## ++ Adding Up the Numbers ++

Four percent of the nearly three hundred members and co-members of DVJC contribute their time and talents to run our club for the benefit of everyone else. As I outlined in my recent letter to you, volunteers are needed to fill several key roles. The most pressing vacancy is treasurer which is opening following Jim Sjoreen's six years of service.

Unlike the other vacancies which are appointments with ratification by the board of directors, this position must be filled by election. According to our bylaws, nominations for the coming election must be received no later than mid-November. Now is the time to "raise your hand" and volunteer to serve as club treasurer.

Prior to Jim's three terms (six years), I served as treasurer for four years. All club accounting is done using QuickBooks which is the business version of Quicken personal accounting software. Typical tasks include paying bills, recording income, reconciling the checking account, preparing quarterly reports (using "canned" routines within Quicken) and developing the annual budget. A few supplemental reports are prepared using a spreadsheet such as Excel. On average, these tasks take 4 to 5 hours/month to complete.

Anyone who has working familiarity with basic accounting can be effective in this role. Within DVJC, I'm confident there are many people with bookkeeping experience, accounting training, CPA credentials or experience operating businesses, all of whom could be candidates to fill this position. If you manage the finances in your home, you have the background and skills to serve as treasurer!

Jim will be available to coach you and ensure a smooth transition of duties. Feel free to contact Jim (jsjoreen3860@comcast.net) or me (bill.beible@gmail.com) with any questions.



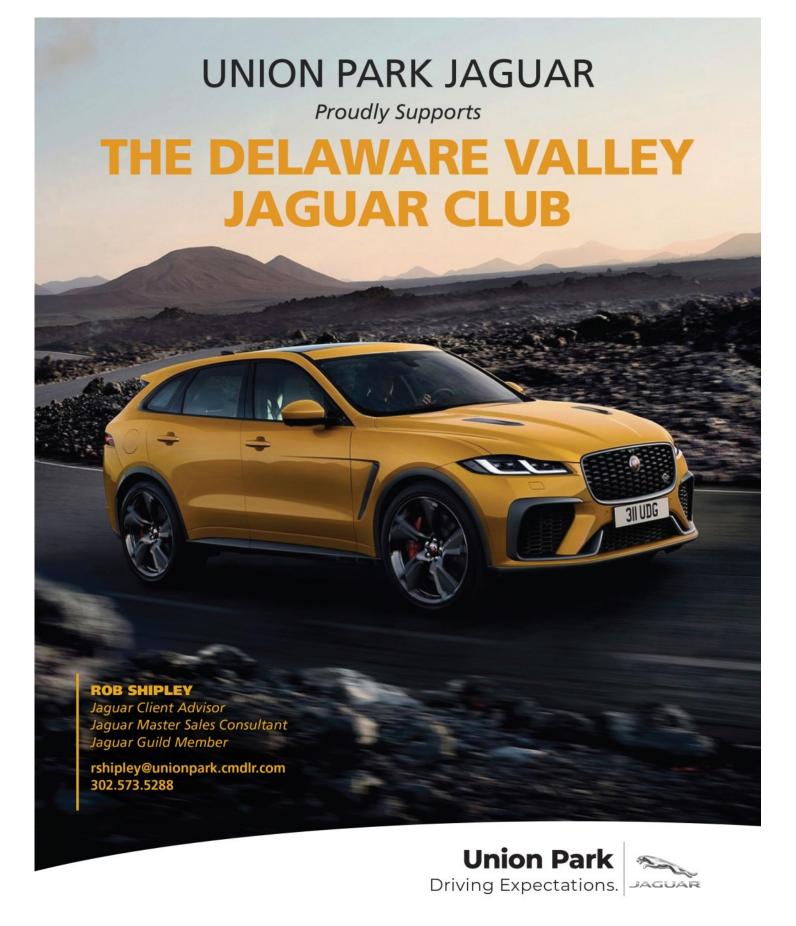



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## 2005 XJ8, November Calendar Car





On a gorgeous Sunday morning October 6, 2024, about 35 DVJC members and guests joined over 150 other automobile and music enthusiasts convening at the Brantwyn Estate in Rockland, DE for the "Classics at Brantwyn." This year the charitable event raised about \$20,000, representing an important part of the annual funds required to sustain the self-supported Kennett Symphony. For many years, the Symphony has depended on



this annual fundraising event that includes a spectacular parade of classic automobiles and soon-to-be classics at a turn of the

century grand estate. Along with cars, the event features a catered lunch and the trademark Lamborghini Bellinis which are served throughout the day.

