Annual General Meeting Frequently Asked Questions

1. What is the AGM and why is it held each year?

- a. Jaguar Clubs of North America bylaws require conducting an annual meeting of representatives for local clubs such as ours. Clubs are represented by delegates appointed by club boards of directors or by proxies that the clubs designate.
- b. Annual election of the president and vice president of JCNA occurs at the AGM.
- c. Competition rule changes (concours, slalom and rally) require affirmative votes of delegates.
- d. Other matters may, from time to time, require a vote of local club delegates.
- e. Review and discussion of numerous issues of interest to local clubs and their membership occur as part of the meeting. There is an extensive agenda published on the JCNA website in advance of the meeting.

2. Has DVJC selected delegates?

a. Ed Petrow and Tim Duckett will serve as the delegates from DVJC.

3. Are there other benefits to AGMs?

- a. Developing and maintaining networks with members of clubs throughout North America.
- b. Exchanging ideas and sharing experiences helps all clubs improve.
- c. Local club members meet and interact with JCNA officers, directors and staff.

4. Is the AGM "strictly business"?

- a. Absolutely not! The weekend program includes the formal AGM business meeting, "tech sessions," a driving tour, two social events and ample free time to make new friends.
- b. Social events include an evening at the Simeone Museum with a "Taste of Philly" buffet dinner on Friday and a cocktail hour and banquet Saturday evening.

5. Are DVJC members invited to participate in the full slate of weekend activities?

- a. Yes! Our members are encouraged to participate in as many activities as they would like. All events are open to club members including the formal business meeting of the AGM which takes place on Saturday. However, only club delegates may vote on AGM proposals.
- b. "Members" includes both members of a household (member and co-member).
- c. Events are "a la Carte." You are only required to register and pay for events you will be attending. There is no general AGM fee and no fee for the Covered Bridge Drive.

6. What 'special' events will be central to the Saturday Evening dinner? Having just spent several hours seeing DVJC friends at the Friday events, is there something else about the Saturday dinner that would justify spending the time/money to come to it?

- a. The keynote speaker at the Awards Banquet on Saturday evening is Brandon Baldassari, Jaguar's Director of Brand Development. He will be addressing the reimagining of Jaguar and its new, highly anticipated product line.
- b. A famous "mystery guest" will join us for cocktails and dinner.
- c. Gary Kincel, Coventry Foundation Chairman of the BOD, will be presenting a Founders Award to someone who has made major contributions to sustaining Jaguar Heritage.
- d. JCNA service, competition and newsletter awards will be presented. DVJC members are usually well represented among the recipients of these awards

7. Why is DVJC organizing this "national event"?

- a. Hosting this meeting rotates between clubs throughout JCNA.
- b. We hosted a very successful meeting in 2015 at the Sheraton Society Hill in Philadelphia.
- c. Hosting that event gave our club a "big boost." As volunteers helping with the meeting, many members became acquainted with each other and the vitality of the club took a big step UP!

I'm quite certain that our DVJC AGM team has done all of the necessary to replicate that success! The

Last year, it was a revelation to attend the Saturday morning business meeting of JCNA, which by the way is open to all club members and not merely the delegates. Jay and I were amazed by the passion evidenced on such seemingly mundane topics as esoteric changes to the judging rules. Just as interestingly, the business session provided some real insight and familiarity with the leadership of JCNA. It's worth attending this just to see the inner workings of the association. I could go on at length about all of the meeting events (but I promise not to!). You can discover that on your own or on the website. What I'd really like to discuss is a meeting benefit which I'll call "the friendship dividend". The Storied "E3A"

I am also a big fan of the technical sessions which are part of each year's AGM. Again, you can see the full menu of session choices at the AGM website. I'd like to mention one in particular, entitled "Bootleg Racer: An E2A Homage". Presented by our own Kevin Fitzgerald and Terry Lippincott, this session will chronicle the extraordinary story of transformation of a 1963 E-type Jaguar, redesigned and rebuilt over a period of two years. Kevin will describe the restoration stages of this bonafide racecar to its current roadregistered and track worthy status. Using the famous E2A Jaguar prototype as inspiration, Kevin and Terry produced a sleek, sinewy Europeanstyled sports racer with an array of new mechanical and aesthetic enhancements. Their sculptural and engineering work of art is unique among all Jaguars.



