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

## ++ Adding Up the Numbers ++

Four percent of the nearly three hundred members and co-members of DVJC contribute their time and talents to run our club for the benefit of everyone else. As I outlined in my recent letter to you, volunteers are needed to fill several key roles. The most pressing vacancy is treasurer which is opening following Jim Sjoreen's six years of service.

Unlike the other vacancies which are appointments with ratification by the board of directors, this position must be filled by election. According to our bylaws, nominations for the coming election must be received no later than mid-November. Now is the time to "raise your hand" and volunteer to serve as club treasurer.

Prior to Jim's three terms (six years), I served as treasurer for four years. All club accounting is done using QuickBooks which is the business version of Quicken personal accounting software. Typical tasks include paying bills, recording income, reconciling the checking account, preparing quarterly reports (using "canned" routines within Quicken) and developing the annual budget. A few supplemental reports are prepared using a spreadsheet such as Excel. On average, these tasks take 4 to 5 hours/month to complete.

Anyone who has working familiarity with basic accounting can be effective in this role. Within DVJC, I'm confident there are many people with bookkeeping experience, accounting training, CPA credentials or experience operating businesses, all of whom could be candidates to fill this position. If you manage the finances in your home, you have the background and skills to serve as treasurer!

Jim will be available to coach you and ensure a smooth transition of duties. Feel free to contact Jim (jsjoreen3860@comcast.net) or me (bill.beible@gmail.com) with any questions.

Just when I was thinking there was nothing notable to write about this month, the automotive geniuses at Hagerty threw another infuriating article disrespecting classic British cars over the transom. You might recall (although there's probably no reason why you would) my offering from March of this year in which I discussed, with righteous indignation, the Hagerty Insider piece entitled "Do Classic Jaguars Face a Dark Future?" Well, they're back at it, with another entitled "Have British Sports Cars Had Their Day?" 


Emanuel Pirvulescu's 2003 XK8 Convertible

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
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
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
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As you may already know, the first car I ever owned was a Carmen Red 1958 Jaguar 3.4 Litre Sedan with wire wheels and Lucas Flamethrower fog lamps, otherwise known as a MK1. I had seen this particular car many years earlier when I was on my paper route, and I later bought it with \$600 of saved paper route money. It was a beautiful car, with lots of power and a luxurious leather and walnut interior. That started me on a long path of Jaguar ownership. One thing that I learned was that if I wanted to own, and more importantly drive a Jaguar I needed to be able to repair it, so I became proficient in doing my own mechanical work. This came in handy when 50 vears later I saw a 1960 MK IX advertised on Bring A Trailer.

The car had originally been sold in Canada but had spent its most recent years in the Klairmont Kollections Automotive Museum in Chicago. There they had "restored" it, in which their top priority was making it look beautiful, but I later learned that since it was a static display they completely neglected any repairs to make it functional. It was able to move under its own power, but that was about it. What I saw was a car that had beautiful paint, chrome and interior, and I figured that since those attributes were the most difficult and expensive items in a restoration it was a good place for me to start. I told myself that if there were any mechanical issues I could probably handle them, so I bought the car sightunseen.

When the transporter delivered the car it looked as nice as the pictures indicated, but I decided to give the car a good inspection before venturing out on the road. I also needed to learn something about the MK IX model, since I was totally unfamiliar with it.

As I learned, they only made 10,000 of them, and the MK IX was the last version of the big Jaguar saloons that began with the MK VII in 1950, which resembled the Rolls-Royce and Bentleys of the era. The MK IX was introduced by Jaguar at the same time as the more modern and smaller MK2 sedan, and the bigger car incorporated many of the modern improvements that had been introduced in the new car. These included power steering, four-wheel power-assisted disc brakes, and the 3.8 liter XK engine. However, the controls were different from anything I was familiar with, so I needed to learn what all the knobs and switches did. That was made difficult by the fact that none of the switches seemed to have any effect at all. Luckily I had some friends and advisors on Jag-lovers.com who walked me through the sparse documentation that was available about this car, and I was eventually able to get the electrical systems working.

Next, I figured I should take a look at the brakes. One of the front wheel bearing seals had failed so there was a thick coating of grease on the brake rotor, caliper and pads, so I took the brake apart to clean it. When I peeled back the rubber boot on the brake cylinder I was greeted with what looked like a mixture of rust and mud, with perhaps a little brake fluid mixed in.



I looked a little closer at the rusted, pitted cylinder, then carefully put it all back together, gathered all the cylinders and sent them all to White Post for rebuilding. It turns out that the brakes that were used on the big heavy MK IX were a different size than were used in any other car, so parts were not necessarily easy to find. When it came time to bleed the brakes I discovered that I couldn't get any fluid to come out of the front brake cylinders. It turns out that sometime in the past someone had installed the incorrect brake light switch, and when it was screwed in it completely blocked the junction to the front brakes. Since the junction block and the switch were both covered in the same layer of oily crud, it made me wonder how long this car had been driven without any front brakes.

I also learned that the tie rods were supposed to be straight...



...and the drive shaft was supposed to be held together with two keys and a big nut, rather than with a single  $\frac{1}{4}$ " bolt drilled through the two pieces.



The car came from the factory with a sliding sun roof, and to drain rainwater away it had tubes that led from the four corners of the opening down to the tire wells. When the museum had repaired the bodywork they had simply welded panels over the openings where the water should drain, so if it rained the water would pool inside the body. Luckily I had a willing friend who took pictures of his car with a ruler to show me where the drain holes should be, and I was able to drill holes in the proper locations and fish the drain hoses out.

I could go on and on, but you get the idea. I made a list of all the repairs that I made to the car, and the list is fully two pages long. This car, when it arrived, was a prime example of the old adage, "Beauty is only skin deep". However, I'm reaching the point where I'm able to spend more time driving it than repairing it, and the driving experience makes all the work worthwhile.

Down to bare metal respray in 2014 @35,600 miles, so only 2400 miles driven since. No rust found at that time; minimal body work required. Additional work done at that time: Gearbox refurbished. New dash top pad; new canvas boot cover for the the hood (top) when lowered; new passenger window regulator; new Dayton wire wheels with General tires; new bonnet strut; various seals/gaskets.



Other work done during current ownership: New main engine seals; front brakes and calipers; stainless steel exhaust system; new seatbelts; overhead cam gaskets replaced; heater blower replaced; new shift boot and trim; replacement Motolita wooden steering wheel (original available) and wooden shift knob; new main and secondary clutch cylinders; new main brake cylinder; rebuilt oil pressure sending unit and gauge recalibration—now works the way it should.

This E-Type is a fine driver level E-type, but I am not driving it sufficiently, and I am at the point where I need to downsize. I would love to see the car go to someone in the club.

### 2024 Car Show Calendar

With fall upon us and the car show season nearing its end, you may be planning to put your car away for the winter. While storing a car can have some benefits, it's not ideal to let it sit unused for long stretches. Here are my recommendations:

- Consider adding a fuel stabilizer to your gas tank; even high-octane fuel contains 10% ethanol.
- Fill the gas tank to prevent rust formation.
- Disconnect the battery via a kill switch, or use a battery tender.
- Overinflate the tires to prevent flat spots.
- At least once a month, start and run the car until it reaches operating temperature.
- Drive the car 40 to 50 feet to operate the braking system.
- It's always a good ideal to change the oil before winter starts.

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