First organized by Sandy Thompson about 16 years ago, the Grand Parade of cars follows the circular driveway pausing in front of the estate where one of the chairpersons associated with the soiree narrate each car's story of ownership and remarkable automotive attributes. Joining historically significant classics in the parade is a hand-picked selection of outstanding exotic and unique modern cars.



Our good friend and longtime DVJC member and past president, Paul Merluzzi, assumed the chair position about 2012 and continued it until his recent passing earlier this year. There were many tributes paid to Paul during the event. His surviving wife, Irena, and daughter, Erica, each reflected on memories of this glamorous event held over the years. As Paul's family grew, so did the significance of classic cars in Paul's life. Paul had many automobile enthusiast friends who were both collectors and benefactors of the Symphony and those present shared fond memories and stories of Paul from prior years' events throughout the day.

This year Paul's gem of a 1958 Jaguar BRG XK150 FHC, driven by DVJC member Carol Petrow, led the Grand Parade of over 40 cars. David Ventura, Paul's longtime friend and volun-

teer, delivered a very moving tribute. He spoke about Paul's life and his family acknowledging their dedication to the "Classics Brantwyn" and



all the lives he touched during his lifetime with cars and music. David also described the history and significance of Paul's XK150 FHC over his 22-year stewardship of this special classic Jaguar as it paraded around the circle to a resounding cornucopia of applause and salutes on its way to a special parking place respectfully apart from all the other parade and show cars.

After the tribute to Paul, David Ventura introduced the other parade participants including many DVJC members. He presented over 40 classic and soon-to-be-classic cars followed with introductions and presentation of notes of historical and automotive significance on each of these classics or soon-to-be classics with Brantwyn as the backdrop.

A brunch buffet followed with tables inside and outside on the patio. Many DVJC members were seated together and spent time catching up. The gorgeous day and light jazz performance in front of the mansion drew everyone outside to the full display of magnificent cars staged in the front lawn to vote for their favorite classic. With pens



and score cards in hand, attendees had ample time to decide which of the many candidates would win their vote for best of show.

After all the votes were counted, Dwight Bedsole walked away with his copy of the "Classics at Brantwyn" poster signed by everyone in the Grand Parade as the Best in Show recipient for his perfectly prepared 1937 Packard.



It was truly a great event in memory of Paul Merluzzi - a respected classic car enthusiast and well-loved benefactor of the highly accomplished Kennett Symphony. Everyone in attendance eagerly awaits news of next year's event.

Brantwyn Estate - Venue for the "Classics at Brantwyn."

The history of the Brantwyn Estate and this classic Georgian Revival mansion begins when it was built sometime around 1830. It was the home of Pierre S. du Pont III who was an early executive of the corporation bearing his name and who was responsible for the development of two important and profitable products: cellophane and nylon. His son Pete grew up in the mansion and surrounding grounds and eventually became Governor of the State and later ran for President of the United Sates.

The historic and magnificent 28,000 sq ft home is centered on a large and scenic estate originally named Bois-Des-Fosses after the du Ponte family name in France until Pierre's death in 1988. The huge estate was thoughtfully divided and purchased by the DuPont Company in 1991. The

company wisely decided not to demolish the home and formal gardens that had been carefully curated by Pierre during his lifetime. Pierre




was also directly responsible for the even more magnificent formal gardens and fountains synchronized with classical musical pieces played by local symphonies on summer evenings that still present to the public at today's modernized Longwood Gardens. At that time, the Company decided to refurbish the house and surroundings to use for weddings and special events such as this one. In 1991, the remaining acreage and buildings of Bois-Des-Fosses were renamed Brantwyn and is still used for this purpose. Perhaps befitting of Peirre's ties to automobiles during his tenure managing General Motors from 1915 to 1920, becoming president of a major automobile manufacturer in 1920 and serving of the GM Board of Directors until 1928, he must have also appreciated classic automobiles as this was a time of great leaps forward in automotive engineering and design. The "Classics at Brantwyn" certainly pays tribute to this great period of automobile history and continues to do so.








This saga began when Margaret and I were driving our 1963 E-type coupe to Tom and Carolyn Shaners House for a Jaguar club "Gathering of Friends" on September 14<sup>th</sup>. As we were cruising along, I noticed that if I took the engine over 1800 rpm's it would start to misfire. Making a mental note to deal with that later, we continued. The ride home was uneventful, carefully keeping the rev's low. That evening I removed the distributor cap and checked the point gap. The feeler gauge slipped snugly between the points, but only about halfway. The points were badly pitted. I ordered a new set of points from SNG Barratt on Monday and installed them right away.