I've been assisting Kevin in the preparation of the slides for this session, and I can tell you the story is captivating. You don't want to miss this one! AND, spoiler alert, as a bonus feature the actual E3A racer will join us for the meeting as part of a display of very special Jaguars in front of the Sheraton, courtesy of Terry.


I hope all of you can participate in the AGM in one way or another, and I look forward to seeing many of you there!







I'm not into naming my cars, so my 2001 Jaguar XKR is simply known as "The XKR". The XKR was a bit of a consolation prize, I guess. Unknown to me at the time, the 2011 Lime Rock Vintage Festival marked the end of my all too short vintage racing career. A health issue that surfaced prior to the 2012 season prompted the painful decision to give up what I had dreamed of doing since I was a little boy. Selling the race car left a hole in my garage and my heart.

I had admired the Jaguar X100 (XK8/XKR) coupe ever since I saw one during a business trip in the UK years ago. After the race car was gone, I thought "An XK8 Coupe would be a nice car to fill both holes". So I began the search. Initially I really wasn't interested in an XKR. I felt the supercharged engine might lead me into temptation. Also it could be an additional maintenance concern. Very quickly I discovered that coupes were not quite as popular as the convertibles, but undaunted I continued the search. After several months I located one in the Lancaster area that looked good in the photos. I was disappointed to find a sorry looking Racing Green coupe in very sad condition. I didn't even bother to drive it. The search continued.

Late one night in March of 2013 I saw an ad for a 2001 XKR Coupe in Anthracite Black over Warm Charcoal. The car looked stunning in the photos. Shying away from an XKR sort of evaporated that night. The car was offered by Motorcars, Inc. in Connecticut. The next day I called to make sure the car was still there and started positioning a drive to Connecticut with Sue. After all it was only a four hour drive.... each way. We planned a day the following week and drove up. I was smitten when I first saw it as we pulled onto the lot. On the test drive I gave Joe, the salesman, a bit of a start. We were approaching a tight uphill left curve and he said "You might want to take this a bit slow.....oh I see you have this in hand." The XKR handled quite nicely. We closed a deal which included fixing a couple of little things, and a copy of the service receipt for replacing the timing chain tensioners under the previous ownership. I left a deposit and agreed to return the following week to pick up The XKR.

So, on April 19th, 2013 I rented a car and headed up to Connecticut to pick up The XKR. It was not an uneventful trip up. First, I got a call from my elderly father telling me that he had a strange buzzing sound coming from an electrical outlet in his bathroom. He was an electronic engineer in earlier days, so I was a bit taken aback by his concern. I called a close friend who is the kind of guy who could fix anything, lived close to my dad and knew him well. Then I got a call from Sue telling me that one of the Boston Marathon bombing suspects, who was still on the run at the time, was thought to have been spotted on I-84 so I should be careful and be on the lookout for a small white sedan. Small white sedan is pretty much the description of about every sixth car on the highway. I kept an eye out anyway, especially at the rest stop. I spent the night in a local motel in Plainville, returned the car to Hertz and was picked up in the morning by Joe in a very nice XJ8. The XKR was sitting outside shining like a black jewel.

Ther drive home was uneventful, but quite exhilarating. Oh, I did get a call from my friend regarding the mysterious buzzing. After throwing breakers and doing various other technical diagnostics they discovered, on a shelf way in the back of the vanity, an electric toothbrush that was turned on. We all had a good laugh.

