child (first daughter) was born with what we would later learn was a type of congenital heart defect known as atrioventricular canal. In laymen's terms, baby Celeste had holes in the walls separating all four chambers of her heart, and issues with her mitral and tricuspid valves, which were fused. Nothing prepares you for that kind of news as a parent.

After the shock of that diagnosis, we became laser focused on finding the kind of medical expertise which could save her young life. Little did we know that it was near at hand. That's where serendipity comes in. It happens that my college roommate, Dr. Bill Clarke, was at CHOP at the time, doing a fellowship in pediatric intensive Very bright guy, MD/PhD from Duke, care. trained at Seattle Children's Hospital, double boarded in pediatrics and anesthesiology. Curiously, Bill is also one of those people to whom crazy things just seem to happen on a regular basis. (Some cases in point: 1. While doing his regular gig as a DJ at WDBS, the Duke campus radio station, he was on the air the one occasion when the Emergency Broadcast System mistakenly sent through a "live" message instead of a test message. 2. He spent a summer among the Amish community in Lancaster, PA, studying genetic disease prevalence. While there, among other things, he learned to be a farrier (equine hoof care). When he returned to school for our junior year, a travelling circus visited the Duke

campus. There was an animal emergency and, long story short, Bill used his blacksmith skills to replace a shoe on the "Wonder Horse" because the show must go on. All true.)

So naturally, Bill was among the first people we called when we received Celeste's diagnosis. He was responsible for getting us the care she needed, from a wonderful pediatric cardiologist to a renowned pediatric cardiac surgeon who had recently relocated to CHOP from Boston Children's Medical Center (Harvard). I am endlessly grateful to the team at CHOP for my daughter's good health, even to the resident who turned up at her crib-side with the results of a cardiac catheterization on Halloween night, attired in a rainbow wig and a red clown nose.

If you have followed the story this far, you surely understand why I am passionate about the cause of Cool Cars for Kids. There are a variety of ways to support the effort; I implore you to choose one. The "Gala Dinner" on Saturday, June 22 is a fun event featuring fabulous cars, mostly Jaguars this year, displayed in the museum. There's good food and wine, courtesy of the Dick Vermeil Vineyards (yes, Coach Vermeilnow a vintner). That evening there will also be an auction of some unique automotive related items, with all proceeds for charity. Those "Junior Jaguars" (mini F-Types) which we displayed at the DVJC Concours will be up for grabs. Why not bid on one and gladden the heart of a child, all while making a tax deductible auction donation?



And, of course, the Sunday Concours itself, featuring a Jaguar "Field of Honor" will be a sight to behold, for a nominal admission fee. Rarely do events to support such worthy causes come along, that are actually fun, not to mention automotive fun! At the outset, I mentioned happy endings. Here are a few. Because of the skill and dedication of the CHOP family, Celeste's heart was repaired successfully with one harrowing surgery. She went on to excel academically and was graduated from Georgetown University School of Foreign Service, and The Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies. She is in consulting practice in Washington, DC, and now has a healthy four year old daughter of her own (see below). Bill Clarke recently retired from the practice of medicine, but is still shoeing horses on his farm in New Hampshire. His daughter is now a pediatric anesthesiologist. My how we are blessed.

Welcome New Members

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The JaguarSport venture produced the XJR-S, here seen in 6.0-liter form with the full body kit and Speedline alloy wheels (set against the racetrack backdrop and Jaguar's Le Mans-winning car).

A joint venture set up by Jaguar and TWR created JaguarSport in 1988 to produce a modified XJ-S called the XJR-S, to be sold through a select number of Jaguar dealerships. The idea was to develop a younger market for the XJ-S.

The cars underwent assembly at Browns Lane as a normal car but were then shipped down to TWR's facility near Oxford for conversion and finishing. Special body kits and Speedline alloy wheels with lower profile Pirelli tires were fitted, and minor changes to the interior took place. Initially the XJR-S cars were mechanically similar to factory models, but later a 6.0-liter V-12 engine was developed before Jaguar's own engine in 1993. The cars were equipped with Zetec sequential ignition and modified intakes, which along with altered spring rates and the new wheels/tires boosted performance.

When the facelifted XJS was announced, JaguarSport versions were also produced. Most were coupes, but some convertibles were made for the US market. In the 1990s, a JaguarSport cost over \pounds 6,000 more than a production car, and after around 800 were produced the project was dropped in 1993.

The Jaguar's Purr

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Ever since I was a child, I had a thing for Jaguars – when my dad took me to car shows in the 70s I was always attracted to the older XK models and drooled over the long-hooded XKEs – somehow even as I child I was attracted to the coupes more than the convertibles – feeling the coupes were the more closely related to their racing cousins. When my close friend's dad brought home one of the first XJS models, I was hooked. I fell in love with the car even though I heard all of the complaints of it not being as graceful and proportioned as its predecessor. Something about the coupe with its rear window pillars and low sleek elegant lines got under my skin.