I took it for a test drive, Wow! It accelerated better than ever. I considered that a job well done and put it out of my mind. It was ready for our trip to Brantwyn on October 6<sup>th</sup>. It was a 64 mile run taking an hour and a quarter. Our Jag was running beautifully for an hour. Then, on I476, it felt like I had just turned the key off. We coasted for long time before pulling over. I popped the bonnet and boot and got out my tool roll when I saw a flash of red go by and the sound of someone going down through the gears and skittering to stop before backing up to the front of our car. That was a V12 E-Type and my first introduction to Charlie Epstein.

We chatted for a bit and decided to check for spark by removing a spark plug and cranking the engine. No spark! Next it was off with the distributor cap and rotor. Everything was in place, no sign of broken wires or burnt anything! To check for spark at the points, I carefully wiggled a screwdriver behind the plastic piece that rides on the cam to open and close the points. There was spark all right, I felt it in my left elbow as it went to ground. I hadn't done that in years, it's quite a jolt! I was perplexed though, because I couldn't find anything wrong, so I put everything back together again, pressed the start button and the engine roared to life. Charlie took off and I stayed behind him.

Google maps said we were 1.8 miles from our destination when the engine quit again. Charlie had gone around the next corner and we lost him. Now we were back to, I think it's called, "rinse and repeat." - bonnet and boot open, tools out. This time I took out my beautiful Jaguar blanket and placed it on the ground so I would be more comfortable on my knees while working on the distributor. At that point Bob D'Intino drove up in his 1967 E-Type Coupe. It was good to see a familiar face.

After a brief explanation it was time to take the distributor cap off again and look for something that would tell me what was wrong. I just knew the problem was somehow involved in the new points, so I started to remove them when a little plastic spacer popped out of my fingers and went somewhere. I couldn't find it on the ground or on any ledge or nook or cranny. We couldn't go anywhere without it. We rolled the car forward, carefully noting where I might have dropped it and we looked and looked to no avail.

It was time to call Hagerty for a ride in a rollback. That was the last thing we wanted to do. They sent an App to my phone and I filled in all the particulars and sent it off. While waiting for a reply I got down under the bonnet again, closed my eyes and just started feeling about on the subframes, on the stone shields and around the engine. I found a place where the engine mount attaches to the cast-iron block, creating a little valley, if you will. In there, my little finger slipped over something smooth and round. I couldn't move it though, so I placed a little Allen wrench between my fingers and was able to move it to within reach. Retrieving it was a small victory though because the original problem still hadn't been found. Still, I knew we would be able

to continue if the problem was solved. I did the same electrical test for spark and got the same result, a powerful shock to my elbow. I'm still learning things the hard way. Re-check the point gap? Why not. First step is to turn the engine until the points rest on a cam lobe. This is easily done by shifting into fourth gear, key off, hand brake off and pushing on the front wheel. But wait, the points are already open! And they are not resting on a cam lobe! Why?? The points were hanging up on their pivot post. I lightly touched the points and they closed.


I found the problem! Now to fix it. I needed something to open up the hole in the plastic contact breaker lever that fitted onto the pivot post. I had no drills, no small round file, no sandpaper, nothing. Then I picked up the feeler gauge again. To my surprise it fit snugly into the hole and as I turned it, it actually scraped a little and then the hole felt smooth. It slipped easily back onto its

post. Time to reassemble everything and get back on the road. A touch on the starter and a roar from the engine confirmed that all was well again. Good. Now to continue on to Brantwyn and enjoy the rest of our outing.

A big "thank you" goes to Charlie and Bob, and Denise and Jim Sjoreen who also stopped to offer assistance.

Back in the day, when all cars had this type of point ignition system, it was common practice to replace them at regular intervals. It was easy. You take the points out of the package, put them in your car, set the point gap and you're good for many thousands of miles.

Now there are more steps that must be taken since the only place we seem to be able to buy them is from China (said by one of our major suppliers of Jaguar parts). First, remove the mounting plate from the distributor (two screws) and mount the points. Don't bother with attaching the spring at this time. Make sure that the plastic piece pivots easily on its post. If not, use a #12 drill bit in a hand held drill to gently enlarge the hole. It must move freely on its shaft. Once that step is complete, hold the assembly up to the light to see if the two surfaces of the points fit flat against each other, they probably won't. Use a tool such as needle nose pliers to gently and firmly bend the arm until the points align perfectly. Once this step is done, your points should function properly. I hope this is a help to club members who still have an old car with ignition points.

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






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#### DVJC Member Cars Shine at "Brits at the Village" Show



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