Thus my Jaguar life with The XKR began. We have spent great times together just driving on the great roads in my area. When we weren't driving, The XKR sat quietly in my garage. I know some of you can relate to this; sometimes I would open the door to the garage and just look at it to appreciate its beauty. Life was good for both of us.... However, after a few months I started to notice the supercharger was making a slight rattling noise. I took The XKR to my mechanic, Dana Albitz. Dana had been servicing my wife's X-Type since 2007 and I trusted his diagnostic abilities completely. He said it sounded like the vanes of the supercharger were hitting each other indicating the bearings on the shafts were going bad. We quickly made a plan that included removal of the supercharger to have it rebuilt. Based upon a recommendation from the Jaguar Forum I selected PSE, a supercharger remanufac-

turer located in Edmond Oklahoma, to do the rebuild. After Dana removed it, I packed it up, shipped it to Oklahoma and waited. After several long weeks it returned. While we were waiting, I had Dana replace all of the hoses, clamps, PCV valve and any other things we thought might be easier to replace with the supercharger removed. About a week after I dropped the supercharger off, I got a call that the car was ready, BUT the supercharger was still making some noise. I brought the car home anyway, called PSE and held the phone up to the supercharger with the engine running. The technician on the other end agreed that it didn't sound good. When I told him it was one that they had just remanufactured he immediately said my mechanic had not installed it correctly citing the proper position of a unique bolt. Dana and I both knew there was one mounting bolt that was a few mm longer than the others and it had a specific placement on the supercharger. Dana verified it had been correctly mounted and spoke directly to PSE to no avail. Based upon the way PSE was handling our complaint, I was not comfortable sending it back to them. Knowing that shops are reluctant to try to fix other shops' mistakes I hesitantly send an email to JB Performance in Algona, Iowa. I explained very honestly the situation I was in and asked if they could help. Later that evening I got a reply from Jon Bond, the owner. He was very understanding and offered to repair the supercharger. So, off it came again and it was shipped to Iowa. Less than two weeks later I got a call from Jon telling me it was on its way back to me. He indicated the "remanufacture" was perhaps the worst he had seen. Rather than replace the bearing plate, PSE had ball peened the bearings in place and they weren't straight. That was the worst of the overall shoddy workmanship he found. He guaranteed the supercharger for 36 months as well. Shortly after it arrived, Dana had my XKR back on the road with a quiet, or quiet as they get, supercharger.


Over the years my XKR and I have had a lot of good times together. We took a couple of second places with high scores in the DVJC Concours. We ran the Slalom together twice. Once taking second fastest time of the day and another setting a time fast enough to secure the JCNA National Championship for our class. We took Sue for a ride around the New Jersey Motorsports Park

racetrack where I had raced several times. I got to explain the lines, technique and experiences of each turn while Sue's eyes glazed over. We drove up to Watkins Glen and again I got to glaze Sue's eyes over with tales of great races I had there.

The XKR has been to numerous DVJC events and various car shows over the years. And like any other long term relationship we have had our ups, downs and moments of pause. Last year The XKR, on the way home from the slalom no less, went into "Restricted Performance" for just long enough to get it safely off the road and shut off. After having it towed to Albitz Garage, the diagnosis from the codes was a faulty Throttle Position Sensor (TPS). Seemed like an easy fix; just replace the TPS. Well... it's a twenty year old Jaguar. To start with, Jaguar never sold the TPS as a separate part. They only sold the complete Throttle Body, for a four figure price tag. Of course, they are no longer available from Jaguar. So, I decided to see if I could find an after market or used TPS. I found a few; but The XKR didn't like any of them. It was getting a bit like trying to find acceptable food for a finicky cat. Dana even built a bench test device to avoid having to remove the one on the car over and over. Finally, we gave up on the TPS replacement and I started looking for a Throttle Body. I found a used one in California and a remanufactured one in Florida. While more expensive, I went with the remanufactured one. Not only did it fix the problem, The XKR really liked it and it ran better than ever,

For the past couple of years, after purchasing a 2004 XK8 convertible, The XKR has been relegated to part time storage away from home. As much as I enjoyed driving the XK8, I always missed the XKR when it wasn't here. So just yesterday I sold the XK8 to a club member who will give it a good home. The XKR is now home again for good. Now I can peer into the garage again and admire its beauty. I knew from that first glance up in Connecticut, The XKR is a keeper.