Of course the next 20 years of my life became consumed by school (college and more college and then medical school) and student loans - it wasn't until I finally finished training and started to have real jobs (with real salaries) that I began to realize my childhood fantasies of owning a classic - on a limited budget the Jags were still out of reach (both due to initial purchase prices and then the specter of high maintenance fees) and I had to quench the classic thirst with a 1958 MGA (coupe of course!) – in British racing green nonetheless - a cute car with classic lines (a pseudo-XK120 substitute - apologies to MG fans). I enjoyed this car for many years, slowly upgrading it to like new condition – however my wandering eyes were always searching for that classic XJS.

In the mid 90's I found myself at a classic car dealer in New York with my uncle – there on the shop floor was a beautiful XJS coupe in British racing green - I told my uncle that it was beautiful, but I was holding out for a rare 5 speed manual version – he glanced in the car and said – guess what? It's a manual.

I took it for a test drive – it was an awesome car – but the price was way too high at the time and it still needed significant work (when I looked in the glove compartment there was a puddle of water – yikes!). I passed assuming I would be able to find comparable cars down the road when I was more financially solvent. After several years and no luck finding a similar car, I was disillusioned. I sold the MGA in preparation for an upgrade to a Jag (again sorry MG fans). Shortly after the sale of the MGA, while attending a work meeting in Spain, while cruising eBay motors for my fantasy cars of choice (an activity I am embarrassed to say I spend much too much time doing) – there she was – the very same XJS coupe with the 5 speed Getrag manual transmission that I had seen in that New York show room some 5 years earlier. I was about to board a flight home but submitted a bid with a max limit and boarded the plane.

Upon arrival back in the states and a quick check on eBay, I found I had "won" the auction and at a ridiculously low price (a tenth of the price that the dealer was asking for the exact same car 5 years earlier) - I was delighted, shocked, worried...heart and soul be happy but buyer beware!

A few days later I was at the seller's lot in the Bronx in New York and there she stood – beautifully gleaming in the sun in her British racing green glory – she looked intact if not a bit rough around the edges – started right up and ran well with clean shifting – I took off to bring her back home to Philadelphia. Nothing quite equals the elation of that first drive of a new (to me) classic let alone one that I had lusted after for the better part of almost 3 decades...

She made it home safe and sound and I brought her into Mike Tillson's restoration shop the following week for an inspection. Nothing quite equals the deflation of the reality when the condition of the classic car you have lusted after for decades is realized. I remember Mike telling me that I should be grateful that I survived the drive down from New York – the car was severely rusted underneath, and while it was mechanically sound there was a laundry list of critical body repair, mechanical and electrical needs the car would need.

And so, I was at the precipice of a decision – return the car for a refund or move forward with restoration – the classic brain vs the heart debate. The brain realized what would be involved, in time and cost for a car that would never recoup those expenses – the heart knew how long it had taken to find this car (being one of only 33 US

spec cars brought in with the factory 5 speed manual) – after crunching some numbers (which were, stereotypically, a gross underestimate of the actual costs) – the decision was made to restore the cat.

And so began the 4-year journey to do a complete strip down rust repair, body work, repaint (back to its factory original beautiful Antelope), interior restoration and mechanical and electric repair. While the costs were staggering at times, the process was thrilling – to see this beautiful machine once again regain its original splendor and to work closely with the artisans and mechanics that brought it back to life was truly a highlight of my car collecting voyage – and almost worth the cost!

I owned this car for almost 15 years and it gave me immense pleasure (although it continued to frustrate a long stream of mechanics!), culminating with it being featured in the DVJC's annual calendar for June (the month of the Philadelphia Concours d'Elegance that I organize along with Mike Tillson and the non-profit Cool Cars for Kids with the gracious support of the DVJC and Bill Beible this year as Jaguar is the feature marque – taking place at the Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum and June 22nd and 23rd). But like many of us, the classic car enthusiast within can be a fickle beast to satisfy, and earlier this year, another British fantasy car of mine, the Bentley Continental GT (coupe of course) that I had been stalking for several years - appeared at a price point I couldn't refuse – and so the Jaguar had to find a new home (either that or my marriage). And while I am sad not have the "Jagged 1" as I had named her, still in my garage, I take solace in the fact that the car has been restored and a small but important piece of Jaguar history has been preserved – and will always have a passion spot in my heart. As Jaguar turns to a potential all-electric fleet in the near future it is comforting to know that somewhere out there, there is an old cat with a purring combustion engine and a rare manual transmission to help propel it down the road hopefully for the next generation to enjoy.

Down to bare metal respray in 2014 @35,600 miles, so only 2400 miles driven since. No rust found at that time; minimal body work required. Additional work done at that time: Gearbox refurbished. New dash top pad; new canvas boot cover for the the hood (top) when lowered; new passenger window regulator; new Dayton wire wheels with General tires; new bonnet strut; various seals/gaskets.



Other work done during current ownership: New main engine seals; front brakes and calipers; stainless steel exhaust system; new seatbelts; overhead cam gaskets replaced; heater blower replaced; new shift boot and trim; replacement Motolita wooden steering wheel (original available) and wooden shift knob; new main and secondary clutch cylinders; new main brake cylinder; rebuilt oil pressure sending unit and gauge recalibration—now works the way it should.

This E-Type is a fine driver level E-type, but I am not driving it sufficiently, and I am at the point where I need to downsize. I would love to see the car go to someone in the club.