5.3-liter V12 engine

Notably, the troublesome OE Zenith-Stromberg carburetors have been replaced with reproduction SU carburetors that are currently available from Moss Motors for \$4300. These offer much better adjustment of idle mixture and fuel metering at speed and load. At that time, all fuel hoses and clamps were replaced. Also of note, the distributer has been re-





curved to incorporate vacuum advance rather than vacuum retard. This was done to encourage more suitable shifting from the OE automatic and better throttle response under load. These and other modifications retain much of the originality of these remarkable V12 engines but with notable performance improvement making this particular 5.3-liter V12 exceptionally well suited for use with a manual transmission. This engine runs perfectly and without fault as is shown in video clips that are available upon request. It is 100% reliable and in excellent cosmetic and mechanical condition and ready for installation in a suitable chassis. Most XKE Series 3 specific accessories are also included such as the recently rebuilt OE carbs, alternator, starter, electronic ignition and A/C compressor converted for R134. Some smaller trim and installation-specific parts such as hoses, balance pipes, wiring, accessory drive belts, etc. are also available. This is an ideal replacement engine for any Series III XKE with a bad engine but will require some parts salvaged from the engine being replaced. A special offering was a1959 Ferrari 250 GT LWB California Spider Competizione, (estimate was \$10,000,000 - \$14,000,000), sold to a bidder for \$9,465,000. And of interest to Jaguar Enthusiasts, a spectacular 1954 Jaguar XKD-403 Factory Team Car Works Competition, which had been driven by the likes of Stirling Moss, Norman Dewis, etc. (estimate was \$6,500,000 - \$8,500,000), was sold for \$4,295,000.

Thursday evening after the day's events, many of us gathered at another favorite seafood place, Down Under, literally under the A1A South 8th Street Bridge. Great place, good pints, good seafood.

Friday evening after the day's events, many of us gathered at a favorite seafood place overlooking the water, Sandollar Restaurant & Marina (sandollarrestaurant.com), to reminisce about yet another fabulous Amelia Island gathering.

The Concours itself was moved to Saturday, because of expected heavy rain on Sunday. Thanks to my media parking pass, my "posse" and I, nine of us crawling out of the Jeep Wagoneer parked at the Media lot on the green, were able to get on the field before it opened to the public. We strategically placed our eleven or so lawn chairs behind a row of exotic classic cars. It was easy to find the chairs (and shade later).

The Concours d'Elegance vehicles started driving onto the field, in all marques. It was great to see the sight from "Camp DVJC/DVT" up on the hill, classic cars driving in, instead of just a static show. Our "Camp" was the envy of many people!

And this year, two people we actually knew had cars on the Concours field. A 1939 MG TB, owned by William Goble, that was restored at Ragtops & Roadsters, Dave Hutchison sponsor. The show started with Donald Osborne singing the National Anthem. It won "The Petersen Award". Also on the show field was a 1934 Swallow Sidecar SS1 (European Classic Closed, 1915-1948). Many unknowing Amelia visitors wondered about this "brand-name", not realizing it was an earlier version of the Jaguar name, changed for obvious and notorious reasons.

Also, it was good to catch-up and see Paul Sable again, the retiring Chief Judge for "The Amelia", who I have known for over 40 years. Paul lives locally in Jim Thorpe, PA.

Saturday evening saw us visit a new place, the "Italian Cove." Good food and drink, but a complaint of no salads among the rabbits with us.

"The Amelia" Awards, the two best automobiles which always have their photos lakeside, were as follows:

Best of Show, Concours d'Elegance Winner: 1938 Alfa Romeo 8c 2900, Pre-War

Best of Show Concours de Sport: 1967 Lotus 49-Formula One The Indy Motor Speedway/Tony Hulman Award

Since the Sunday show was moved to Saturday, another seminar was moved to Sunday, "Best of the Amelia, 30", featuring an all-star lineup of past Honorees of the Amelia Island Concours/"The Amelia." The panel included race car drivers David Hobbs (2009); Lyn St. James (2021), Chip Ganassi (2022) and Bobby Rahal (2011). Maintaining the order of the day again was former-NASCAR Crew Chief Ray Evernham. And a surprise guest, Helio Castroneves, the 2025 Honoree, was on hand.

The Amelia always gathers a group of cars that are associated with the honoree. This year about half of the entries were racers. There were some really cool race cars!

Yet another great time had by all!

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












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DVJC Wants You!
